Marines Holding Solomons

Many Jap Fighters Are Down

WASHINGTON — Paying a high price in planes and pilots, the Japanese are still trying unsuccessfully to dislodge the American forces in the Solomons, the Navy reported Saturday night, and losing better than one out of every five bombers they send over.

The Japanese sent two waves of 26 bombers and one of 27 against the Guadalcanal installations on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Of these 79 bombers, 15 were destroyed, along with five of the Zero fighters supposed to protect them, bringing to 143 the number of aircraft the Japanese have lost in the Solomons fighting.

Of the latest bag of 20 American fighter planes accounted for at least 16; whether the other four also were downed by planes or by anti-aircraft fire was not specified. And if the Americans suffered any losses in these aerial combats, they were not reported.

Jap Losses Heavy
The Japanese bomber losses of about 20 per cent on these raids compare with an average loss of about five per cent suffered by the British in their big bomber raids on Germany and the vastly lower losses of American flying fortresses. Only two of the fortresses have been lost since the big raids began in mid-August.

While these futile air attacks were made by day, Japanese destroyers prowled off shore by night shelling the United States positions "but no damage has resulted," the communicate said.

On their own account, American dive bombers made another attack Friday on enemy installations on Gizo Island, in the western part of the New Georgia group of the Solomons, sinking a small ship and blasting buildings. The Americans had made a previous attack there Sept. 6.

The communicate also reported that the Japanese were supplying their troops still fighting in the interior of Guadalcanal, using small boats which can sneak ashore undetected at night, but that the Marines, supported by dive bombers and fighters, continued to seek out and engage these units.

Study Sabotage In Army Bomber Crash

BUFFALO, N. Y. (AP)—Possibility of sabotage was studied Saturday by the Federal Bureau of Investigation in the crash of a blazing, pilotless plane which hurtled through the roof of a Curtiss Wright airplane building, killing 12 persons and injuring 35.

Old and young, the home folks and contestants of today and of yesterday, gathered to see the one-day show that will be the outstanding Western event of the nation this year.

And, intermingled with the ranching folks are hundreds of men in Army uniform, with many of their folks, most of whom have been reared in areas far removed from the cattle country, and who are counting on seeing their first real Western show in a Western setting.

Together, ranch folks and Army will watch the top hands of the rodeo world, with the Midland Army Flying School band playing those tunes and airs that are dear to both alike, with everybody bent on having a hearty good time.

The band concert, directed by Sergeant Thomas Marcell, will open at 1 o'clock. The rodeo events will start sharply at 2 o'clock.

The show will feature a 12-calf roping contest between Toots Mansfield and Clyde Burk for the world's championship. Mansfield is defending champion, and Burk has held the title twice in his career. Both are to be mounted on as fine cowponies as are ever to be seen in a rodeo arena.

Two other matches with four more of the great ropers will be featured, with James Kinney matched with Troy Fort, and Sonny Edwards with Jim Espy. And, the roping features will be topped off with some jack-pot catches, open to any and all.

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Cooperative Milk Collection Plans To Be Worked Out

Dairy products transportation in Midland County is being planned to meet any emergency that may arise due to shortage of tires and to the possible rationing of gasoline. Dairymen, meeting at the invitation of the Midland County Rationing Board, were told that tires for all vehicles now in use could not be expected as fast as replacements are needed. Dairies are first among the eligibles, but the tire supplies are simply not available, said A. G. Bowman, member of the tire board, and himself a stockman.

Cooperative hauling plans are being inaugurated throughout the state to handle such emergencies, and dairymen met with the rationing board representative to set up some such plan in this county before the problem becomes critical locally. The Midland County problem is somewhat complicated by the fact that a majority of the dairy producers make their daily hauls to the city at such a time as to bring their children to the schools.

A committee, headed by R. C. Brooks, and with D. W. McDonald and Bohannan as members, is meeting with representatives of wholesale milk buyers, and with groups of dairymen in certain road areas, looking to an early solution to the problem.

The producers, meeting Thursday night, expressed their appreciation to the rationing board for giving them such advanced notice of the problem. I. O. Sturkie, county agent, presided at the session, when a majority of the dairymen were present.

Many soldiers will need transportation to and from the Midland rodeo grounds, and citizens driving to the championship calf roping event are urged to pick up as many soldiers as possible.

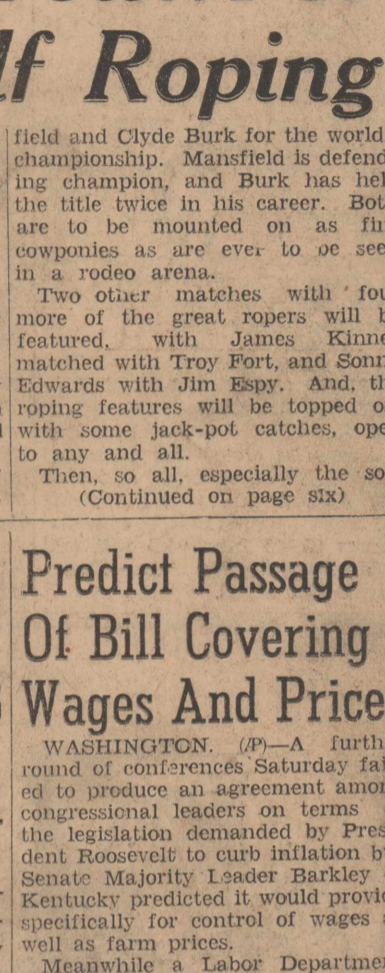

Senate May Make Changes In Tax Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of the Senate Finance Committee, told by the Treasury Saturday that their action on the tax bill had added only \$830,000,000 to the annual revenue provided by the House, indicated that they might consider further changes in the levies on individuals.

With a reopening of the tax schedules which already have been tentatively adopted, sales tax advocates hoped to revive a levy of this type and there were indications that a modified version of the Ruml "pay as you go" plan might be considered.

Calling a meeting of the committee for Monday morning, Chairman George (D-Ga.) told reporters the bill still was open to last minute changes but would not predict whether any would be made.

While George said he thought the Treasury's estimate of an \$830,000,000 Senate Committee increase over the \$6,271,000,000 in the House bill was low, Senator Byrd (D-Va.) pointed out that the measure still was \$1,000,000,000 short of the \$8,700,000,000 in new taxes sought by the Treasury.

British Forces Advance Fast In Madagascar

LONDON. (AP) — British forces pushing inland from the Majunga landing on Madagascar were reported only 70 miles from Tananarive Saturday after a 130-mile advance, but French reports said "the enemy" had been engaged en route with "very heavy losses" inflicted and that the going would be tougher over 200 intervening barriers before the capital.

"The considerable progress" reported by the first communicate from the British East African command outside the capital, made the great bridge over the Betsiboka River but that a concurrent overland advance from the north had been slowed by the French destruction of bridges.

Vichy Troops Resist
The Vichy troops recently concentrated outside the capital, made their stand at the confluence of the Ikopa and Betsiboka rivers where the British forces must turn up the Ikopa Valley to reach Tananarive (Continued on Page 2)

To speed preparations for launching all-out offensives against the Axis, the Army Air Forces urgently need men with the ability to service airplanes, trucks and guns to "keep 'em flying," rolling and firing.

Six types of specialists are needed at once: aircraft mechanics, armorers, radio mechanics, radio operators and mechanics, metalworkers and welders.

No previous experience in these lines is required. Given men with mechanical aptitude, the Army Air Forces can train them quickly and efficiently in a new trade.

To get as many men as possible into training as quickly as possible, the Army Air Forces are now enlisting such men directly, with the understanding that, whenever possible, these men will be stationed at fields near their homes.

In view of the urgency of the need, I do hereby proclaim the week of September 14-19 as AAF TECHNICAL PROCUREMENT WEEK. Beginning tomorrow at 10 a.m., Army Air Forces representatives from Midland Army Flying School will be stationed at the Midland Chamber of Commerce for the purpose of explaining the requirements and enlisting volunteers for training.

The opportunities for advancement of men enlisting in this category are wide. While they are learning a new vocation, they will be extended all the benefits and protections offered by the United States Army.

The men of Midland are urged to give most serious consideration to this appeal.

Volga City Defenders Exact Heavy Toll In Ranks Of Attackers

The Red Army stood firm in an arc of death at three approaches to Stalingrad Saturday exacting the most staggering casualties of the war on the storming Germans who tried in vain to advance.

As the epic siege of Stalingrad ground through its 18th day, a new and deadly foe of Hitler appeared in the high passes of the Caucasus mountains. It was snow, the first fall of approaching winter, which the Germans learned last year to dread.

Thrown back in their blood on the southwest and western paths to the Volga city, the Germans shifted their attack to the North. They met no better success, despite the hundreds of tanks and planes that spearheaded the attacks of a half million or more foot troops rushed headlong into the battle from other sectors.

* The shifting of men from other fronts to the seething cauldron invited Russian attacks on the weakened fronts. The Reds struck vigorously and successfully along the Volkhov, between Leningrad and Moscow, routing the Germans for several miles, and once more on the central front near the capital. Here, too, the Russians advanced.

Geran a Punch Weaker
In the foothills of the Caucasus range near the Grozny oil fields, the Russian defense stiffened and destroyed all bridgeheads the Germans had thrown across the Terek river near Mozdok. Above and beyond that front were the whitened mountain gaps through which the Axis alpinists must fight to reach the fabulous riches of Baku on the Caspian.

It could be rash to say that Stalingrad could hold like Leningrad and Moscow. Its defense positions were far weaker, and the terrain was more hospitable to the attacking Germans. It appeared probable though, that the resolute stand was weakening the German army to such an extent that its next offensive would lack the punch of those of the preceding three years.

Winter Moving In Fast
The whole dogged resistance of the Russians had delayed Hitler's timetable so much that the Stalingrad campaign appeared likely to ring down the curtain of this year's war in Russia. Winter was moving in fast.

The whole warring world seemed to have paused momentarily to watch the death struggles of the beleaguers in Russia. The battlefield of Egypt, China, the Solomons and New Guinea all were relatively calm and unchanged.

The British advanced 130 miles to within 70 miles of Tananarive, capital of the big French island of Madagascar in the Western Indian Ocean.

BROOKLYN (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals stormed to another victory over the bewildered Brooklyn Dodgers Saturday, 2 to 1, and moved into an exact tie for the National League lead, ending a reign of 144 consecutive days during which the Dodgers had held uncontested control of first place.

It was the 29th triumph in 34 games for the rampaging Red Birds and seemed to convince most of the crowd of 27,511 fans, including 1,573 service men, that the Cardinals were capable of going on to the pennant from here.

A home run by Rookie George Kurovski with one on in the second inning provided all the runs St. Louis needed to win as Lefty Max Lanier, the persistent Dodger jinx, pitched five-hit ball against his one-time roommate, Southpaw Max Macon.

The ball game, however, was vastly different from Friday because all of the Dodgers except Chuck Dressen were in the thick of the battle till the end, keeping Manager Leo Durocher and Coach the outcome uncertain and the home fans hopeful.

Durocher and Dressen would have been on the front line to the finish, too, except that Umpire Al Barlick thumbed both of them off the field for a rowdy and prolonged argument on a decision at first base in the seventh inning.

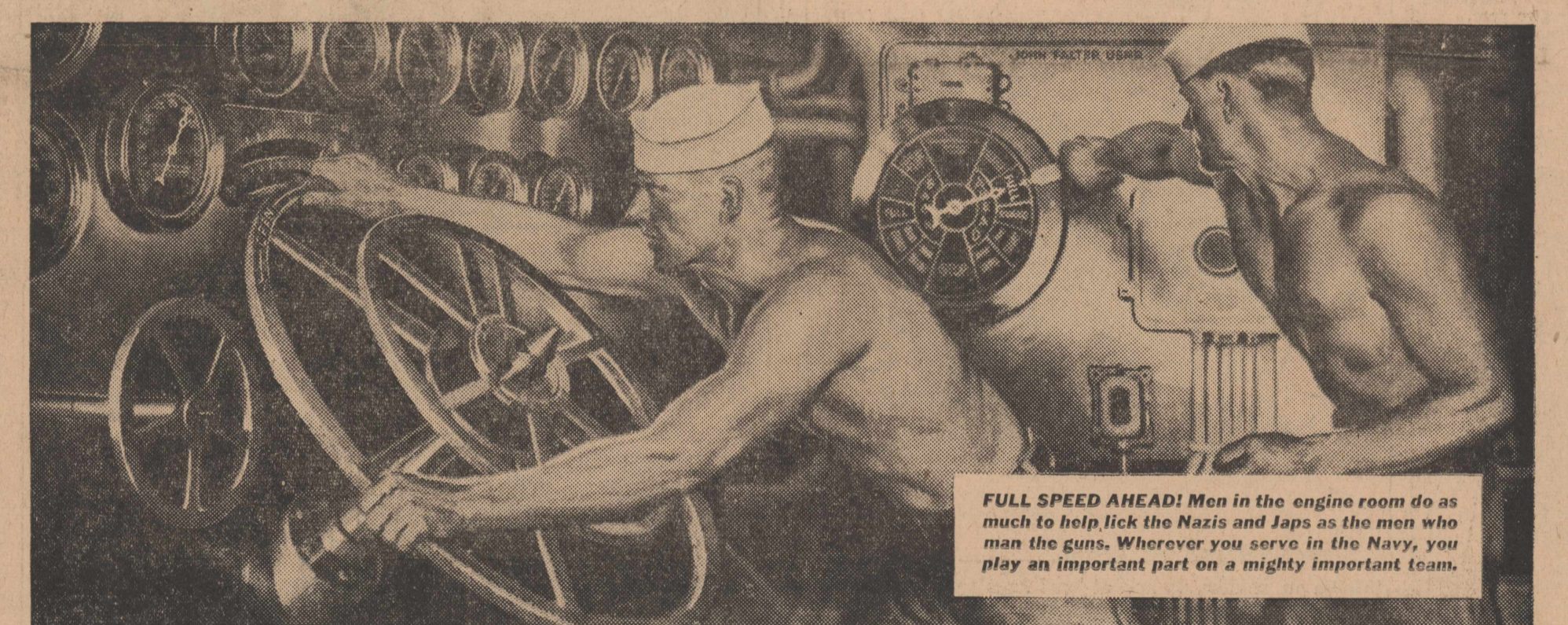

A heart led from dummy brought out the jack and ace. East exited with a heart, which Dornbusch won. Dummy was put in with the ace of clubs to cash the jack of spades, then the other club was led, forcing East in. East had to lead away from the sight-six of spades into dummy's nine-seven.

Rampaging Colorado Now Under Control

AUSTIN (AP)—The once headstrong Colorado River now is just like the tap at the kitchen sink. It can be turned on or off here at Tom Miller Dam by one pull on a lever.

When a contractor crossing the stream below the dam with a 14-inch water main requested it, the flow was reduced from 1,500 to 500 second feet, bringing the stream down 14 inches and eliminating construction of a coffer dam.

Ocean, to erase an Axis threat to the vital Allied supply lines to Egypt, Russia, India, China and Australia. Only slight resistance was encountered—a few shots some destroyed bridges and barricades, the British said.

Laval Acts Up Again
But the French said they were inflicting heavy losses on "the enemy" and were still resisting.

Pierre Laval, the creature of Hitler, had troops and police manned machine guns at strategic places throughout Vichy in what was called a maneuver against possible disorders aimed against the government.

Britain's big black bombers stayed home overnight but the screams of the German propaganda machine attested to the bomb wreckage on the German home front. The last attack was on the Rhine city of Duesseldorf and the Berlin radio spoke of the steel center as "this once beautiful city."

Instead of talking of nuisance raids, the Germans threatened dreadful reprisals to come. The German Air Force, however, was locked on the Russian front from which it would not safely be withdrawn. The rising size of the British and U. S. air strength in the west made it doubtful that Germany ever again would have air superiority.

Lull On China Front
For the second day the Japanese who had encroached within 44 miles of Port Moresby on New Guinea, were stopped by Australian troops and U. S. planes. A Japanese destroyer was sunk, another was damaged by a near miss.

The German radio said Japanese submarines sank two U. S. transports carrying 4,000 doughboys between Australia and New Zealand but this was unconfirmed, even by the Japanese.

A lull settled on the whole China front, with the Japanese holding Kihwa and Lanchi firmly.

British artillery shelled German positions on the southern sector of the Alamein front in Egypt. Elsewhere the front was quiet, though Axis planes were slightly more active. Travelers reaching Turkey said the Germans were heavily reinforcing their air force in the Eastern Mediterranean, fearful of a British offensive against some of the Aegean Islands.

reported to the senate, additional revenue will be provided which otherwise will have to be obtained by writing another tax bill in January," Byrd declared.

He favored substitution of a sales tax for the 5 per cent victory tax on all earnings over \$624 a year, which the Committee recently adopted. Senator Guffey (D-Pa.) said he was being urged to bring up the sales tax again.

Seeking to make income tax treatment uniform, the committee voted to permit citizens of Alabama, Arizona, California, Illinois, Mississippi, New Mexico, North Carolina, and Michigan to deduct from their net incomes, for tax purposes, the amounts paid in state sales taxes.

The wording of state laws had caused the treasury to deny such deductions to taxpayers in those states while granting it to others. The Committee voted to allow firms constructing war plants to take amortization credits currently. It revised the victory tax to permit credits to be taken for debts incurred up to Sept. 1, 1942 instead of only those contracted before Jan. 1, 1942.

British Armed Forces Get Increase In Pay

LONDON (AP) — Sir Stafford Cripps has announced increases in the basic pay of British Armed Forces at the annual cost of \$172,000,000 after the House of Commons had heard the lament of an anonymous Tommy Atkins over his scale as compared with that in the United States Army.

The pay increase will be about 70 cents a week for all men in the armed services below commissioned ranks and about forty-five cents for women, Cripps said.

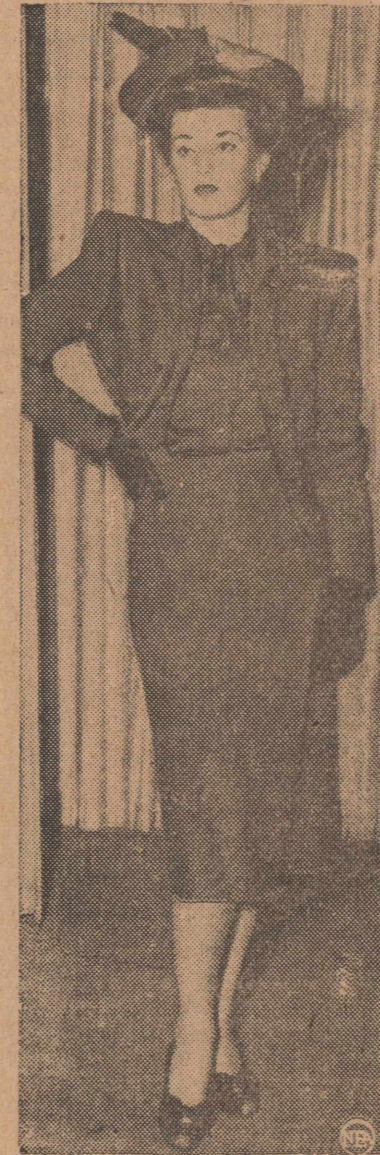
