

# Red Army's Dramatic Eleventh-Hour Rally Prospect Showing Hurls Germans Back

You All's Parachute

Associated Press War Editor. Adolf Hitler's siege armies, twice hurled back in bloody street fighting, were reported hastily erecting defenses in the northwest outskirts of Stalingrad Friday as the Russians seized the initiative in a dramatic eleventh-hour

Dispatches said the Red Army defenders were backed down tree-lined avenues to cliffs overlooking the Volga waterfront at one time.

Then, with the bluffs behind them and Nazi tanks in front, the Soviets struck back in a supreme effort to save the big steel city and forced the invaders to retreat.

Significantly, Hitler's field headquarters made only the broad general claim that Nazi troops had scored "further successes" in the battle of Stalingrad and again emphasized the "embittered" nature of the fighting.
