





By means of the Telephone one is enabled to establish communication promptly with anyone in any city or town within the United States as well as vorious cities in Canada and Cuba. The rates are very reasonable when one stops to consider that a great deal can be discussed in three minutes since the average person talks at the rate of one hundred words a minute.

The Station-to-Station Rates effect a great saving to the public. There are three classes of these rates: (1) The day rate from 4:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. (2) The evening rate from 8:30 p. m. until midnight, and (3) the night rate from midnight until 4:30 a.m. To obtain this reduction from the ordinary "Person to Person" rate, the calling party in Haskell should place his call saying that he wishes to talk with anyone at a certain telephone number, for example: "John Doe, Telephone No. 991, wishes to talk with anyone at X2400 in Fort Worth."




