

\$467,000 Allocated For Improvements To **New Midland Airport**

Telegrams from Washington late Thursday announced the allocation of \$467,000 for additional improvements to Midland's new airport, north of the Country Club.

From Senators Connally and O'Daniel and from Congressman R. E. Thomason came the information that the Civil Aeronautics Administration had allocated the money for the improvements.

The original allotment for the port which soon will be completed totalled approximately \$387,000. More funds were provided later.

Details of the new additions to the port have not been revealed but it is known that CAA authorities have been planning adding more land to the airport tract, widening and lengthening the new runways, also adding another run-way ,and additional lighting. **Contractors Are Busy**

Russian shock troops, attacking with gun butts and bayonets, were reported driving the Germans from house to house amid the nightmare wreckage of Stalingrad Friday, and once again it appeared that the astonishing Soviets had warded off disaster. It was the 39th day of siege.



Any loss of human life, any interference with production, any loss of critical materials hinders and impedes our war effort.

Uncontrolled fire, even in normal times, is a national menace. It kills or disables thousands of our people and destroys a significant portion of our national wealth each year. Today, when every machine is being taxed to its fullest productive capacity, when new hands are working with unfamiliar tools, and when agents of our enemies are seeking to hinder us by every possible means, it is essential that destructive fire be brought under stricter control in order that victory may be achieved at the earliest date.

Nothing less than the united vigilance and effort of all the people will suffice to break the grip of this menace. Fire hazards everywhere must BERLIN (From German Broadcasts) (AP)-A DNB be detected at once and eliminated. Loss of life and property from blaze and smoke must be reduced in every State in the Union. Prevention of all uncontrolled fires must be our goal.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate the week beginning October 4, 1942, as Fire Prevention Week; and I earnestly request the people of the country to give special heed to the importance of taking active measures during that week, and throughout the year, to conserve our human and material resources from the destructive toll of fire; and I direct the Office of Civilian Defense and other appropriate Federal agencies to initiate programs for emphasizing the importance of attaining these objectives. The present indicated strength of the Army is above four million men, but hints have been dropped that by the end of 1943 there must be some 10 million men in service. The labor supply now being inadequate for the demand, what will it be when these additional six million men But the problem of the local draft boards is where they will find the six million. Their difficulties become apparent only when you look at the list of skilled laborers whom the draft boards have been ordered not to touch.

This list of necessary men serves to explain why the local draft boards have been forced to reclassify many of their registrants upward, why the Army is taking quotas of up to 10 per cent illiterates, up to 2 per cent venereal diseased, men who are physically hasdicaped, childless men, men with dependents.
