

# Nazi Infantry Force Advances Slightly In Drive For Volga City

Associated Press War Editor Russia's Caucasian armies were officially reported to have thrown back the Germans in the critical struggle for the Grozny oil fields while in the 50-day-old siege of Stalingrad a Nazi infantry regiment led by 50 tanks advanced slghtly in a

costly renewal of the drive toward the Volga. Breaking a three-day lull, the Germans launched a series of attacks amid the skeleton ruins of Stalingrad, but the Russians declared their defense lines held firm and frustrated a Nazi attempt to smash into a northwest factory district.

### Lesson In Thrift

It is not alone bullets and guns we will mold from the mountains of scrap rising all over Texas. We are molding a new tradition of frugality.

That old flatirons and jalopies, the cannon and keys are not the only things Texans are tossing on the anti-axis

We are shedding the habits of the spendthrift. School children by the hundred thousands have added their persistent tireless strength to it. Banks, lawyers, doctors, truck drivers, waiters, laborers, have turned out to uncover hidden hoards of precious metal.

They are not doing it merely for the exercise and raw hands they'll get. Grimly satisfying to many Texan must be the thought that the piece of scrap he tosses on heap will eliminate some Japanese or German enemy hellbent on eliminating us.

And so, egged on by the hammer-and-tong exhortations of the newspapers sponsoring this drive. Texans have gathered ton upon ton the steel, iron, brass, copper, nickel and other metals vital to our warriors.

From the urban homes are coming the thousand and one odds and ends of useful metal tossed aside through the years. Old bedsteads, bicycles, irons, pipe, toys, kitchen stoves, nails, keys, wire fence, auto parts.

From the farms are coming much of the heavy stuff hugs iron wheels, great boilers, all the leftovers from old plows, cultivators and other machines which work the

From the factories are coming even heavier stuffgreat but worn out printing presses weighing many tons, boiler units discarded long ago, shafting, old machines that have seen their best days.

Cities are unearthing a buried treaure in street car. tracks, which a few years ago were covered over when the bus came into vogue.

In their play wagons the children, industrious as ants, are hauling their finds to the scrap piles.

The all-over vogue is to build a mountain of metal that will bury the axis forever.

The by-product is a lesson in thrift.

There are some who would bet that never again will Texans and other Americans sell precious scrap to a potential enemy for a few dollars, as we did to the Japanese. We got some of that metal back, no doubt, at Pea

#### Industrial Draft

An industrial manpower draft modeled on Canada's appears to be inevitable for the same reason that the military draft originally was adopted by the United Statesbecause not enough men can be obtained, for the trenendous jov on hand, through voluntary enlistment.

This is not said in belittlement of popular patriotism and willingness. In an absolutely perfect world, perhaps men and women would voluntarily give up agreeable, accustomed work to take more essential but less desirable jobs. In a perfect world, perhaps men and women would be uninterested in the opportunity to add 10, 20 or 30 per cent to their weekly incomes.

But we do not live in a perfect world. Some jobs are more pleasant than others; some jobs pay better; anyway, each of us has become accustomed to own and isn't eager

To win the war some work is essential, and some doesn't matter. We can do the essential only by keeping all of its employes on the job and taking others from the dispensable occupations. We can't, in this imperfect world, rely upon voluntary action.

The only resort becomes a draft of workers, putting

each person where he or she can contribute most. The reiteration of "he or she" is not pedanticism. It is intended to emphasize that this is not a man's war. It is an American people's war. There aren't enough men to fight and also to produce. Therefore women—millions and millions of women, many of whom would prefer to stay at home and care for their children—are going to have to go to work in war industries.

The whole idea, from beginning to end, is objectionable. It introduces regimentation of a type and to an extent that no free American citizen ever supposed he would accept. It strikes at the very roots of one of our most precious heritages—the right to work when, where, as

and if we choose. We hate violently the idea of an industrial draft, but we are going to accept it because we prefer regimentation under democracy, temporarily and voluntarily, to regimentation under Hitler permanently and ruthlessly.

We ask that the industrial draft be planned and executed with all possible consideration for our human frailties, with utter fairness, with every safeguard against the greed of both employers and unions.

The principle we accept. We made our bed when we permitted Hitler to rise to domination. Now we realize that we must lie in it.
