



Guadalcanal Struggle Looms

Million More Men By Jan. 1

Those With Secondary Dependents Face Call-Teen Age Group Later

WASHINGTON (AP)—One million one hundred thousand more men will have to be drafted by Jan. 1, Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey testified Thursday in support of legislation to draft 18 and 19-year-olds.

Most of these 1,100,000, he told the House Military Committee, will come from the group of men having secondary dependents, such as parents, and those having a wife only. The rest would be men with no dependents.

Hershey estimated that dropping the minimum draft age from 20 to 18 should make available 1,500,000 of what is the best of our manpower.

Teen-Age After Jan. 1
He explained that after Jan. 1 Selective Service must look for its manpower needs to the teen-age group, to men employed in agriculture and essential industry, and to the group having dependents.

Explaining the rapid increase in the induction rate, General Hershey said that during the first six months of this year inductions were at the rate of about 200,000 monthly, increased to more than 300,000 monthly during the third quarter, would be 400,000 this month, and approximately 450,000 in November and in December.

Want Youth's Prime
Military committees of both houses rushed forward Thursday with separate hearings on legislation to put uniforms on the 18-19 year old class. There was a possibility they might be finished by nightfall.

WAR BULLETINS

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of War Stimson disclosed Thursday that American Army ground forces and air forces had arrived on Guadalcanal to help defend the Solomon Islands key point against Japanese attacks.

CAIRO (AP)—British fighters shot down 23 Axis planes over Malta Wednesday, engaging most of the raiders before they were able to do any damage, a joint communique of the RAF and British Middle East headquarters said Thursday.

LISBON (AP)—Explosions at sea shook buildings and shattered windows Wednesday afternoon on Cape Roca, westernmost point of Portugal, tending to bear out earlier reports, still without confirmation, of a naval battle in the Atlantic off Portugal.

LONDON (AP)—A heavily-escorted German supply ship, described as important, was sunk in the English Channel early Wednesday by British light naval forces, the Admiralty announced Thursday.

Ghost Town Future For Gold Camps

CRIPPLE CREEK, Colo. (AP)—By a command of war the gold mines of the west stop Thursday their noisy air compressors and pneumatic drills.

In all the camps, which founded and maintained some of the nation's famous fortunes, the silence of idle machinery will foreshadow empty streets, boarded-over windows and vacant houses and stores—the trademarks of a ghost town.

A War Production Board edict, issued to effect the transfer of men from mining gold to tipping out weapon-making metals like copper, lead and zinc, orders that breaking out of new ore must cease Thursday. In 60 days of additional grace the mines and mills can only clean up for the industry's final shutdown.

In camps like Cripple Creek and Deadwood, and Lead in South Dakota, the blighting prospect of immediate economic paralysis with assured reserves of riches underground is an evil paradox. Both districts had their booms but settled into stable careers with an outlook of long life ahead.

Since cowboy Bob Womack found Cripple Creek's first gold in Poverty Gulch in 1891, sold his for \$5 and went on to a celebrating loot, the district has produced close to \$400,000,000.

Rebate Plan Is Studied By Tax Group

WASHINGTON (AP)—A joint Congressional Committee Thursday appeared heading toward an agreement on a new and untried system of taxation designed to raise \$1,750,000,000 a year, part of which would be only "borrowed" from the taxpayers and returned to them after the war.

Hughes Tool Manager Found Shot To Death

HOUSTON (AP)—Harold W. Fletcher, vice president and general manager of the Hughes Tool Company, early Thursday was found shot to death 100 yards off the Beaumont highway 23 miles from Houston.

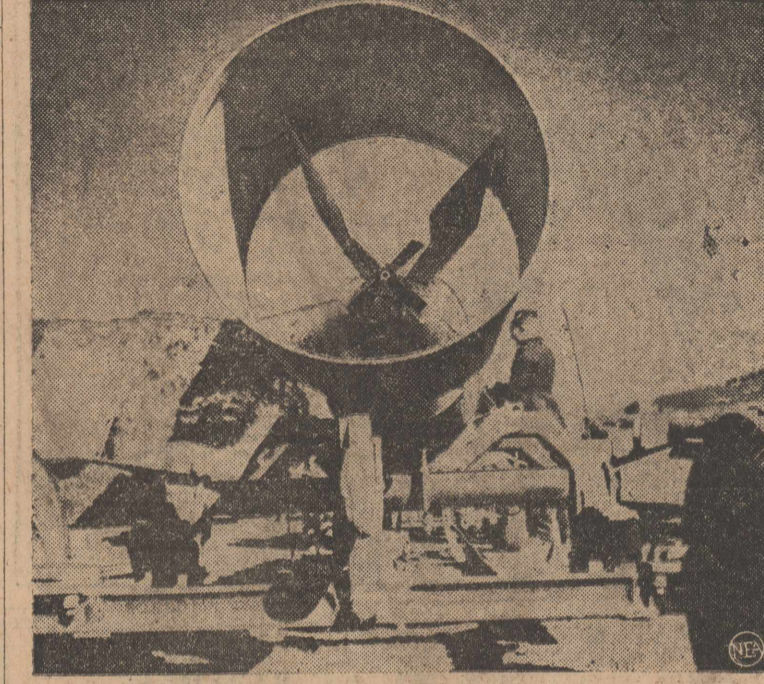
A heavy calibre revolver was clutched in his right hand. He had been shot through the throat. The body was in thick brush and weeds.

Justice of the Peace Mark M. Carter, Jr., returned a verdict of suicide.

Fletcher had \$293.15 on his person. Fletcher's body was found by two Hughes Tool employees, H. D. Brewer and J. R. Tinsley. Hours earlier, his abandoned car had been found by Capt. Ernest Mayr, chief of plant protection of Hughes Tool.

His widow and three children survive.

Duties Of Aerial Reconnaissance Observer In Battle Are Explained To New Bombardiers At Graduation

The duties of the aerial reconnaissance observer, the "scout" for Uncle Sam's team of bombardiers, navigators and pilots, was outlined Thursday to graduating bombardiers of Class 42-14 at the Midland AAF Bombarrier School by Major Frederick L. Moore, director of observation training at Brooks Field, San Antonio.

"The reconnaissance observer is the eyes of the Army," Major Moore declared, emphasizing the parallel between the work of the observer and the football scout who keeps a sharp eye out for weaknesses in the enemy positions.

"An Army with the greatest amount of accurate information about the enemy is more likely to be victorious in battle than the Army with a lesser amount of combat information," he said.

Major Moore explained briefly the methods of collecting information in combat.

Major Moore was introduced to the ninth and largest class of bombardiers to complete training in the world's largest bombardier school by Brigadier General Isaiah Davies, commanding.

Mad At Jerry Busts Prop On Nazi Tank

CAIRO (AP)—Capt. R. E. Ryan of Worcester, Mass., was worried and embarrassed, and he hoped that Brig. Gen. A. C. Strickland, commander of the United States Air Forces fighter command in the Middle East wouldn't be angry with him.

"For what?" asked the general when Ryan anxiously approached him.

"For breaking the tip off my propeller this morning."

"Tell me about it, son. I didn't know about it."

"Well, sir, I hit a tank," Ryan said. "But it was an accident."

"We were shooting up a landing ground and a machine gun cut loose at me from the right about 300 yards away. I got mad and ruddered toward him."

"As soon as I got three men on top of the tank in my sights I opened all my guns. One Jerry went straight up and the other two fell off. I pulled up as quick as I could, sir, but I hit the tank."

The impact knocked 10 inches off the tip of his propeller blade but Ryan kept his plane in the air, wobbly but able to get home under the protection of two escorting fighters.

"We replaced the prop immediately, sir," said Ryan. "And it's back on the line for the next mission."

WASHINGTON (AP)—The largest tire sale in the nation's history was underway Thursday with only one buyer—Uncle Sam.

Battle For Control Of Solomon Islands Grows In Intensity

WASHINGTON (AP)—The grim struggle for control of the Solomons was rising in crescendo again Thursday with newly reinforced Japanese troops apparently determined to recapture the prized Guadalcanal airfield.

Failing to bomb the Marine-held airbase in weeks of costly aerial attacks, the enemy turned to their warships, the Navy reported Wednesday, and bombarded the landing field and shore installations from the sea.

In spite of an American cruiser-destroyer force recently assigned the task of fighting off sea-borne reinforcements on the strategic island, the Japanese, the Navy said, succeeded in landing additional troops on Guadalcanal Wednesday.

Japs Land Artillery
Covered by warships, Japanese transports slipped to the north coast where the enemy troops are concentrated and in the early morning landed reinforcements and presumably artillery which the invaders have lacked.

The Navy's communique did not disclose whether the enemy fleet was engaged by the American Naval force which only last Sunday routed a similar landing attempt after smashing eight Japanese vessels. The enemy's success in its latest venture, however, led Naval circles to believe that a major battle for the airfield was imminent.

Willkie Sees Need For Change In US Wartime Ideas

WASHINGTON (AP)—Wendell L. Willkie stepped out of the role of personal representative of the President back into that of private citizen Thursday after ending an epochal circuit of the world and appealing anew for a second front.

From the White House itself, where he reported to President Roosevelt late Wednesday on a 31,000 mile tour that took him to fighting fronts in the Middle East, Russia and China, Willkie urged that a second front be established.

He had made the same appeal in Moscow.

Yet he told reporters: "In my judgment, Germany will never conquer Russia."

Stretch Our Minds
Willkie said he had his own opinion where a second front should be opened, but he was unwilling to name the spot. He based his decision that there should be one, he asserted, on talks with "military men all over the world."

He said that he was concerned over the cost in human lives and human values and over winning the peace as well as the war.

He said he had learned at first hand that "a lot of us, including public officials, are going to have to stretch our muscles and our minds before we win."

Scrapping Mad, Midland Merchants To Get Scrap

Midland merchants and business men are scrapping mad and they plan to close shop and gather in the scrap Tuesday afternoon.

Plans for the campaign have been perfected at meetings of the scrap committees. Volunteer workers Thursday were contacting business firms in regard to closing, while others were lining up as many trucks and pickups as possible for the big drive.

Every business firm of the city is requested to close from 1 p. m. to 6:30 p. m. Tuesday, and all employees are urged to don work clothes and man the trucks to bring in the scrap which is stacked at various sections of the city. Sponsors pointed out it is the patriotic duty of every individual to cooperate in this plan to bring in the vital scrap.

Post Stickers
Attractive stickers are being placed on the doors of the firms agreeing to close for the drive. The stickers are available at the chamber of commerce office.

One hundred and fifty trucks and pickups will be needed to do the job. Clint Dunagan, Midland County salvage chairman, said in urging all persons who have such equipment available to list it with the chamber of commerce. **Stack Scrap On Street**
Trucks and workers will traverse every street in the city, picking up scrap material on the streets and in the alleys. It also is planned to send trucks and workers into rural areas.

Citizens again are urged to gather all scrap materials from their premises, stacking the salvage on the street. Those having scrap in their yards or hidden from view are requested to leave their addresses at the chamber of commerce. Rural residents having scrap which they wish to donate are requested to advise I. O. Sturkie, county agent, as soon as possible.

About Communism

Apparently Communism in the United States is one topic on which it is forbidden to write frankly. In addition to the retorts which obviously come from "American" Reds themselves, any honest attempt to discuss Stalinist activity in this country brings protest from those who, honestly if mistakenly, consider such discussion subversive.

The thesis of these protestants is simple: Russia is our ally against Hitler. Russia's heroic resistance is giving us a chance to beat Hitler. Therefore Russia is lily white. Therefore American Communists should not be criticized.

To this thesis we take exception. We can understand how the argument may appeal to those who have not studied Communist methodology—who naively measure the Red danger by the Communist Party membership vote. But we can't go along with the idea.

Russia is our ally. The Russian armies are doing a marvelous job against the Nazis at a cost to themselves that we can only guess.

As a result of the Reds' sacrifice, the United States and Great Britain are enabled to prepare for the even greater task that yet remains, the aggressive blow which shall defeat the axis.

But let us not deceive ourselves. Russia is not fighting for us, for Great Britain, for democracy. Russia is fighting for Russia. It happens fortunately for us, that Russia's self-interest at this moment coincides with our self-interest. Therefore Russia is co-operating with us militarily, and we are co-operating with Russia.

The Russians are realist. They hate democracy. They see no reason for accepting democracy merely because Communism and democracy temporarily are allies against Germany. They are not permitting Americans, or pro-American democrats financed and directed from Washington, to agitate in Russia—to try to induce the Russian populace to put pressure on Josef Stalin to change his military policies.

Anybody who tried to do those things in Russia would disappear and never be seen again.

We should be as realistic as the Reds, if not as harsh. We shall not liquidate the Communist who represents Stalin's desires as against American welfare, of course, but we can ignore his vociferations and be continually on guard lest he mislead us.

This, obviously, has nothing to do with military co-operation with Stalin and the Soviet as long as they fight the axis.

No, we haven't said anything against Fascism here. Why should we? Every American hates Fascism, Nazism, Nipponism, and is fighting them to the limit.

It is Communism, making political hay while Russia is our ally, that we have to watch as intelligently and realistically as Communism guards against any infiltration of democracy into Russia.

Novelty Tea Ring

2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons Calumet Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons butter or other shortening
3/4 cup milk (about)
1/2 cup raspberry jam
1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
2 tablespoons milk (about)
2 tablespoons raspberry jam

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk gradually, stirring until soft dough is formed. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead 30 seconds, or enough to shape. Roll into an ob-

long sheet, 1/4 inch thick. Spread evenly with raspberry jam. Roll as for jelly roll; bring edges together to form ring and place on baking sheet covered with greased brown paper. With scissors, cut 1-inch slices, almost through ring, turning each slice cut-side up and pointing outer edge. Brush with melted butter. Bake in hot oven (400° F.) 30 minutes, or until done.

Combine sugar, milk, and jam for glaze. When ring is baked, remove to cake rack, and while hot, spread with glaze. Serve warm. (All measurements are level.)





Distinctive Badges Will Now Be Worn By Aircraft Technicians

Now aircraft mechanics and technicians can wear their own distinctive silver badges and keep pace with bombardiers, pilots, navigators and gunners.

That was the good news at the Midland A. A. F. Bombardier School Thursday, following receipt of orders from Randolph Field headquarters authorizing enlisted technicians and mechanics in the Gulf Coast A. A. F. Training Center to wear a distinctive silver badge indicating the skills in which they have qualified.

Authorization of the badges for mechanics and technicians coincided with the Midland Bombardier School's drive to enlist men handy with tools to help "Keep 'em Flying." The announcement was made by Major General H. R. Harmon, commanding the Gulf Coast A. A. F. Training Center.

The design of the silver badge is a gear wheel, encircled by a wreath and surmounted by a four-bladed propeller. Suspended from the badge, in the manner of a marksman's medal, are one or more silver bars with an inscription noting the technical skill for which the wearer has qualified.

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For Enlisted Men Only
The new mechanics and technicians badge is in addition to the silver wings which are now worn by expert mechanics who have qualified as flight engineers.

"Only enlisted men in the Army Air Forces will be awarded the new technician's badge," General Harmon said. "To qualify, they must have served at least six months with the Army Air Forces and either have graduated from an authorized course in technical training or have demonstrated their capabilities as trained technicians in one or more of the 24 specialties for which the badge has been designated.

These specialties include: airplane armorer, electrical, hydraulic and instrument specialist; airplane mechanic, machinist, metal worker and welder; power plant specialist; propeller specialist; A. C. S. radio specialist, bombsight mechanic, Link Trainer instructor, parachute rigger, photographer, photographic laboratory technician, power turret and gunsight specialist, radio V-1 mechanic, radio observer, radio mechanic, radio operator, teletypewriter mechanic, weather forecaster and weather observer.

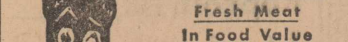

Sealy-Smith, 10,545-foot Ellenburger discovery producer of the Monahan pool in Northeastern Ward, flowed 34-gravity oil at an estimated rate of 25 barrels hourly the last ten minutes of a 58-minute drillstem test from 5,595 to 5,655 feet. Average gas volume was 382,000 cubic feet per day. When drillpipe was pulled it contained 870 feet or 12.4 barrels of oil and 30 feet of oil-cut mud. Test was through 5 7/8-inch choke at bottom, with 2-inch opening at top. Zone tested is comparable to the "Tubby" pay in the Clear Fork lower Permian, found productive in several pools in West Texas, particularly in the Sand Hills of Western Crane County.

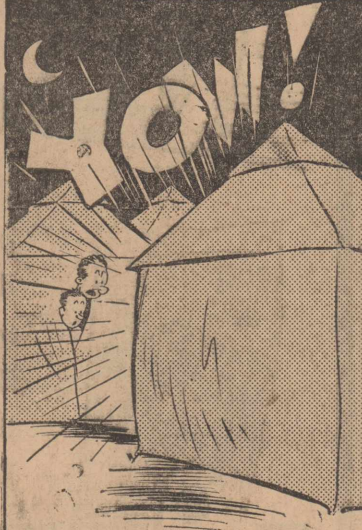

Estimated receipts Thursday compared with actual receipts on Thursday of last week were: cattle 2,700 and 3,548; calves 1,800 and 2,045; hogs 800 and 908; and sheep 6,500 and 9,334.

Fish For Information

The Berlin radio, throwing a multitude of reports on Allied dispositions, seems to be either fishing for information or trying to impress the United Nations with the thoroughness of the German information services. But the general tenor is conviction that a blow is coming, and that the initiative will not be Germany's.

A new factor sharpens the Nazi anxieties. "The Yanks are coming" is in effect the refrain of a stream of radio outpourings from Berlin.

"The belief is voiced that American troops will play a very important part in the coming developments," said the Berlin station Wednesday night.

War Engulf All Africa

Wednesday it was a story of British-American concentration in Gambia, the British territory nearest Dakar, the pivotal point of the whole West African area. With this was spread a report, admittedly unconfirmed, of an Allied convoy approaching Dakar. While it would be naive to take Berlin's radio emissions at face value, there is a strong impression here that the German command faces without any taste for it the prospect of warfare spreading from one coast of Africa to the other, a battlefield more vast even than that of Russia.

Want To Be Strong? Here's Some Figures On What You Can Do

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—The fun-loving boy, progressing from the raccoon coat and goldfish gulping eras, is becoming a well-muscular and coordinated fighting machine.

The first batch of statistics from the University of Michigan's post Pearl Harbor physical hardening program discloses that the average male student is 20 per cent more proficient in athletic maneuvers after 16 weeks of effort.

A faculty statistician, Byron O. Hughes, reported Thursday on the findings of a compulsory conditioning program for 1,000 summer semester students. At the end of the course, he said, the average man could run a quarter mile six seconds faster, could do three more pullups and six more pushups, could run farther and had a stronger grip in both hands.

"The figure show," Hughes explained, "that the amount of gain is directly proportional to the amount of time spent in the program."

Other findings by Hughes were: The performance of the average student when left in charge of his own physical conditioning is inadequate.

Acceptable physical conditioning can be produced in the relatively short space of 72 hours spread over 16 weeks.

Major changes are shown in those events which place heavier demands on physical condition, such as pullups, pushups and distance running. There are lesser changes in the non-endurance events, such as strength of grip, vertical jump, 60-yard dash and broad jump.

Hughes said he found tall men superior to short men in practically all events, and slender types showed the most improvement at the end of the course.

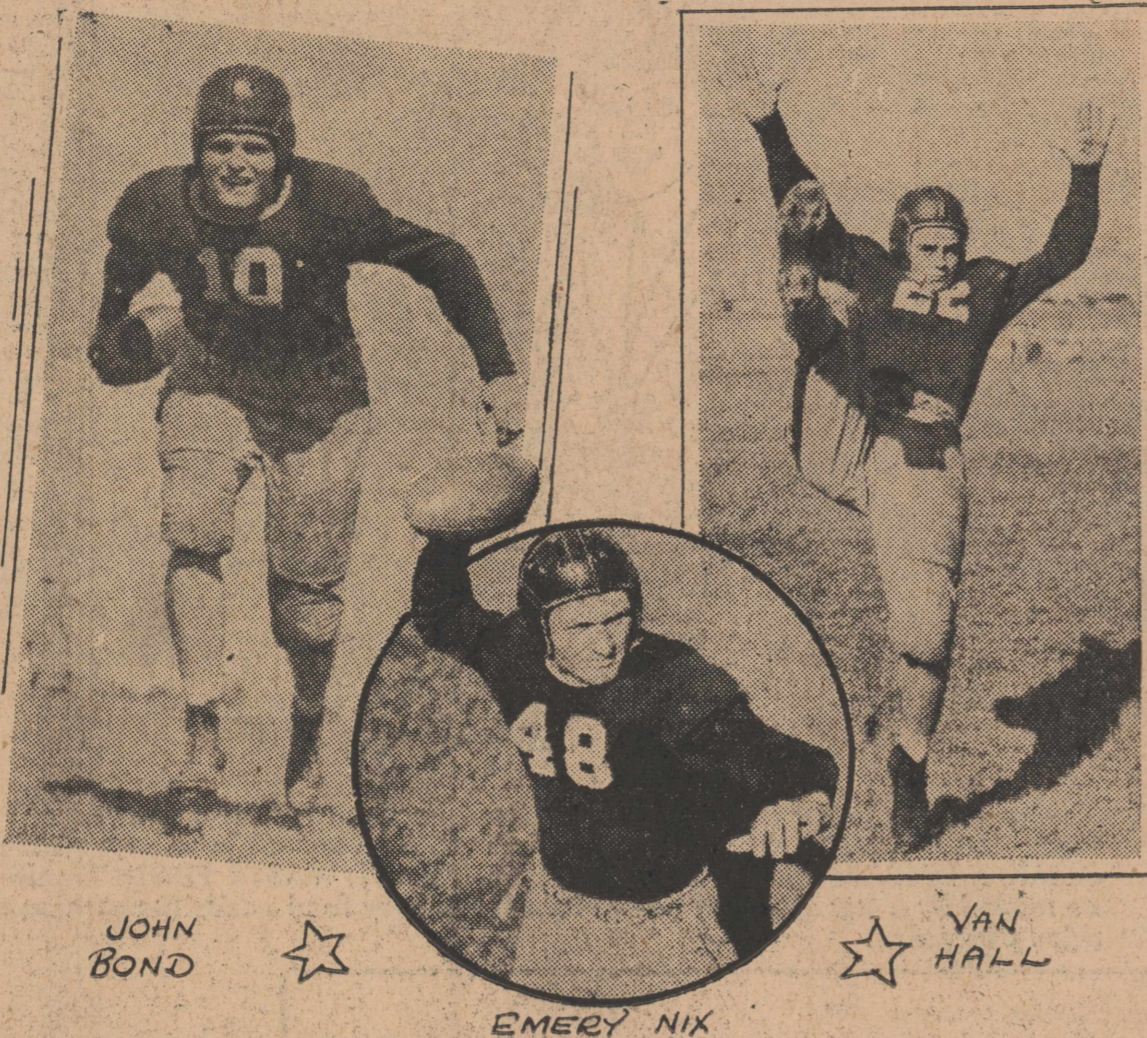

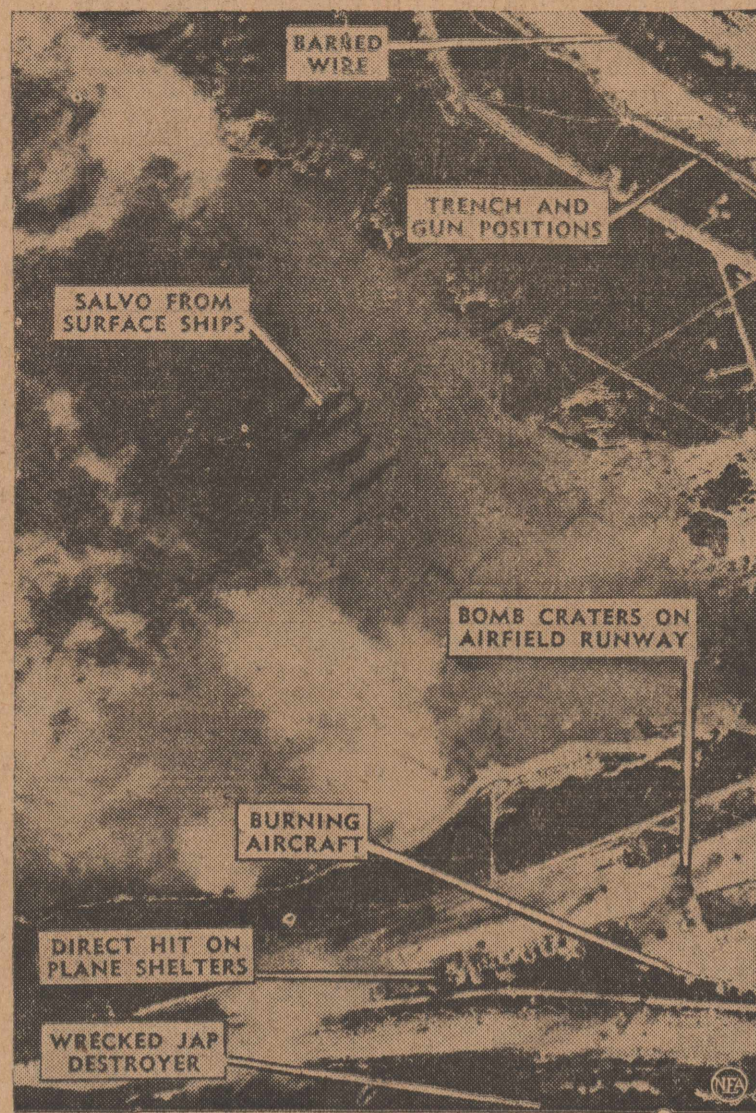

Chili Puts New Life In Old Recipes

Chili powder is an American spice which people in the West and Southwest use constantly. More Americans should learn how to combine this seasoning with familiar ingredients to add more flavor and interest to their menus.

Here are two recipes using chili powder which can be introduced to the family in Sunday's meals.

Braised Beef
(Serves 4 to 6)
Three pounds good cut pot roast, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 cup flour, 4 tablespoons rendered suet, 1 cup water, 1 tablespoon chili powder.

Put suet and chili powder into meat. Dredge with flour. Brown thoroughly on all sides in hot fat in heavy iron pot. Add boiling water, cover, and simmer until tender, about 3 hours. Use drippings from meat as gravy stock. Add 1 teaspoon chili powder to gravy.

Corn Souffle
(Serves 4 to 6)
One can whole kernel corn, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, 1/8 teaspoon dry mustard, a tablespoon butter, 2 eggs, 1 cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons flour 1/2 teaspoon chili powder.

Melt butter, add flour, then gradually stir in milk. Pour a small amount of the mixture over egg yolks, then add to first mixture, stirring constantly. Cook a few minutes, then add corn. Beat egg whites well, then fold in. Pour into buttered baking dish and cook on a pan of hot water in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about one hour.

Keep Cows Contented Stay Away From Them
COLUMBUS, O. (AP)—Sidelights of the nation's milk and egg production drive turned up in the weekly news letter of the Ohio State University Agricultural Extension Office.

"Cows give a maximum amount of milk only when free from disturbing influences," the letter asserts. "Whacking a dairy cow over the rump with a milk stool reduces the amount of milk the cow will give."

Another item cautions against permitting numerous visitors in the dairy barn and chicken lot. "Any farmer who sees his cows jerk back to avoid outstretched hands or who has seen the hens pile into corners at the sound of a shrill scream of laughter knows that the milk pail or the egg basket will be lighter that day."

12,000 Models Of Axis War Planes To Be Made In Schools

AUSTIN, (AP)—Production of 12,000 Heinkels, Messerschmitts, Zezons and Marochettis roll off Texas assembly lines at the rate of 120 a day in the next few weeks—and no comfort to Hitler, Mussolini and Hirohito.
The armed forces which use these planes—miniature scale models—to teach fledgling pilots the trick of spotting and identifying them quickly was so pleased with 10,000 built by Texas public school children last year that the Navy asked for 12,000 more.
To accomplish the job it has been suggested that assembly line production methods be used in the schools.
Pupils may ask their teachers and superintendents to write the State Department of Education for the necessary plans.

Tattooed Chickens Keep Thief Away

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (AP)—West Virginia poultrymen think they've found a way to put the chicken thief out of business.
A simple, inexpensive method is being used to identify each hen and rooster. They are tattooed with the owner's mark and number.
Each fowl is then checked into the files of the state police, the Department of Agriculture, the state poultrymen's association and the West Virginia University extension service bureau.
Actual tattooing is done on the web of a wing and C. C. Blake, chief of the department of agriculture's poultry division, avers that even if the bird has been killed, plucked and placed in the oven, the tattoo identification will be visible to the trained eye.

U. Of Michigan Bells To Go Off To War

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—The library chiming, the five bells that struck every quarter hour for more than 50 years on the University of Michigan campus and became famous in song and story among many generations of Michigan students, are going to be melted down for scrap.
The bells, which were retired six years ago when the Baird Carillon was completed, will yield more than two tons of bronze and tin when they are donated to the war effort soon.

Kelly's Bombardier Wins Another Award

Gen. MA CARTER RUSSELL'S HEADQUARTERS, Australia. (AP)—Sergt. Meyer Levin, the Brooklyn bombardier who flew with the late Capt. Colin P. Kelly and released the bombs which sank the Japanese battleship Haruna off the Philippines last December, has bailed out of another fortress and won a new decoration.
Sergt. Levin, holder of the distinguished flying cross for participation in the bombing attack which cost Capt. Kelly his life and made him a national hero, has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in an attack on Japanese warships May 8 in the Coral Sea battle.
Levin again was in the bombardier's post. On the first run of the fortress over the target, his bomb racks jammed.
But the plane came back for another run through heavy anti-aircraft fire and "eight 500-pound bombs were dropped, bracketing the bow of a 15,000-ton transport and inflicting heavy damage," the citation said.

PIPE HEADED FOR KRUPP

WINFIELD, Kas. (AP)—Among the scrap collected at Winfield recently was a piece of oil field pipe manufactured by the Krupp gun works at Essen, Germany. Ten years ago some American engineers were paid for their work in Germany with the Krupp pipe, which was shipped to the United States. Now it is headed back to Germany with the Krupp address tagged to it, its donor hopes.
Before the war, Switzerland was one of the most highly industrialized countries in Europe, with only Great Britain and the United States a relatively greater industrial population.

1 cup washed, raw rice 2 3/4 teaspoons salt
8 cups boiling water cut onion
3 tablespoons melted butter
or other shortening
1/2 cup Pet Milk

1 1/2 cups grated American cheese or
1/2 cup sliced, packaged cheddar
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Cook rice until tender in boiling water and 2
teaspoons salt. Drain and rinse with hot water.
Grease an 8 1/2-inch ring mold. Cook onion
slowly for 10 minutes in melted butter. Add
milk, cheese, remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt and
the pepper. Cook very slowly until cheese is
melted. Then add cooked rice and heat thor-
oughly. Pack into greased ring mold. Keep
warm. Turn out and fill center with Creamed
Green Beans (See below). Serve at once. If
desired, garnish outer edge of ring with thin
slices of carrot, cut crosswise then halved.
Serves 6.

Notes: The rice mixture may also be packed in
a greased loaf pan, then turned out and the
creamed vegetable arranged around it.

Creamed Green Beans

3 cups green beans, 1 1/2 tablespoons
freshly cooked, or butter or other
conard shortening

3/4 cup liquid oil 3 tablespoons flour
green beans 2 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper 3/4 cup Pet Milk

Drain green beans and save liquid. Melt butter
in saucepan. Blend in flour, salt and pepper.
Stir in slowly 3/4 cup liquid off green beans.
Boil 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Stir in
milk. Then add drained green beans and heat
thoroughly, but do not boil. Serve at once in
center of Golden Rice Ring (See above).
