# Red Army Beats Back Fierce Infantry And Tank Drives On Lines

Cold, wind-swept rains drenched the ruins of Stalingrad in a foretaste of winter Tuesday as Red Army headquarters reported that the Russians had beaten off fierce tank and infantry assaults to hold their lines unbroken for the past 36 hours.

Dispatches to Red Star said autumnal storms, striking down from the north across the steppes of the Don-Volga corridor, grounded the aerial support of German troops and made the going harder.





Japan conceded that victory was still far out of sight in the Battle of the Pacific Tuesday as American warships were officially reported to have thundered into action against enemy forces on Guadalcanal Island in the lower Solomons.

The Navy in Washington disclosed that heavy United States Naval units, boldly challenging a powerful Japanese sea armada, suddenly reappeared in the Guadalcanal battle theater Oct. 17 and effectively bombarded Japanese positions on the northwest section of the island.

## Machinery Already World War II Vets

By Jack Stinnett WASHINGTON. - The United States has had its share of wars but this is the first one it ever went into with the overall machin-ery already running for taking care of the veterans who emerge from

At last report, nearly two months ago, the Veterans Administration had received for hospitalization (presumably men who would not be fit to resume service after short periods in Army or Navy hospitals) 862 veterans of World War II. It is a safe guess that now the numbere is well over 1,000. Huge Task Ahead

The size of the Veterans Administration task ahead may be guessed from this statement in the Congressional "Handbook for Service Personnel of World War II" "If the number of veterans of the present war should be approximately the same as for World War I and the benefits provided for them about the same as those granted other veterans under present legis-lation, the total cost for all veterans and their dependents would be about \$2,000,000,000 a year."


