Then there had to be rationing.

Logic and frequent warnings made it clear that coffee and tea were going to be scarce. The more we hoarded, the quicker the shortage would become acute. Some played the game and bought as usual. The majority started hoarding.

Under rationing, the limited supply is divided equitably among potential users. Each is entitled to buy his just share and no more.

AUSTIN. (P)—A suit involving oil proration orders in a West Texas field including approximately 16,500 producing acres was taken under consideration by the Supreme Court Wednesday because of "the importance of the questions involved."

The original suit attacked certain railroad commission orders issued since March, 1941, and involved alleged cross-line drainage of oil and gas in the lush McElroy field in Upton and Crane counties. An estimated seven to 12 million barrels was allegedly drained to the northern part of the field where a pressure link has been created. A trial court had permanently en-

joined the commission from interfering with the production of 35,-000 barrels daily from the area, and held that the order granting an allowable of 6,500 barrels daily was confiscatory and void.







Recently I have put it to four distinguished generals, one American and three British that the Fuehrer's back already is broken. Every one agreed. I'd like to tell you their names but it is precisely because they knew their identities would not be disclosed that they spoke

Now, don't get the idea that I say the war is over. It isn't by a damned sight. Hitler is on his way out but he still has all the ferocity and fighting strength of a corner-

Two Thoughts We have bloody days before us The Allies will suffer defeats and disappointments before we are through. The rat still has to be clubbed into submission. But in the view of many experts, that dirty but satisfying job can be done by perhaps a year from now if we approach it rightly

The prediction that Hitler would be rendered vulnerable to a death thrust if he arrived at his present state by the end of the year was based on two thoughts:

1. Lacking fresh resources and strategical bases which would go with them, he would be unable to repair the colossal damage suffered in Russia.

Meantime, the United States and Britain would have been piling up strength and would be able to jump on him in his weakness.

Well, the first condition seems fulfilled. Upon fulfillment of the second condition depends whether we may be able to beat the Nazi anti-Christ by, say, next fall or whether the war will drag on interminably. Everything depends on the speed with which we act and the manner in which we attack.







#### Requirements For Gasoline Ration **Books Outlined**

DALLAS. - Regional Office of Price Administration officials have outlined basic requirements for obtaining gasoline rationing books and urge passenger car owners who possess more than five tires for each car to sell their excess casings to the government in order to qualify early for their "A" books.

OPA officials emphasized that persons owning more than five pas-senger car tires will be denied the basic A book when registration time rolls around on November 9. The Railway Express office in each city is the receiving station for surplus tires. Receipts are given for turnedin tires with government checks to be mailed to the owners.

Application forms for basic rations will be available about October 27 and registration for A books will take place in school houses beginning Nov. 9, officials

Must List Tires

How completely rationing has been integrated with tire conservation will become apparent to car owners as soon as they get their application forms. These will consist of a mileage ration application blank and a tire inspection report sheet. While the mileage ration form will be similar to the one fill-ed out recently by A book applicants in the Eastern area, it will require a list of the serial numbers of all tires which the applicant owns. The tire inspection report sheet which also will carry his tire serial numbers, will be returned to




