Shirley Howard, about 30 years old, a route salesman for the Southern Ice Company, was in the Midland County jail Monday charged with murder in connection with the slaving Sunday evening of James A. Whittenton, 57-year-old custodian at South Ward School

A bullet from a 22-caliber rifle struck Whittenton in the neck about 6:15 p. m. Sunday. The shooting occurred in front of the ice plant on South Main street.

THE WAR By DEWITT MACKENZIE

(This column, conducted as a daily feature by DeWitt Mac-Kenzie, is written Monday by Glenn Babb. MacKenzie, now touring the war zones, is traveling.)

Adolf Hitler returned Sunday night to the scene of his Munich Beer Hall Putsch, the ignominous flop that introduced his nightmarish career to a still unsuspecting world. The occasion was a redolent of failure as the event of 19 years ago it celebrated. The gloom through which the Fuehrer exhorted his old guard was far deeper and soul chilling than that of the November night. It was a Wagnerian gloom, in keeping with the fuehrer's tastes and prospects.

For Hitler spoke against the background of the first disaster of German arms in this war and the announcement that the Yanks really had come back to finish what was left unfinished in 1918. Rommel, the general who only six short weeks ago was basking in the Hitlerian smile in Berlin, was fleeing into Libya, abandoning his allies in a manner that will go far to destroy what little stomach remains in Italy for the Axis alliance and the war in general. A great American Army once more was operating in the Old World, recalling the summer days of 1918 when Pershing's raw divisions entered the Allied lines that held, then hurled

Swedish-German Commerce

New light is thrown upon the controversial topic of Sweden's wartime trade with Germany by figures compiled by Tidningarnas Telegrambyra, leading Swedish news agency.

Accepting these at face value, which there is no apparent reason not to do, it would not seem that the Scandinavian neutral is giving a great deal of real aid to the Nazis, nothwithstanding the precarious position in which her geographical location and her relative weakness have placed her.

Sweden is getting more commodities from Germany than she is exporting to the Reich, measured in money. But Swedish imports include dividends, amortization, and other non-trade items. So it is not possible, from the data presented, to get a completely accurate picture of what is happening.

As far as can be told, however, Sweden is sending less iron ore to Germany this year than in any year since 1937, and less than the Reich has the right to ask under current trade agreements.

Lumber and pulp and paper are going to Germany at less than a third of the average rate for the decade preceding the war. No arms or munitions are being sent. The export of charcoal pig iron has increased.

Wollmar F. Bostrom, Swedish minister to the United States, points out that Germany is sending seven times the overall value of iron and steel products to Sweden that she is getting from Sweden.

It would be silly to suppose that Hitler is showing generosity to his little neighbor. If the exchange appears to be against him, this is only superficial.
