

Take another look at the 1942 Christmas seals. They have a new meaning now, a martial meaning. Little though they are, they have a place among planes, ships, tanks and jeeps.

We must learn what to do to protect ourselves against tuberculosis. We must heed the warnings of the association that long hours of work, poor nutrition, insufficient rest and relaxation may lower the body's resistance to the tubercle bacillus, thus allowing active tuberculosis to develop.
