The Tonn Garage is moving along nicely under local contractor N. G. Gilstrap and will soon be ready for the machinery. This will be one of the biggest and most up-to-date garages in the section of the State.

J. A. Gilstrap Dr. D. L. Cummins and Otto Johnson homes are going up rapidly and will soon be complete. So many new homes have been erected in the city in the past few months that it has been impossible to keep track of them, but Haskell is growing and going forward. Watch her smoke.

In connection with the free barbecue and picnic, plans are under way to secure automobile races for the afternoon and if this feature can be worked out it is probable that many of the nationally known racers who have entered the Abilene race meet on the 5th will take part in the races here.

## Governor Names Delegate to Nat'l Good Roads Meet

Ferguson, as a delegate to the United States Good Roads Assn., annual session, to be held at Santa Monica, California, June 7 to 12. One of the main topics to be discussed at this meeting will be that of additional Federal aid for State and National highways, according to the program issued by Director General J. A. Rountree, who has moved his headquarters from Birmingham Ala., to Santa Monica California until the meeting closes.

## SUMMER SCHOOL TO OPEN HERE MONDAY

A six weeks summer school will open at the Haskell High School at eight o'clock, Monday May 31st. The faculty will be composed of H. D. Neff Superintendent of the City Schools, M. B. Lebo, Principal of the City Schools, and Miss LaVerne Cummins who taught English in the Haskell High School in 1924-25 and who has taught English in the Fort Worth City Schools this year. Superintendent Neff will teach typewriting and bookkeeping, Mr. Lebo will teach mathematics and science, and Miss Cummins will teach History and English. If there is sufficient demand, fifth, sixth and seventh grade English and Arithmetic will be taught.

Standard affiliated work will be done in all subjects, the same type of work and the same amount as that of the regular term. It is possible for a student to earn as much as two units credit. It is advisable, however, for all except the stronger students to register for less than the maximum.

## LOCAL TIN SHOP TURNS OUT BIG JOB FOR GIN

Jones and Son tin shop of Haskell has completed a full set of dust and lint flues for the Swift Gin Company at Peacock and they will be ready for shipment Friday morning. This work has been going to the larger cities of the south until Jones and Son put in their plant here a few years ago. They are doing a great deal of this work for the gins over West Texas and they have other big contracts waiting them in the near future. Last year they were kept busy the entire summer and this year promises more business for them. All their work last year stood the test which will greatly aid to their output this year.

## 33 INDICTMENTS BY GRAND JURY

We have been in session 8 days and have examined 192 witnesses and have presented bills of indictment in all cases where we thought the evidence warranted the same. We have returned and presented 24 bills of indictment charging felonies and 9 bills of indictment presenting misdemeanors. # The Poultry Industry In This Section

By W. M. Free.

Success with late hatched chickens depends on the person, place, equipment, and the condition of the flock. If one has a large flock of early chicks and the hens have been steady laying for a long time so that they are pretty much run down and the males are out of condition and the chicks will be forced to run on the same ground that the older ones have occupied, it will not pay for under such conditions those hatched after May, even if they should reach maturity, are not likely to ever be worth very much, either for the market or the table because a stunted chicken invariably makes a tough fryer.

J. O. Jackson of the Pinkerton community 10 miles northwest of this city is a pioneer poultry man of Haskell county. He was among the first men of this section to begin in the poultry industry and prove that poultry pays. He keeps books on his flocks and knows that he is realizing a profit. Therefore he is not in a guessing contest with himself. He has been careful

not to expand beyond control in the business and his profits have been gratifying. From a flock of 173 White Leghorn hens he has sold \$436.02 worth of eggs for setting and market purposes, during the past four months, realizing more than \$100.00 per month. Enough eggs were used by Mr. Jackson for the family needs and for setting purposes to maintain his own flocks to have made the gross receipts for the four months exceed the \$500 mark. The commercial feed used only cost him \$80.00 for the four months and \$20 worth of maize heads brings the total feed bill to \$100.00 making a profit for his care and housing of \$336.02 besides the eggs used by him for the family needs and setting purposes for his own flock. There is nothing that will pay a better investment than poultry looked after and cared for, besides the pleasure enjoyed along with the profits. He has 132 pullets that were hatched off February the 26th which are now shaping into hens to take the place of some of the older hens of the flock which he expects to market this winter. He also has a number of young birds which were recently hatched and with all his young birds on the yard he expects to increase his layers to above 200 select birds. In addition to the profit derived from his poultry he is milking two registered Jersey cows that is netting him in the sale of cream more than \$20.00 per month. He has three fine hogs for his meat another year and has the finest patch of Dew Berries in all the country. He has a number of good farms which pay good dividends but he likes the poultry business and is in it for both pleasure and profit.

Mrs. G. E. Davis of Dennis Chapel sends in a statement regarding her flock of Buff Orpingtons which we are glad to give space in our poultry column in the Free Press. We are pleased to always have our poultry raisers write the articles themselves, this makes the information first hand and it is generally better understood and appreciated by our readers. Mrs. Davis begins her letter by stating, "I have 90 Buff Orpington hens and I believe they are going beyond my expectations in egg production. I have kept account of their eggs beginning January the 1st 1925, until May 1st 1926. The feed cost me \$75 and I have sold fliers, hens and roosters from my flock during that time to the amount of \$347.43 making a net profit of \$272.43 plus a sale of the day this letter was written of \$3.50 which makes a total of \$275.93, after the cost of the feed is deducted. Signed Mrs. G. E. Davis. NOTE:—This is an excellent profit realized from this flock of 90 hens. Mrs. Davis takes good care of her flock and gives them plenty of good wholesome feed and she has the pleasure of seeing the profits pile up from her poultry project.

Ben F. Roberts who conducts a feed store in the Mule Barn south of the square keeps a large flock of laying hens and last week he sold two cases of eggs from his flock which totaled about \$12.00 per week according to Mr. Roberts his flock gives him very little trouble and pays him a nice profit over their feed and care. He keeps these hens at the barn in the city.

Mr. and Mrs. Will Chastain of the Midway community who in the past were successful turkey growers and Mr. Chastain was secretary of the Turkey Growers Association for a number of years, but now they have changed from

the growing of turkey to White Leghorn hens for egg farming and they now have 200 laying hens which are paying their way and buying groceries for the family. They have about 400 baby chicks of the M. Johnson Strain and they are growing nicely. They are making the effort for 500 or more laying hens for next season. They have two good hogs for their meat. With the products of these good layers they will succeed living at home and boarding at the same place next year.

J. T. West is a good farmer living on the old Sam Vernon place in the Pinkerton community. He has for the past few years been breeding the Buff Wyandottes, but he is now changing his breed to White Leghorns for egg farming and has a number of grown hens and large bunch of baby chicks from which he expects to produce his layers for next year. Mr. West has good fixtures and is feeding commercial feed to his flock.

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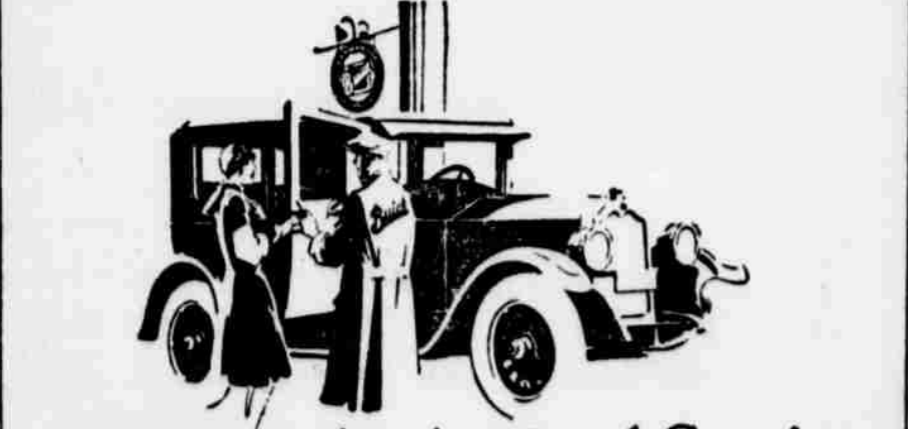

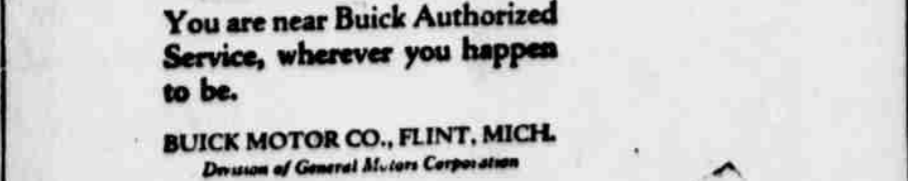

**POISON THE GRASSHOPPER!**

Formula recommended by the Extension Service, A. & M. College and the County Agent:

WHEAT BRAN (avoid Shorts)	25 pounds.
WHITE ARSENIC (or Paris Green)	1 pound.
AMYL ACETATE	1 ounce.
CANE MOLASSES (avoid cane syrup)	2 quarts.

Thoroughly mix the poison and bran dry. Dilute the molasses and amyl acetate with about two gallons of water and thoroughly mix with the bran-arsenic mixture. Add more water and mix, until a thoroughly wet mash has been obtained, yet not sloppy. Sow in pieces not larger than little finger nail, in feeding ground of the grasshoppers. Scatter well.
