## Halt Most Enlistments

## Germans Fail To Break Allies Lines

## Reinforcements Are Rushed Into Battle To Crush Axis Troops

By Gayle Talbor Associated Press War Editor

Although German armored forces have launched three heavy counter-attacks in the last four days and have thrown Anglo-American troops back out of two hotly-contested Tunisian towns, they have failed to break the Allied cordon being drawn around them, Allied headquarters announced Saturday.

Heavy Allied reinforcements were reported rushing into the battle to bring an overwhelming weight of tanks, men, planes and guns against the comparatively small but fiercely resisting Axis force defending Tunis and Bizerte.

In at least three German attempts to break out of the Allied cordon in the last four days they loss 33 of their dwindling supply of tanks and an Allied spokesman said Lieut. Gen. K. A. N. Anderson's invading forces still held all vital roads and communications in the fluid battle zone between Tunis and Bizerte.

bombers, Nazi infantry and tank columns were acknowledged to have thrown the Allies back out of Djedelda, 12 miles from Tunis, and to have re-entered Tebourba, another hotly contested town, but the importance of this hard-won gain was discounted by Allied headquar-

Allies Rush Reinfercements In such tank battles as are raging along the mountainous front between Djedeida and Mateur, 25 miles south of Bizerte, the occupa tion of a few villages was said to be of slight importance. The fact that the Allies still controlled the heights above Tabourba and had thrown back the Axis counter-thrusts after comparatively brief gains was the significant thing, a spokesman declared.

Heavy Allied reinforcements were reported being rushed into the battle as fast as the Tunisian trails would permit, and reliable military quarters felt there was little doubt that Lieut. Gen. Dwight D. Eisen hower soon would be able to bring a crushing weight of men, tanks, guns and planes against the comparatively small Axis force opposing

An Allied communique said that "heavy fighting" continued in the Tebourba area, with ceaseless air battles raging overhead as the Allies threw every available bomber and fighter into the area in an effort to chop down an initial Axis aerial superiority. 



WASHINGTON-(AP)-Voluntary enlistments in the Armed Forces were stopped by President Roosevelt Saturday, except in special cases, and the Army and Navy were told to get their recruits hence-forth through the Selective Service system, which was placed under Paul V. McNutt.

At the same time the War Department called a halt to the induction of all men over 38 and opened the way for the honorable discharge of such men already in service if they can serve the war effort better as

WASHINGTON - (A) - President Roosevelt's Executive order on manpower Saturday contained 13 points, as follows:

.1 The War Manpower Commission shall consist of a chairman and one representative of each of various government departments.
2. The "functions, powers, duties funds" of the Selective Service Sys-tem are transferred to the Man-power Commission.

The Secretaries of War and the Navy, consulting with the Commission Chairman, Paul V. McNutt shall determine each month the manpower requirements of the Armed Forces and McNutt shall furnish the men through selective

Voluntary enlistments by men

18 to 38 are halted.

5. Insofar as prosecution of the war requires it, all war workers shall be hired through the United States Employment Service, and no employer shall retain a worker who may be needed more urgently in a more essential occupation.

6. Training programs of the Army and Navy and the WAACS conducted in Non-Federal institutions shall conform to McNutt's

7. McNutt shall issue orders necessary to carry out the directive, take steps to prevent and relieve hardships and inequities and es-tablish procedures for appeals. 8. McNutt may act through such

officers and agents "and in such manner as he shall determine."
9. Other executive departments, subject to appeal to the President

10. McNutt shall appoint a man-agement-labor committee and con-foreign countries are wanted espe-11. McNutt shall be a member of

All prior orders conflicting with the new one are made to conform. All prior Selective Service rulings shall remain in effect except where they conflict with the order or except as McNutt may later change them.

13. The order takes effect immediately.

Approximately 70 volunteer wotheir neighbors in a house to house campaign to explain the government's "Share the Meat for Victory" program and to solicit full support and cooperation of all families in a nation-wide program to assure adequate meat supplies for all civilians.

The program, designed to acquaint family heads with the wise use of America's meat supply as a prime war measure, is being conducted here under the direction of the Midland County Nutrition Committee of which Mrs. A. P. Shirey is chairman. Other members are Miss Alpha Lynn, Mrs. T. M. Roper, Miss Verona Lambert and Miss Iva Butler.

OCD Plans Program The city has been divided into precincts, zones, sectors and blocks, with chairmen and assistant chairmen to direct the canvass in each precinct. Block workers will call on their neighbors, with no worker to be assigned more than 24 houses. Workers have completed a special course of training for the

The canvass is being made at the request of the government, with the state and county nutrition committees, in cooperation with the Office of Civilian Defense, planning and executing the program.

Plans call for the completion of the canvass in one day, but it will be continued Tuesday if necessary. Sponsors urge full cooperation of all citizens in the important mis-

Cooperation of each family will be solicited in a friendly and cooperative spirit. Each housewife will be handed a copy of a meat information leaflet, containing, among other things, a meat chart to be used in


