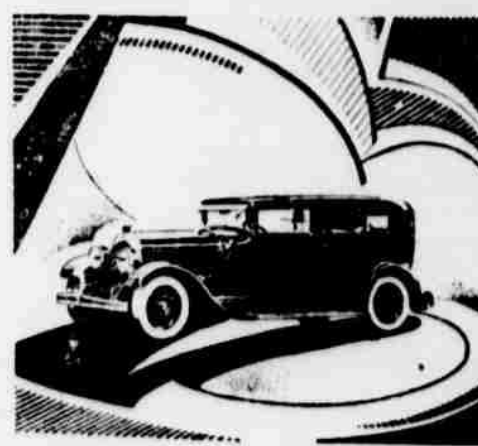

you that when asked about it. These are continually making improvements in the business and residential sections and the growth is steady and sure. This city is making plans for a great future. Watch her smoke.

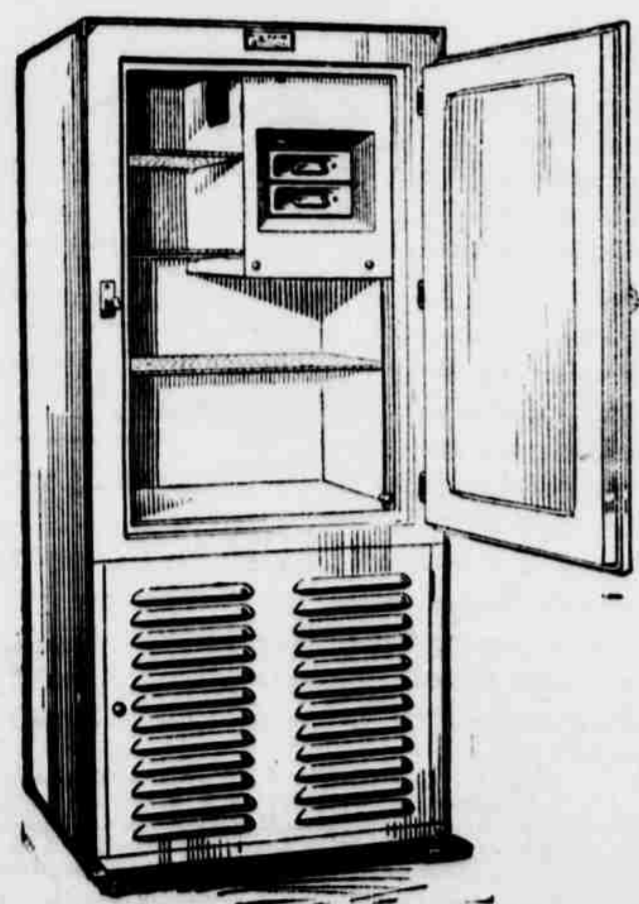
Sagerton.

A number of residences and other improvements are visible and according to a number of citizens they have struck a well of good water in the edge of the city which will furnish the town in a bountiful supply at the present. Sagerton has had much trouble in getting water until this well was located. One hundred hales of cotton were being shipped from the cotton yard while we were in the city. Some of the boys remarked that they did not need the money but wished to get the cotton out of the way of the new crop which will soon be planted. Sagerton has the prospect of natural gas. But as long as Dave Gunn, N. E. Martin, L. A. Weidelson and Frank Piley are citizens they will have plenty of original gas to run the town and gas every man who remains in the town any length of time. The next time we enter this town when these fellows are congregated we will see about getting a good mask, yes, the kind they used in France.

We drove home arriving here at 6:30 having gone over quite a bit of the country noting the crop prospects and the conditions generally. We saw quite a lot of maize coming up nicely, some of the small grain was still green and would make with rain soon. The grain in other parts was gone and the farmers were pasturing it with their stock. We noted some nice corn up to a good stand near Sagerton, and every where the farmers have their plowing well under way.

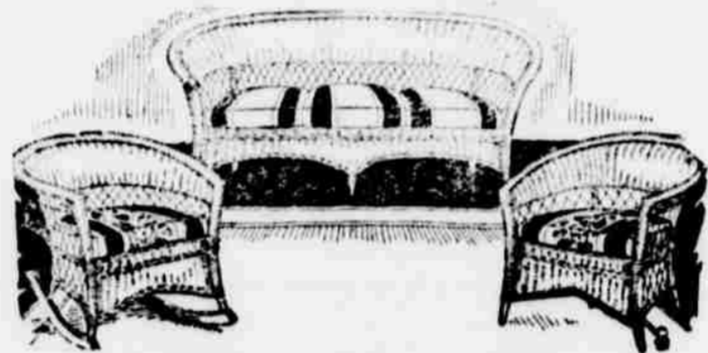

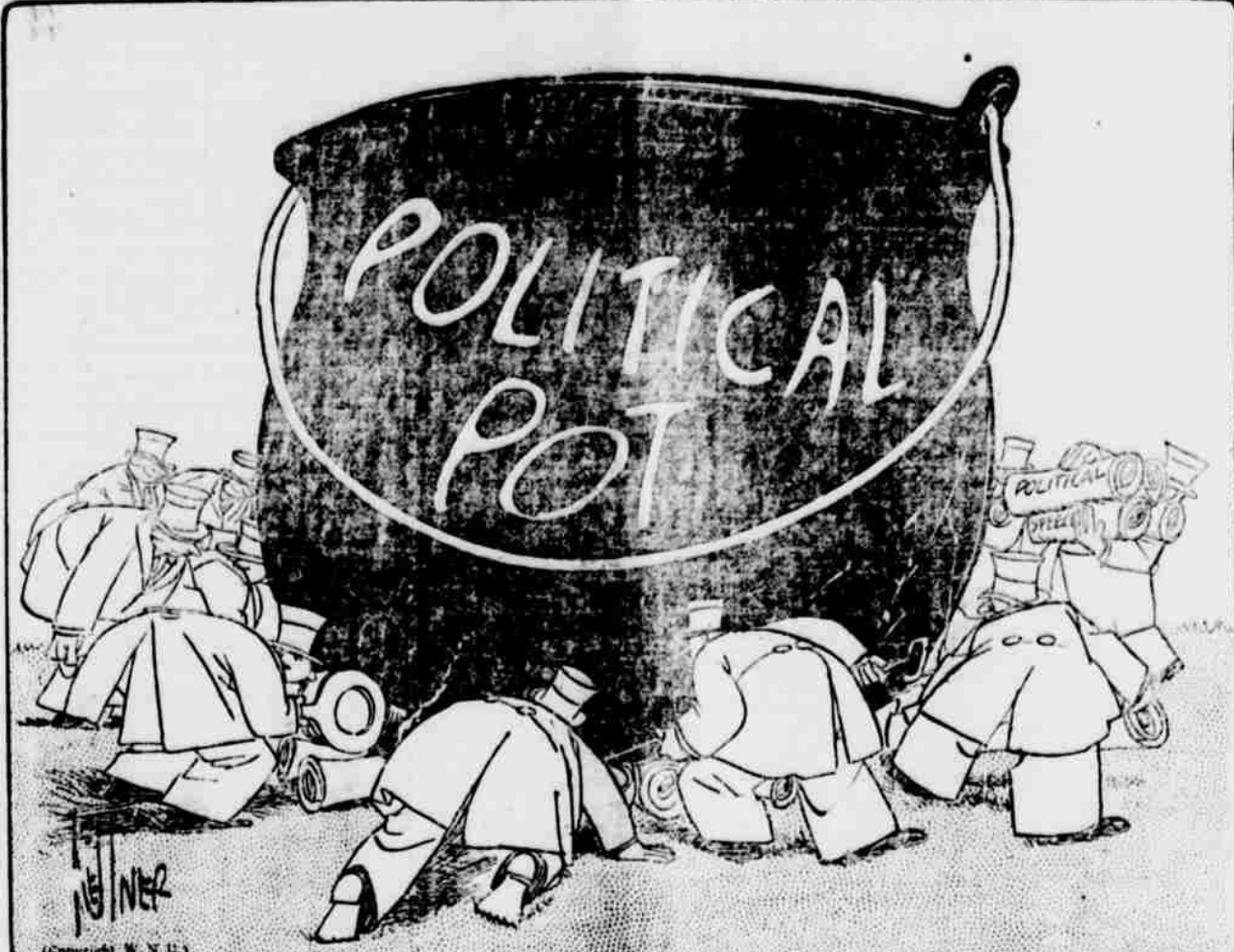
