RAF Again Hits Berlin

Red Army Offensive On Voronezh Front Makes New Progress

MOSCOW-(AP)—The Red Army's new offensive on the Voronezh front, most northerly of the series of winter blows against the whole Axis position in the southwest, was making new progress Monday 50 miles west of the Don along the railway to Kupyansk and Kharkov.

Front dispatches said the German lines were being rolled back by slashing attacks against garrisons in fortified cities, towns and villages. The direction of the main thrust was toward the southwest, aimed at the Ukraine and Kharkov.

Between the Don and the new front line at least one full German division was declared virtually encircled and being driven from the rear eastward.

Sunday Night Raid Made In Force As Eighth Army Gains,

Big British bombers rained destruction upon Berlin Sunday night for the second time in a row in raids which gave the Nazi capital its worst weekend of the war and made two German aerial counter-thrusts at London

And as the Germans counted their dead and viewed their ruins, the Allies pounded grimly on with land offensives which shook the Axis positions in North Africa and Southern Russia.

Hard on the heels of retreating Axis forces in Africa, the British Eighth Army was reported within 100 miles of Tripoli in a new drive which cracked Marshal Rommel's defenses again and threatened to by-pass his next coastal strongpoints.

The Red Army closed in on Rostov from three sides and stabbed to 118 miles of Kharkov, the all-important Donets Valley base in the Ukrane from which the Germans launched their whole 1942 summer and fall drive into the Don Bend and the Caucasus.

Our Secret Weapon

There no longer is much mystery about the "secret weapon" credited with tipping the scales against Old Fox Rommel in Egypt and opening the way to important United Nations successes south of the Mediterranean.

Words and pictures have described the high velocity 105 millimeter gun mounted on a fast N-3 chassis which blasted the Nazis' tanks out of the way and enabled Montgomery's British to sweep westward toward a junction with our own expeditionary forces.

Our tank buster can travel. faster than any PZ (Panzer) 3 or PZ 4 in Africa. Its gun projects a shell which can pierce the armor of any tank in existence. American ordnance experts say that if a tank were armored heavily enough to resist those projectiles it would require a concrete runway on which to travel and therefore would be useless under battle conditions.

These things are important. Because we have such a weapon and the Nazis do not, we enjoy an advantage which Anglo-American initiative undoubtedly is exploit-


