Billions For Victory

It is Congress' privilege and duty to decide how \$51,000,000,000 can be extracted annually out of a national income that was \$114,000,000,000 last year and may reach a peak of \$145,000,000,000 for the calendar

The Treasury of course will make suggestions. On the record, a spending tax starting at 20 per cent and working up to 85 per cent is exepected to be proposed. Expenditures for basic necessities would be exempt from the tax. Ten per cent would be considered as savings, refundable after the war.

This is what Secretary Morgenthau proposed to the Senate last September, at which time the scheme was rejected as being too complicated. Treasury spokesmen have been talking up the idea ever since, and it is taken for granted that Morgenthau will bring his baby back this winter, perhaps with some new makeup to change its appearance a bit.

There also will be agitation for a forthright sales tax of perhaps 10 per cent. Chairman George of the Senate finance committee would increase the Victory Tax to 10 per cent and extend it to include corporations.

to be eminently simple, workable, and as productive as the paying ability of the nation's taxpayers can be made to stand. That is the idea of putting everything but the kitchen sink into a straightforward pay-as-you-earn income tax bill.

The merits of the income tax seldom are questioned. It is the one tax based on ability to pay. It could easily be redesigned to remove inequities accumulated over the past quarter-century. The rates can be manipulated without change in the machinery.

Unquestionably the income tax had about reached watch Horse Racing its limits until the pay-as-you-earn principle was suggested and found immediate general favor.

With the two wedded and tax rates fixed at such levels as would produce the necessary revenue, this one all-inclusive tax could be substituted for the present oner-

There would still reman estate taxes, gift taxes, customs, presumably at least some excise taxes (though there might be a question why) and Social Security taxes.

Perhaps this idea is not as common sensible as it looks. But with all the schemes that are floating around, isn't it worthy of consideration?
