



"I bought two settings of eggs from my uncle, Andrew Josselet of the How- Mullins ard community last year. He is an experienced breeder of Rhode Island Prichard Reds and I liked the breed and so I began with the reds. I set the eggs under hens. I made my first setting on March the 5th last year. From the 15 Alfred eggs 12 chicks were hatched. The hen killed one in the nest, but I raised the others to be grown. My best cockerel er of this bunch got an injury in a fight which caused chicken pox from which he died, but the other cockerel of the two made a fine bird and I still have him on my poultry yard. I set my next hen three weeks later on March the 26th. This hen hatched 9 chickens and two of them died. All my chickens grew off nicely and I fed them butter. milk, startena and at the end of three weeks I began to gradually change to grain food mixing it my self and giving them a mash which kept them healthy and growing nicely.

About a month ago I culled my pullets and penned only the best. bought a fine cockerel from a reliable breeder and placed in the pen with the pullets to head my flock and now I am selling setting eggs at a fancy price. I only have 8 pullets in my pen and I get from five to eight eggs daily have 65 eggs setting which will hatch by the time this is in print. I expect to raise show birds this year for the Haskell County and other fairs over the state. I have gutten 158 eggs the first 33 days from my per and I know that" I am keeping them pure and expect great results from my birds. Yours for better poultry


