**Raid Sets** 

LONDON -(AP RAF, continuing the nonstop Allied aerial offensive against western Europe, bombed Berlin and targets in Western Germany Monday night in raids from which 19 planes failed to return, the Air Ministry announced Tuesday.

"Berlin got it heavier Monday night than it has ever had so far," Capt. Harold Balfour, undersecretary of state for air. declared.

It was at first estimated that about 1,000 tons of bombs fell on the German capital in half an hour. It was authoritatively reported later that the weight of bombs hitting Berlin last night was prob ably twice as great-about 900 tons -as the top load dropped on London in any one night by the German air force.

The communique said that Britain's biggest bombers-Lancasters. Halifaxes and Stirlings-took part in the raid.





### Vincimo

For a long time Premier Mussolini's newspaper, II Popolo d'Italia, carried the slogan "Vinceremmo," which means "We will win." Italian-speaking friends say that if II Duce had been expressing mere confidence-telling in slogan form what inevitably was going to happen—he would have written "Vincimo," which means "We shall win."

The dictator must have had misgivings. For instead of stating a simple "fact," perhaps unconsciously he said in effect: "We are going to try to win."

Now, suddenly, II Popolo has switched to the new slogan "Non Vinceranno," which means "They shall not Questions And Answers Concerning win." Again the form expressing determination, rather than a calm, dispassionate statement of what II Duce Nation's New Point Ration Plan would like to believe.



## Transfer Of British Bases To U.S. To Be Proposed By Senator Tydings

No Lavender?

WASHINGTON -(AP)-Pe transfer to the United States of western hemisphere bases leased from the British will be proposed when the Senate takes up legislation to continue the lend lease program for another year, Senator Tydings (D-Md) said Tuesday.

Tydings said he is attempting to draft an amendment which would pave the way for immediate negotiations with the British to obtain permanent title to the bases, which were leased to the United States in exchange for 50 over-age destroyers before this country entered the war,

"I think we ought to be making some move now to obtain the bases that we will need in the future in repayment for the billions in equipment and supplies we are pouring out to other nations," the Maryland senator told reporters.

President Roosevelt's indication that an exploratory United Nations conference on pot-war food supplies might be held sometime this spring points up consideration of how this critical problem of feeding Europe is to be handled this time.

Relief for Europe cost the United States \$2.3 billion after the last war. The \$300 million was private funds-Red Cross, Quakers, Near East Relief and the like. The \$2 billion was government money, and the U.S. contribution represented approximately 85 per cent of all the relief handed out, the remaining 15 per cent coming from Great Britain and other countries.

Theoretically, this \$2 hillion worth of food relief was sold. The ex-enemy countries had to nav cash and did huy about \$500 million worth of surplus American wheat for which farmers had been paid \$2 a bushel by act of Congress

Liberated countries and the allied nations that needed relief out food on credit and that added about \$1.4 hillion to the war debts which were never collected, so in the long run that nost-war relief was pretty much of a oift
