ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA-(AP)—United States patrols were in contact with the Germans Thursday three miles from Faid Pass, the jumping-off point for Marshal Rommel's abortive February offensive, and his surviving armored units were reported massing in the Mareth Line area to the south against the mounting threat from the British Eighth Army.

Allied airmen turned their bombers against transport and fortifications of the Mareth Line area in an offensive which also embraced attacks upon six Tunisian airdromes of the Axis.

Armada Is Wiped

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA—(AP) —An entire convoy of 22 Japanese ships, including 10 cruisers or destroyers, has been virtually annihilated in the Bismarck Sea and 15,000 Japanese warriors bound for the battlefields of New Guinea have been wiped out "almost to a man" by airmen of the Southwest Pacific command, an Allied communique announced proudly Thurs-

The amazing victory was achieved at the cost of only three Allied fighters and one bomber, while 55 Japanese planes protecting the powerful aramada were shot out of the fight and many others damaged. Thirty-three of the 55 were listed as certainly,*destroyed and 22 as "prob-

ables." In addition to the 15,000 ground troops killed or drowned in the furious Allied onslaught several thousand Japanese naval personnel probably lost their lives, a Raid Germany spokesman said.

A Marxist Turns Realist

Post-war planners should not miss Arthur Koestler's article in a recent New York Times Magazine. They need not accept what he says merely because he has said it. But the views which he expresses do have weight because of their source.

Koestler, 'a "leftist intellectual," has changed his mind about why the United Nations are fighting and what the now occupied countries want after the war.

Like others of his school, he had thought that we were fighting for generality known as "democracy" and against a generality known as "fascism." He had regarded this as a struggle for a new world that would be "liberal" in the Marx-Engel sense of that many-faceted adjective.

clearer the character of the war reveals itself as what the Tories always said it was—a war for national survival, a war in defense of certain conservative 19th century ideals, and not what I and my friends of the Left said it was a revolutionary civil war in Europe on the Spanish and Roosevelt.

Koestler is grieved about this. Already the barrage of dead cats has begun flying in his direction, the belittling charges that he is just a "tired Liberal," a defeatist. But in any event he is not a renegade. He just faces what he believes, sorrowfully, are facts.

Another way of thinking at the situation is that we really are fighting for democracy—not the intangible generality, but the specific benefits. After looking over the alternatives, we have reassured ourselves that, with all its faults, we prefer this capitalistic system to Marxism.

We are fighting for our countries. Even the Russians now concede that their magnificent struggle is for Russia, and not for the Red version of totalitarianism. The Germans are fighting for a greater Reich, not for the principles of Negres T. McIntire, surbles of Negr ples of Nazism.

Yet when we of the United Nations win, we shall have enabled democracy and its child, the system of individual enterprise, to survive yet a while longer.

And why not? Democracy promises us what we want. The school of liberalism to which Koestler belonged would have given us what it thought to be best for us. We prefer democracy.


Response To A Plea

of the 20-inch oil products line originally planned from the Houston-Beaumont refining area to Seymour, Ind., threatens Texas' greatest industrial opportunity in history, Commissioner Ernest O Thompson of the Railroad Commission declared Thursday.

Terming the line part of the petroleum lifeline to Europe and Australia, Thompson in an interview stressed that "every day's dolay in its construction possibly postpones our military successes At the same time he emphatically predicted that by 1945 the nation will be "alarmingly short" of oil and that a definite oil famine is inescapable by 1946 usless an immediate crude price increase authorized

Thompson labeled laying of the products line "the most timely issue before the oil industry today for pressing, immediate solution' and criticized midwest refiners and Senators who are advocating that a substitute line be built from the Chicago area to the Atlantic sea-

The line is scheduled to ferry 235,000 barrels daily for transshipment by tank car from Seymour to the East Coast.


