(AP)—U. S. Mitchell bombers raided Marshal Erwin Rommel's positions Sunday in a continuation of the aerial assault intended to soften the Mareth Line for the British Eighth Army's coming push although bad weather almost paralyzed the air war elesewhere in Tunisia.

Spitfires and Warhawks of the western desert air force escorted the Mitchell formations on their missions of destruction and made numerous sweeps independently without interception, military sources said.

Wanted Manpower

Senator Green of Rhode Island, in his defense of the Army's decision to put 8,200,000 men into khaki, called attention to a flaw which is hampering seriously this nation's war effort—the failure to make efficient use of our available manpower.

Even as the semi-official spokesman for the War Department, speaking a piece which the Army had helped prepare, he conceded that we can use and service 8,200,-000 men only if we do away with certain wasteful practices that no politician yet, including Senator Green has dared attack frontally.

These include absenteeism, featherbedding standardof-living workdays, labor hoarding, private and governmental; excessive turnover in personnel, duplication of duties and services, and many lesser evils which, in the aggregate, cost hundreds of thousands of man-hours every

What Hitler does is no guide to what we should do. Nevertheless, those professional friends of Labor who force us to retain some of these wasteful practices might ponder how Hitler handles "undutiful" Germans who think a man still can loaf in the midst of total war. Over there they go to prison for from 10 weeks to six months, the OWI says.

We are not prepared to adopt authoritarian methods. Let's hope that we never are driven to it, either in order to win the war or because we lose the war. But neither are we obliged to tolerate permanently the irresponsibility of shipyard employes who walk out because of the presence of one man, expelled from the union for working at his war job on a holiday.

It would be much less than autoritarian if our government took firm measures to prevent shutdown of construction on a synthetic rubber plant, because of a jurisdictional row over the moving of a power pole a distance of 15 feet. And how about the firm which had to use 18,000

man-days last year answering questionnaires from a dozen government departments and bureaus? There would be no valid argument over the 8,200, 000 man army if these and kindred evils were cured, so

Moral Duty

The Reich is trying to convince Sweden of a moral duty to contribute actively to the war against Russia. Stockholm has received these hints with extreme coldness. The press of Sweden is frank in repudiating any such idea.

"It has always been clearly maintained on the Swedish side that Sweden can not accept any interference with her sovereignty," said the conservative Nya Dagligt Allehanda. "Sweden's neutrality policy implies that Sweden intends to meet with armed force every endeavor to push her into the war on either side. This, and nothing else, is Sweden's moral duty."







Shortage Of Leather May Cut Into **Froduction Of Low-Priced Footwear**

the way things are shaping up it would seem that there may be fewer inexpensive shoes on the market

now that rationing has come. year order was issued, a new type of shoe advertising began. Higher-priced boothries advised the public that it would be wise to buy shoes that cost more but would wear longer. This worried WPB, which "froze" production to the types of shoes formerly manufactured. The ruling would have been effective if applied to the pre-rationing rate of production. But WPB also cut the allocation of leather in half.

So it seems logical that the manufacturer who turned out 100-000 pairs of shoes last year, half of them expensive and half inexpensive, will concentrate on the pairs in 1943. This is likely, anyway, unless the WPB orders him to spread production, proportionate-ly, among the types of shoes he Odds and Ends

Speaking of shoes, OPA doesn't agree with officials who fear that shoe standards will suffer because of leather-allocation cuts. OPA says it still has control over shoe prices, and if shoes don't measure up, prices will be slashed . . . WPB double the amount of wool available for civilian clothing. That will restore wool to peacetime levels. And since there are fewer civilians now, the men and women in mufi will come off better than before. It's another blow at clotheshoarders . . . A foreign correspondent recently returned from London wearing the shortest socks that WPB officials had ever seen. Sight of the anklets started them thinking. And now there's talk that American socks may be similarly cut down to save wool, cotton and rubber for garters.
