### Committee Approves Optometric Measure

AUSTIN —(AP)— Despite opposition from newspaper representatives, the Senate state affairs committee sent to the Senate floor with a favorable vote G. C. Morris' bill amending the statutes regulating optometrists in Texas. Thornton Hall of San Antonio, president of the Texas Newspaper Publishers Association, and William McIntosh, publisher of the San Antonio Light, criticized the bill at a public hearing Wednesday for prohibiting price advertising by optometrists. Morris and Dr. Henry Orangedale of Houston, representing the Texas Optometric Association, spoke for the measure. Dr. Orangedale termed splitting of fees by optometrists immoral and said the bill would prevent this practice.

### Arkansas Governor Is Paying Off Bet

LITTLE ROCK, ARK. —(AP)— Governor Homer M. Adkins of Arkansas is preparing to send ten pounds of Arkansas bauxite to Governor Sam H. Jones of Louisiana. The Arkansas governor wagered the bauxite against ten pounds of Louisiana sulphur plus a quantity of molasses that Arkansas would collect more scrap metal than Louisiana. Governor Jones reported Louisiana collected 108.6 per cent of its quota; Arkansas, 61.3.

### Swedish Meat Balls Spare Ration



**Swedish Meat Balls**  
1 pound ground beef 1 1/2 cups milk  
2 eggs 4 cups corn flakes  
2 tablespoons minced onion 3 tablespoons fat  
1 teaspoon salt 1 cup milk  
1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 tablespoon chopped parsley

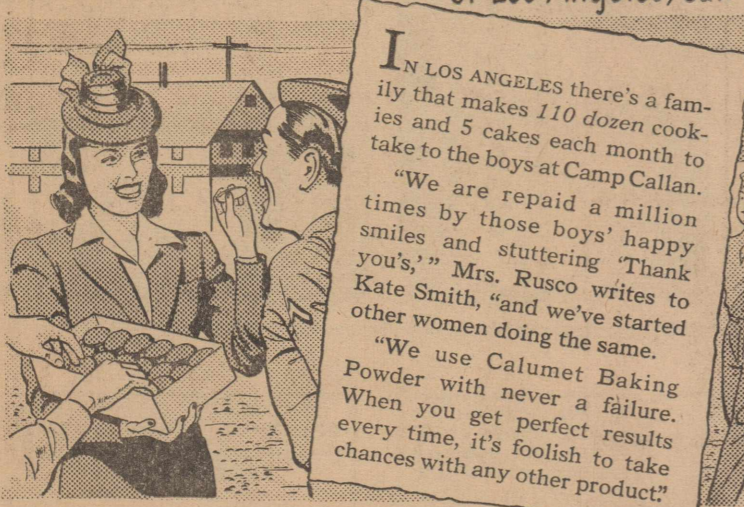
Mix together meat, eggs, onion, seasonings, milk and cornflakes which have been rolled into fine crumbs. Form into balls. Fry slowly in melted fat about 30 minutes, turning only once. Remove from pan. Stir milk into meat drippings; heat; add salt to taste and parsley. Pour over meat balls. Yield: 12 meat balls 2 inches diameter (or 30 meat balls 1 1/2 inches in diameter).

### Meats Go Long Way Prepared Properly

Ration-in-a-Blanket (Serves 4-6)  
One and one-half cups chopped cooked meat, 2-3 cup grated raw carrot, 1 teaspoon grated onion, 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper, 1 1-2 cups meat gravy, 2 cups flour, 3 teaspoons phosphate baking powder, 1-4 cup shortening, 3-4 cup milk.

Combine meat, carrot, onion and Worcestershire sauce; season with salt and pepper. Moisten with about 1-4 cup gravy. Sift together flour, all-phosphate baking powder and 1-2 teaspoon salt; cut in shortening. Add milk, mixing to form soft dough. Divide dough in half; pat out one half into round 8 inches in diameter on baking sheet. Spread meat mixture on biscuit round; pat out other round. Place on meat mixture. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) 30 minutes, or until well browned. Cut in wedges and serve with hot gravy.

Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 18 to 20 minutes, or until done. Each half makes 12 medium cup cakes or bars.

**Steak**  
One-half pound round steak chopped, 1 small onion, chopped, 1-2 teaspoon dry mustard, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, salt, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 4 cups cooked kidney beans, 1-4 cup coarse bread crumbs. Mash round steak with fork; cook in fat until lightly browned. Remove from pan. Pour off excess fat, reserving 2 tablespoons to blend with bread crumb topping. LUBBOCK —(AP)— The department of textile engineering at Texas Technological College, in cooperation with the cotton research committee of Texas, is conducting research work in cotton fabrics to meet the growing needs of wartime textile industry. Several products, in the manufacture of which cotton is used to a large extent, have been developed for replacing steel, certain types of leather, plywood and paper in many industrial applications.

Parsons, head of the department of textile engineering at Texas Tech, and conducted by Milton Simmons, research assistant of the Texas cotton research committee, is primarily concerned with creating new industrial cotton products by application of synthetic resins to cotton fibers, yarn and fabrics.
