"It is well that the business men of Texas, led by one hundred of the foremost bankers, manufacturers and mer chants constituting the Board of Governors of the Texas Safe Parming Asse ciation, are bestirring themselves to promote a more profitable agriculture," said Nathan Adams, president of the American Exchange National bank in a statement issued today

"I am not an alarmist," continued Mr. Adams, "But I say in all cander that we cannot stand another such year as 1925 without many business disasters.

"The returns from the four million bales of cotton we produced last year will not cover the cost of production. dent A. A. Heathington and State In. It would barely cover cost at the present price of middling cotton, but it will by no means average middling. A fifth to a fourth of it is low grade; much of it has been sold at 7 to 12 cents a pound.

"This means that our cotton production account for 1925 is "in the red;it means that much paper in the note case is deferred; it means that our principal source of wealth is in default.

"It is well known to every man in the cotton trade that if the approximately 2,500,000 to three million bales of low grade cotton produced in the South last year were tenderable on contract the price of middling today would be much lower.

"Another big cotton crop will mean further and greater loss.

"We cannot control the acreage-we can only advise; we cannot order the weather or forbid the pests. There may be a greater yield even upon a smaller acreage; there may be another large volume of untenderable cotton.

"But we do know that we can raise our own food and feed. We are our own market for food and feed; we will sell them to ourselves and we will keep at home some two hundred million dollars which we sent to the Corn Belt last year.

"Then if we get a good price for our cotton we will be in the clear; if we must sell it for a low price we will reduce our loss.

"It is plain to every observing man that we cannot prosper-indeed, it is and election. He will try to see each my opinion we cannot survive as healthful communities and as an orderly commonwealth-by following the old practice of cotton-credit farming to buy everything else.

"I am hopeful that the old order will be reversed, but those of us who are In This City giving our time and money through the Texas Safe Farming Association can-not do it alone. We must have the help of every man who is worthy of his citizenship.

"I believe there are enough thought ful and patriotic men in Texas to put this thing over, first, as an emergency measure this year to preserve our solvency, and as a permanent system to insure our future prosperity.

The certificate law of 1921 provided that after Sept. 1, 1925 only two kinds ficates are elementary certificate of the second class and high school certificate of the second class. Each certificate is social, and athletic activity with which valid for two years only, unless applicant makes a general average of 85 or above, and a grade of not less than 65 on any one subject. The elementary certificate is valid only in grades 1 to inclusive. The high school certificate is valid in elementary grades from 1 to 7 inclusive, and in third class and Yewell P. Kuhn a former student of unclassified high schools, provided that said school is not an applicant for State Aid, then the work of teacher holding said high school certificate of second class must be restricted to elementary

grades, that is 1 to 7 inclusive. Those interested in securing more information in regard to certificate law, should write State Department of Education for bulletin 201.

'Certificates of the second class may be obtained by examinations only. Applicants who desire to take examinations for certificatees in any county must register with the county superintendent not later than the twentieth day of he month preceeding the examination which he desires to take. Registration may be made by letter or in person. The applicant should give his age, sex, color, number of years of ex- ford and Sagerton. perience in teaching and should specify the subjects in which he wishes to be paid until the applicant enters the examinations. Registration may be cancelled subsequently, if desired."




