**The Race for United States Senator**

There are six candidates in the race for United States Senator.  
The line of difference between Alvin Owsley and the other five, is clearly drawn.  
Owsley is the only candidate that was and is for Governor Smith the democratic nominee. He declared openly for Governor Smith months ago when it took real courage to face the fanaticism that was sweeping over the country and has to be faced and fought in this campaign.  
Owsley is the only candidate that demands equal chance for the farmer by direct loans from the government without red tape or delay, the same as now given to the banker, the merchant and the manufacturer. All the other candidates either propose no relief or they favor some board or bureau that would take always to do anything or would squander all the money before the farmer would get any of it. Most of the other candidates have been in Congress for years and have never proposed any relief or consideration for the farmer.  
Owsley is a prohibitionist by precept and practice. But at the same time he is opposed to the private home and premises of the citizen being searched and seized by officious agents because it is suspected that somebody might have a little home brew on hand for home consumption. For that reason Owsley stands with Governor Smith in favoring a change in the present liquor laws so as to bring about a more sane and fair enforcement of the law.  
All the other candidates want to continue the present deplorable condition of prohibition enforcement and if they were sent to the senate, they would be out of harmony with Governor Smith as president, and for the same reason they could be of no service to the people of Texas.  
Owsley demands that gambling in cotton and grain futures be stopped by law. He says all gambling looks alike to him and that offering to sell cotton that does not exist can have but one effect and that is to beat down the price of cotton that does not exist. To bring about this relief Owsley wants to pass a law with heavy penalties to stop future gambling by cotton exchanges.  
All the other candidates only want to regulate cotton exchanges and permit them to stay open and speculate in the price of farm products in the production of which they have no part.  
Owsley was a gallant soldier in the World War and went through the campaigns on the bloody battle fields of France. The other candidates were not there and most of them were enjoying lives of luxury as members of Congress where they were safe from the shot and shell of battle.  
Owsley is just forty years old, in the prime of life, and mentally and physically vigorous, capable and active. All the other candidates have had their opportunity for service and have not produced results. They are now too far advanced in years to expect much from them.  
Texas needs new blood and a new Senator from Texas that is in harmony with the democratic president soon to be elected. Let "Al and Al" be the slogan.  
For these reasons based upon these facts, the voter is asked to consider the candidacy of Alvin Owsley to be decided at the democratic primary on the 28th. (Political Advertisement.)

**BRIEF HISTORY OF HOWARD COMMUNITY CHURCHES AND SCHOOLS**

Believing that our readers love their country and state and appreciate anything of interest brought before them in regard to the upbuilding of this great commonwealth will be good reading matter. Especially when it deals with pioneer days and the progress of our country has made. Haskell County was organized back in the 80's and from the very first it began to assert its superiority as one of the greatest counties in our great state. After the county seat was chosen and the organization completed, the thing that interested Haskell county most was the establishment of schools as the settling up of the country went forth with rapid progression.  
 Among the schools which have made much progress Howard, located about 12 miles southeast of Haskell is worthy of attention. An excellent three-room framed building stands on a select plot of ground with a wide campus, teaching, cistern, and many other modern equipments which make this one of the leading schools in the county. Three teachers are employed each year and the school term is among the longest in the rural schools. A loyal set of trustees and patrons go to make this one of the banner schools.  
 It will interest many to know the establishment of this school district and the trend from a little one-room schoolhouse to the large commodious building mentioned above. It was in 1901 that W. L. Cox, affectionately called Uncle Billie, and Louis Howard with their wives settled in this section of the county. They moved from Comanche county and established homes in the community known as Howard, which was named for Louis Howard, one of the twin who first settled in that section. Mr. and Mrs. Cox are still living, but Louis Howard and wife have passed on, but their children, M. B. Howard and others, still live in the community.  
 The first Sunday in May, 1902, a Baptist church was organized under a brush arbor where the home of Jno. R. Watson now stands with the following charter members: Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Cox, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Howard, Mrs. Whitt Williams, Mrs. Lizzie Earls and Mrs. Mattie Hargrove. These banded themselves in the organization to go forward and establish a good citizenship in the new section and their efforts have been crowned with success for the Baptist Church has grown to a prosperous church who own their building, equipped with a piano and plenty of song books and a pastor is employed and regular preaching dates established. The name of this church at the time of its organization was Pleasant Valley, which was later changed to Howard Baptist Church.  
 After the church was organized the next move was to create a school district and make definite plans to educate the children of the newly established community and in the spring of 1903 a school building was erected in a large district which had been allotted to Howard. The first teacher of the school was Miss Ollie Norris of Haskell and the next teacher was Fred Sanders who was a young man at that time and starting out in life. He is today one of our progressive gin men of the city. A school has been taught every year since the district was established and it has progressed with the years as they came.  
 In 1922 the Howard and the Whitt Chapel schools were consolidated and the new building erected on the new location where it now stands and the Whitt Chapel school building was purchased by the Methodist people for a church building and the Baptist purchased the Howard school building for their church and both churches are in progress today.

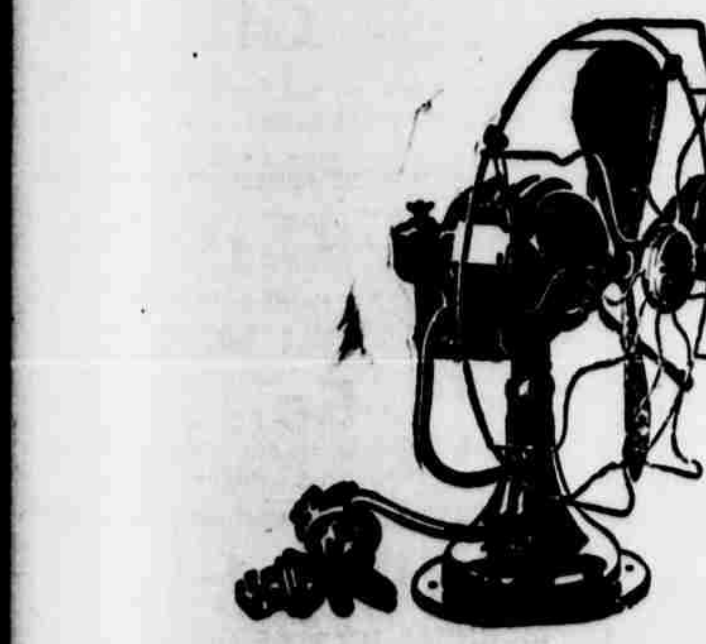
