A British Air Ministry communique said the main attack fell upon Oberhausen (pop. 110,000), an important eel and coal center on the Rhine, 5 miles north of Cologne.

Not counting Monday night's attack more than 6,000 tons of Allied bombs had been rained on the Reich since Friday.

German night raiders bombed suburban London in brief hit-andrun thrusts, killing seven persons and trapping many others in wrecked homes, but heavy antiaircraft fire forced most of the enemy to jettison their bombs in open fields outside the city itself.

John L. Lewis has been forced to back water in his defiance of the United States of America. It may be that an armistice will be signed without further hostilities,

It will be unfortunate if we permit such a superficial victory to throw us off guard, to divert us from the quest for permanent machinery for handling such situations.

The United Nations can not win this war, even now unless this country sticks everlastingly to the job of production. Our preponderance of material strength is too slight, too tenuous, to permit us to go back to business as usual. We can not afford to have the coal mines shutting down for a few days at a time whenever some bumptproduction of synthetic rubber, of ships, of planes, of tanks, of aviation gasoline and munitions, subject to stoppage for any cause whatever.

"I've been thinking—what would they do if the Army should strike? If we announced we would not go on facing bullets for \$50 a month without any limit on working hours?"

Overwhelming Production

In his first speech since he was named director of the newly formed Office of War Mobilization, James F Byrnes, presented some conclusive figures on overwhelming war production.

"The 100,000th plane manufactured since we began our war production program came off the assembly

"During the year, we will double the size of our fleet. "In the month of May this year we produced three times as many pieces of artillery for ground troops as we did in all nineteen months of the last war. "We are building merchant ships four times as fast

as they are being sunk. "America has turned out 2,225,000 machine guns

since it began to rearm.

"In 1943's first five months 100 fighting ships were finished—almost as many as were finished in the entire year of 1942.

"Our production of high explosive powder has been six times greater than during the last war.

'We have shipped to lend-lease countries almost twice as many motor vehicles as we produced for ourselves alone in the last war. If all these vehicles were parked bumper to bumper they would reach twice across southwest of the Fullerton pool, is

North Africa.' Byrnes went on to describe the remarkable achievements of America's new inventions such as radar, the locator which is giving us fighting superiority over the Axis, the new destroyer escort which is hunting down enemy subs, and other ingenious new developments.

This tribute is paid to the same American industry which the Axis powers thought capable only of producing refrigerators, washing machines, and other essentially peacetime products.

Little did our enemies realize that while free American enterprise was engaged in manufacturing the everyday conveniences which gave to the American people the highest living standard in the world, it was at the same time building up the skill and the know-how that are being so efficiently applied in the present emergency.





Course For Food **Handlers Starts** At Health Center

Midland food handlers will be on the three R's of sanitation during a short course which was started Tuesday at the Midland Health Center. Plans have been completed and all food handlers contacted and a full attendance seems assured, S. E. Burnett, city sanita-

During this period of extreme emergency when every energy should be bent toward a successful conclusion of the war is no time for food borne distases, Burnett said. For this reason the Mid-land Health Unit has obtained the services of a public health educa-tion consultant to train the food handlers in the basic principles of food sanitation.

The course of lectures, six in number, will cover a period of three weeks. Classes will be held each Tuesday and Thursday at 9:30 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. Food handlers who complete the course will receive a registration card certifying that they have been trained in sanitary food-handling methods Establishments with 80 per cent or more of their employees trained will receive an attractive wall placard for display. In this manner the public can see for itself which places have trained food handlers, Burnett said.

A great deal of expense and effort has been expended on conducting the school in Midland, the sanitarian said, but the effort and expense will be justified only if the owners, managers and employees of restaurants, drug stores, cafes, markets, and other business places attend the classes and put into practice the information taught
