

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ROME SUFFERS HEAVY BOMBING

Allies Wreck Jap Efforts To Relieve Embattled Munda

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN THE SOUTHWEST PACIFIC —(AP)— Allied airplanes and surface ships battered Japanese shipping in the Solomon Islands over the week-end as American troops increased their pressure on Munda with attacks on enemy positions near that key airbase.

United States warships beat back two more attempts to run supplies to the besieged Munda garrison on New Georgia. Two destroyer flotillas, the first of three ships, the second of six, were intercepted west of Kolombangara Island and forced to retreat northward. One destroyer was believed to have been sunk and hits were scored on three others.

A powerful aerial force, described by a spokesman as almost as strong as the 200-plane armada that sank seven Japanese ships and shot down 49 planes in the Buin-Faisi area Saturday, struck again at the remnants of enemy shipping in that harbor and pounded the nearby Kahili airbase. Thirteen Zeros were shot down. A cargo ship was sunk and two destroyers and another merchantman were damaged. Four planes lost.

The raid was made by four-engined Liberators and torpedo and dive bombers with a strong fighter escort. Four of our planes failed to return.

Allied planes scored another victory over New Guinea Sunday. Greatly outnumbered, our fighters slammed into a formation of 50 enemy aircraft, shot down two fighters, probably destroyed four others and damaged two more—all without loss to themselves.

Sharp patrol clashes were reported from the Salamaua sector. Official reports from Admiral William F. Halsey's command gave few details about the progress of the battle for Munda. But Monday was the first time that the communiqué from General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters had mentioned American ground forces attacking the airbase area.

Rains Slow Progress
The Americans, late reports said, were advancing despite heavy rains which have turned the jungle battle area into bogs in which even heavy duty tractors scarcely are able to move. The Japanese are using their usual jungle tactics at Munda—incessant infiltration at night by small patrols armed with automatic weapons, firecrackers, and other noise making devices.

The enemy is taking few American lives but his activities make sleep and rest almost impossible. American warships and planes have beaten off all Japanese attempts to bring reinforcements to Munda but the enemy, using supplies and equipment accumulated there during the past year, shows no sign of collapsing.

Many Landmarks In Rome Area Guided Pilots On Mission

CAIRO —(P)— Pilots who bombed Rome Monday said after returning to their North African bases that they had no difficulty in finding their military targets in the clear morning sunshine because of the unusually large number of landmarks which dot the Italian capital, according to first reports reaching Cairo.

They picked up the snake-like Tiber River outside Rome and followed it into the city. The pilots said they saw evidence that the Italians already had taken steps to protect some of Rome's historic landmarks. Columns of the Trojan arch of Titus and the beautiful Cascades ornamented by the sculptures of Bernini had been encased in thick concrete, they said.

Convicts Frustrated In Attempt To Escape

SALEM, ORE.—(P)— Two convicts armed with knives seized guard as hostage and tried to break from the Oregon State Penitentiary Sunday but the attempt was frustrated by a second guard who shot and killed one prisoner after the hostage had been stabbed severely.

Sunray Oil Co. Will Start New Test In Cochran

The Sunray Oil Company will start drilling immediately on a new test in Cochran County. The new wildcat is the No. 1 Reed, 1,980 feet from the west line and 660 feet from the south line of section 57, block A-26 of the Harrison and Brown survey. The field is located about 10 miles southeast of Bledsoe. The test will go to 5,600 feet.

The Amerada Petroleum Corporation ran a drillstem test on their No. 1 Mary C. Johnson and obtained a flow of 67 barrels of oil in 11 hours on a 1-inch choke. The well, which is located in Regan County, 1,966 feet from the west and 1,987 feet from the south lines of section 5 in the HE & WT survey, has reached a total depth of 9,075 feet. Packer was set from 8,943 feet to the bottom with a 1,000 foot blanket of water on top of the packer. The well showed gas 3 minutes after the opening of the tool and flowed oil and gas one hour and 20 minutes after the test started.

The No. 1 A. W. Hickman of the same company in Regan was drilling at 4,722 feet in shale and lime. This wildcat test is 1/2-mile north of the Barnhart pool and is 660 feet from the south and east lines of section 4 in the HE & WT survey.

The Humble Oil & Refining Company continued to have trouble with their No. 1-B Reynolds test in Culberson County, 1,380 feet from the north and west lines of section 33, block 62 psi. The test was plugged back to 283 feet to straighten hole. The plugging is now being drilled out.

The same company's No. 1 Crews & Mast wildcat, 3 1/2 miles north of the Means pool, is drilling at 7,348 feet in gray lime. The test is scheduled for 8,500 feet.

War Bulletins

LONDON —(AP)— The Algiers radio broadcast Monday a report that Axis headquarters in Sicily had been moved across the strait from Messina to Reggio Calabria at the toe of the Italian mainland.

LONDON —(AP)— British dispatches from Allied Headquarters in North Africa Monday said the Eighth Army apparently had reached the Gerbini zone with its nine satellite airfields. Gerbini is 13 miles west of Catania.

NEW DELHI —(AP)— Royal Air Force bombers took a heavy toll of Japanese river shipping and railway rolling stock in sweeps over enemy positions in Burma Sunday, a British communiqué said Monday.

BERN, SWITZERLAND —(AP)— Unconfirmed reports from Italy said Monday that Italian anti-aircraft shells which failed to explode until they hit the ground added to the damage caused Monday by the Allied bombing of Rome.

Americans Split Sicily

Patton's Men Drive To Center Of Island As British Hit At Catania

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA —(AP)— The American Seventh Army has captured Caltanissetta, almost half way across the mid-section of Sicily, in an eight-mile smash to split the enemy's front, battle reports to Allies headquarters said Monday as Allied forces gained all along the front.

While the fury of the powerful Allied air force turned for the first time upon Rome, the seat of Fascist power, and bombed war and industrial targets in and around the Italian capital, Canadian, British and American troops drove forward in all sections of the Sicilian front.

Edging up toward the Italian toe, the invasion host of Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's Eighth Army burrowed relentlessly into local defenses protecting Catania on the Sicilian east coast, and pressed closer to that keystone of the enemy's position in all Central and Northeastern Sicily.

Canadians Take Town
Montgomery's men wrested some of the most important strong points of Catania's defenses from picked shock divisions of the German army and reached a point within three miles of the city. While these veterans were fighting the hardest battle of the Sicilian campaign against the hard core of Axis resistance, Canadian units, jabbing dangerously at the enemy's western flank where it is stretched in front of the roadless area of Mount Etna, were said in Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's communiqué to be gaining important ground "with skill and determination in difficult country."

This is a battle-line, soldiers captured Piazza America, 15 miles directly east of Caltanissetta. In this 10th day of the Allied invasion, the combined forces had taken from the Axis approximately one-third of all Sicily, the official war bulletin stated.

Yanks Drive Northward
Following the capture of Agrigento and Porto Empedocle on the south coast, American troops of Lt. Gen. George S. Patton, Jr., were driving northward, widening the gap between the enemy forces in Western and Eastern Sicily. The capture of Caltanissetta, eight miles north or the previously reported northern point of American advance, was announced Monday at headquarters.

This is a highly important town dominating a network of roads and railroads running through Central Sicily. It is about 28 miles from the south coast, and only about 37 miles from the north coast. Hardly 10 miles farther along to the northeast is Enna, described as the strategic center of the big island.

The Canadians and Americans gained contact after their captures of Caltanissetta and Piazza Armerina and both armies then turned north in a rapid advance upon Enna, which has been called the "navel of Sicily."

Italians Giving Up
Geographically it is almost the dead center of the island and it is the focal point of virtually every main highway cutting through that area. The general line of the advance of the whole front was now approximately even, from the left flank where the Americans were attacking, through the center, where the Canadians were in action, to the right flank where the British were battling.

The line was an average distance of about 50 miles from the coast, and some Canadian units had advanced 20 miles in a single day. Meanwhile, Axis prisoners captured in Sicily mounted to 35,000, or more than a tenth of the entire German and Italian force with which it is estimated Gen. Alfredo Guzzoni started his defense of the island. Of these 25,000 were in American hands, and observers said the Italians were surrendering not as isolated groups but as organized army units. In one case an Italian company shot its German commander and gave up.

Resistance Still Strong
The most important moves were taking place on the eastern stretch of coast, however, where Gen. Montgomery's troops had battered back strong German units in the confluence of three large rivers across the Catania plain, thrown strong bridgeheads over the southernmost of these and gained control of the estuary three miles south of their strategic objective.

Resistance south of Catania still was very strong, with German troops placed on each side of the Italians, it was stated, but the British were gradually widening their bridgehead across the river.

Russians Smash To Approaches Of Main German Base Of Orel After Overcoming Fluid Enemy Defense

MOSCOW —(P)— The Russian army, overcoming the German fluid defense, has slugged its way to the approaches of the main enemy base at Orel on the Central Russian front south of Moscow, the newspaper "Pravda," official Communist party organ, announced Monday. As the battle reached the close of the second week of furious fighting along a 165-mile front it found the Nazi army, initiators of the offensive, rocking under sledge hammer blows of the Russian counterattack which threatened the German base and their hold on the vital Orel-Bryansk railway.

The Berlin radio said Monday in a broadcast recorded by The Associated Press that Russian troops launched a violent offensive Sunday in the Velikiye Luki sector northwest of Moscow and on the Neva River near Leningrad with support from heavy artillery fire. The Germans said that they had thrown back the Red Army men inflicting serious losses including the destruction of 33 Soviet tanks.

Tojo Says Japs Plan New Blows

Japanese Premier Gen. Hideki Tojo was quoted by the Berlin radio Monday as declaring in a speech calling for increased food and industrial production that Japan's armed forces are preparing to "deal more decisive blows" to her enemies.

The German broadcast of Tojo's speech before a meeting of Japan's provincial governors made no mention of recent heavy Japanese losses in the Southwest Pacific. "I am firmly convinced that we shall win the war and carry through our big plan, the establishment of a new greater East Asia," the broadcast quoted the premier as saying. "We shall have to overcome numerous difficulties on the way to our goal but our enemies are confronted with yet many more great difficulties."

Lightnings Down 15 German Transports

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA —(P)— All fifteen German Junkers-52 transports were shot down when American Lightning fighters encountered the formation over the Tyrrhenian Sea, an Allied headquarters communiqué announced Monday.

Daily Oil Allowable Decrease Is Reported

ASTEN —(P)— Average daily oil allowable for the week ending July 17 totaled 1,699,956 barrels, a decrease of 10,326 barrels from the previous week, the Railroad Commission reported. The number of producing wells declined 312 to 99,522.

WASHINGTON —(P)— Rolf Nugent, author of a plan to get Americans to buy now for post-war delivery as a means of fighting inflation, has resigned as director of the credit policy office of the Office of Price Administration.

Italian Capital Has First Raid By Allied Fliers

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA —(AP)— Allied warplanes struck at the very heart of Italy Monday, bombing military objectives in Rome and vicinity in a swift follow-up to an ultimatum by President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill calling on the Italian people to quit the war or suffer the consequences.

The raid was announced in a brief communique from Allied Headquarters, which said especial care was taken not to damage religious or cultural monuments. This was in line with a communication which President Roosevelt sent to Pope Pius XII recently assuring

hism the Allies, in attacking Sicily and Italy, would do all in their power to avoid damage to the Vatican and property of the Roman Catholic Church in Italy.

An American commentator, in a broadcast from Algiers recorded by The Associated Press in London, said "it may be assumed the attack was an American operation." Propagandists Deprived

It was the first time in this war that a report on a bombing was released before the attack actually started. Correspondents were given the information at 11 a. m. The bomb bay doors were opened in the lead flight of the Allied planes 13 minutes later and the radio operators on the flight informed headquarters instantly.

The reason was to forestall or discredit a flood of Axis propaganda claiming Rome had been bombed indiscriminately, with lurid and fantastic tales flashed to Catholic countries over the world. Rome is barely 350 miles from advanced Allied air bases and Mussolini and his Fascist chiefs are reported to have lived in terror of a bombing of their capital since the turn in the fortunes of war in the Mediterranean.

Crews Hand-Picked
The Fascist chieftain is reported to have had several different headquarters arranged in various parts of Italy, but his main office remained in the capital. Thousands of Italians had flocked to the capital, believing it would be safe from bombing.

West Texas Bankers Plan To Draft Ulmer To Head Organization

WICHITA FALLS — West Texas bankers have launched a movement to draft M. C. Ulmer of Midland, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, for the next president of the Texas Bankers Association. Oral Jones, vice president of the City National Bank here, said Monday.

"Ulmer's outstanding record as a banker and business man caused his West Texas friends to start the campaign to elect him president of the state organization," Jones said. For many years, Ulmer, who is president of the First National Bank of Midland, served as mayor of Midland. He has been active in civic work and banking circles for many years.

DeMolay Leader Dies Following Shooting

KANSAS CITY —(P)— Louis G. Lower, 41, first member of De Molay, Masonic organization for young men, was fatally shot Sunday when he challenged the authority of a man attempting to direct traffic at the busy Union Station plaza.

Detective Inspector Edward J. Larson said Clyde Souders, 49, whom he identified as a war plant guard and former police clerk, is being held in jail and will be taken before the prosecutor Monday. No charges have been filed.

Crime Of Success

During the 18 months which ended June 30, American yards turned out 1628 commercial ships—cargo tankers, etc. Their aggregate tonnage ran close to 17,500,000 tons. Nothing like this ever has been dreamed by the shipbuilding industry.

Of that stupendous construction 724 ships, which is more than 44 per cent, came from yards with which Henry J. Kaiser is identified. Assuming that average tonnage figures this year did not vary greatly from last year's, Kaiser had a finger in 7,400,000 tons of new merchant shipping. That is equivalent to about two-thirds of the total tonnage under the American flag in 1939—to one-third the tonnage under the Union Jack—to a greater tonnage than any other nation possessed when World War II broke out.

Moreover, Kaiser's influence went much further than the ships he built. The mass production pre-fabrication methods he developed, and the stimulus his success gave to others, account for a sizable increase in the tonnage constructed by his rivals.

It would appear that Kaiser had earned the respect and gratitude of Americans, and had established a prima facie right to be permitted to continue in business after the war.

Apparently he has not. For some reason Representative Cecil R. King of California considers it highly reprehensible that Kaiser would like to purchase from the government one of the yards he has operated so successfully.

What does Congressman King have in mind? Does he believe that the government should retain ownership of the ways it built to meet this war emergency? In that event, does he propose that the United States shall compete with the private yards which have co-operated so whole-heartedly in the war effort? Or would he have them confiscated, to provide a government monopoly in shipbuilding?

Or is it a crime for a man who has proven himself as a superlative builder to aspire to purchase, at full price, the plant he has operated so successfully for Uncle Sam?

Ever since Kaiser became outstanding as a symbol of what private management can do under pressure, he has been the object of one assault after another. Some of them came into the open, but most of them were whispering campaigns, traceable to an element which does not believe in private enterprise, and wants it to fail so that the government will step in and take over.

Lewis Has Big Choice To Make

How to force a labor union or an employer to accept and abide by a finding of the National War Labor Board is now the hottest potato which the administration has to juggle and fumble.

If a means to enforce WLB findings cannot be found, the board is as good as dead. For at this writing the board is being defied by the United Mine Workers and by the management of the U. S. Gypsum Company. And a way must be found to save the board's face.

There is nothing in the new Smith-Connally bill which compels a union or an employer to accept a WLB finding, though the bill does give the board greater power.

And it is worth noting that the WLB finding on the United Mine Workers' case contains no provision ordering that John L. Lewis "must" sign a contract incorporating the terms of board's recommendations. Members of the board did pay an official call on War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes demanding that the miners be forced to sign. But since the board has no police powers to enforce its own decisions, that job had to be passed to the White House.

Thus far, the matter has just been kicked around. On June 23, the mine operators wrote the President about this, and on June 30 they got an answer signed by Byrnes saying, "The government is giving full consideration to the steps which may be taken to obtain full compliance with the June 18 directive of the National War Labor Board without increasing the risk of interruption of mining relations."



We, the Women

Police in an Eastern city picked up a seven-year-old boy waiting for a movie house to open. He had plenty of spending money in his pockets, money given him by his mother who had a good-paying job in a war plant.

In commenting on the case a social worker pointed out that some war-working mothers are apparently trying to make up for the neglect of their children by giving them money—probably more money than the kids have ever had before.

Can't such mothers be made to see that they can't make up to a kid for leaving him alone all day by giving him spending money, or sticking him in a day nursery, or hiring someone else to take care of him?

There just isn't any way a mother can pay a youngster for shifting him off on someone else. And the months or years, when his mother puts a job ahead of his care and welfare are months and years that can't be relived.

A child may develop a sense of insecurity in that time that he never outgrows. He may get into serious trouble. His health may be so neglected that it is ruined for the rest of his life.

There is only one consoling thought in this whole problem of women getting jobs at the expense of their young children, and that is this: Some Must Work.

The mother to whom a pay check looks better than her own child's welfare and health could not have been much of a mother in the first place, so the child isn't giving up a really good mother.

None of this, of course, applies to the mother who must work in order to feed her children. It does apply to the mothers of small children who are working for the "extras" a pay check will buy.

Reduction In Gas Consumption And Ban On Sale Of Spare Tires Ordered

WASHINGTON — (AP) — More gasoline for the starved East, less for the West than it has been getting, and not-so-good news all around on tires was ordained Monday for the world's greatest motorizing nation.

Completion of the huge pipeline from Texas to the East Coast, scheduled for Monday, coincided with these developments.

Secretary of the Interior Ickes, who also served as petroleum administrator, announced that gasoline rationing for the driving public would be equalized over most of the nation, meaning more fuel for the East, and a reduction for the Midwest and Southwest. No change was indicated for the West Coast.

The Office of Price Administration, acting at the request of Rubber Director William Jeffers, banned sale of new tires for spares for the next few months—no specific date given. Exceeding firemen, doctors and others dealing with emergencies, OPA said that new, used or recapped tires will be denied motorists who have four sound tires, plus one that can be made to serve as an emergency spare. Jeffers said he was striving to make the present stocks last until synthetic casings can be turned out in sufficient quantity.

Southwest To Get Cut
3—OPA also notified drivers that their B, C, E and R gas coupons hereafter will be good until renewals are issued, regardless of the expiration dates. This move was made to encourage drivers to conserve their coupons without fear that the stamps will become invalid. B books outside of the East will be issued henceforth on a three-month basis. Individual needs will be adjusted by the ration boards by tearing out coupons not used in the three-month period, rather than giving each bookholder the same number of stamps but varying the length of time in which the coupons must be used. The East's four-month tenure of B books will be continued.

Ickes said he couldn't predict what specific changes in the gas ration would be made by the pipeline flow "but in all probability it will mean some increase in the East and a decrease in the Middle-west and Southwest."

Republicans Sure Of Winning 1944 Presidential Vote

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Ten years a bridesmaid in presidential politics, the Republican party came out flatly Monday with the forecast that it would be the bride in the 1944 elections.

In a seven-page statement referring to President Roosevelt as "Candidate Roosevelt," Chairman Harrison Spangler of the G. O. P. national committee made the prediction of Republican victory on what he called the strength of "polls of public opinion."

Spangler said the election would be decided in the northern states. Yet, he declared, the "Solid South" was not so solid for the Democrats as they usually reckon.

These "private polls," said Spangler, have showed that the G. O. P. has gained three per cent among the ranks of labor, and five per cent in the rural areas of the North.

Spangler put it this way: There are 21,000,000 labor votes in the North. A three per cent gain for the Republicans means 630,000 voters. A rise of five per cent would eul 1,050,000 votes more than before from the 14,000,000 listed as the farm bloc.

Subtract this gain from President Roosevelt's 2,449,752 popular majority in his successful third term bid in 1940, and the Republicans would have an edge of 210,248.

A five per cent gain also is seen by Spangler from the 15,000,000 voters among the professions, small businessmen, and miscellaneous, non-classified groups, which would make the G. O. P. a winner by 1,170,000. Spangler predicted the electoral college vote would reflect what he said would be the G. O. P. gains in balloting totals.

Ten Ship Sinkings Claimed By Germans

LONDON —(AP)—The German International Information Bureau, a propaganda agency, declared Monday in a Berlin broadcast that German submarines had sunk ten ships recently, bringing the July total to 45 ships totalling 280,000 tons.

Ludwig Predicts War To End In Nine Months

HOLLYWOOD —(AP)—Emil Ludwig, biographer, has predicted the defeat of Italy in three months and Germany six months later.

Ludwig declared in a broadcast Sunday night that he asked Mussolini in an interview, before the United States entered the war, what would happen if it should be defeated.

Ludwig said Mussolini replied: "We'll all tumble together."





BUCKEYE BEER

Last Section Is Welded On Long 'Big Inch' Line

By Charles Welsh PHOENIXVILLE, Pa. —(AP)— Big Inch, the oil carrier no submarine can sink, Monday was given its final construction touch.

But even before a spluttering electric torch joined the last link to the world's biggest, longest oil pipeline, Big Inch was carrying to the east oil that will be a decisive factor in defeating the Axis.

Officials On Program Significant of the importance of the pipeline, two cabinet members and high executives in the petroleum industry came to this Eastern Pennsylvania town, four miles from historic Valley Forge, for the completion ceremony.

Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes, longtime advocate of the line, and Secretary of Commerce Jesse Jones, head of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation which supplied the funds, were invited to guide the arc on the final weld and to take part in the broadcast program with W. Alton Jones, president of War Emergency Pipelines, Inc., builder of Big Inch.

While the steel fluxed under the flaring torch, a turgid stream of oil, stemming from Longview, Tex., 1,341 miles away, surged steadily eastward through Southern Ohio, flowing three miles an hour toward its first goal—the giant refineries that dot the Atlantic seaboard. There empty storage tanks and idle refineries that turn crude into fuel for planes and tanks and ships awaited the first oil, due within three weeks.

350 Days' Job In just 350 days the \$95,000,000 line designed to deliver 12,600,000 gallons every day had been made already. Across nine states 15,000 men and many mighty machines had scooped out a four-foot trench, welded the pipe, lowered it into place and covered it with rock and earth.

Italian Capital --

Allied intelligence experts who had lived for years in Rome. They memorized a large map of Rome to be sure of their targets.

They had to take all these precautions because Mussolini had built up a big war machine virtually in the shadow of Vatican City.

Other Points Bombed The Pope's residence is only about five miles from the big Rome railway freight yards where bombs were planted, and the Roman Forum is even closer about three miles.

The Allied air forces also struck at mainland airfields of Italy at Monte Corvino and Pomigliano Saturday night, dropping explosives in strings across runways and buildings, it was announced. In direct support of the British Eighth Army driving up the Sicilian east coast other fleets of aircraft blasted at Catania and Randazzo, a key communications center across Mount Etna from Catania.

Across the strait from these objectives the Middle East force of RAF four-engined Halifaxes and American Liberators hurled tons of explosives upon Reggio Calabria's rail and port facilities early Sunday.

The Rome bombing was announced in a brief special communique which emphasized the care taken not to harm cultural and religious structures.

Allied air units operating in the Mediterranean theater destroyed a total of 18 enemy planes Sunday against a loss of four of their own craft.

RAF Bostons led the way for American Mitchells in the crushing attack on Catania Saturday night when more than 85 tons of bombs struck the doomed city. They met moderate anti-aircraft fire but no enemy fighters.

The attack on military, industrial and communication objectives within the boundaries of Rome was made by a strong force of Allied bombers whose crews went out with what was described as "most emphatic" instructions to keep wide of Vatican City and the central part of Rome where the majority of religious and cultural monuments are located.

The raiders concentrated particularly on focal points of the Italian rail communications that pass through the Rome bottleneck. Industrial sectors of Mussolini's war machine also came under attack from the powerful air fleet.

B.B.C. Teaches English To Occupied Peoples

LONDON —(AP)— The British Broadcasting Corporation has begun broadcasting English lessons to listeners in occupied Europe, with the subject of preparing Europeans for the post-war reconstruction era.

Two series are being broadcast by the BBC. One is called "How Good Is Your English?" while the other, "What's It? News?," explains words and phrases likely to crop up in BBC news bulletins.

One day Smokey broke his shell and tottered out. Almost the first thing he did was preen his feathers, to make himself handsome. Since then he has displayed all the other fierce, proud characteristics that make the eagle the king of American birds.

Jolie cautions "inexperienced persons never to raid nests for eagle eggs, or eaglets, because they are so difficult to handle.

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Anti-Stalling Rule Causes Confusion Sunday As Two Games Are Halted By Curfew Measures

This season may come to be remembered as the one in which a certified public accountant couldn't figure out the National League standings on any given day.

Right now there are no fewer than four "suspended games" in the senior circuit which must be played to completion at some future date. Two of them already have been entered in the standing as won and lost for the teams involved, the other two have not.

Curfew Stop Games
Pennsylvania's Sunday curfew halted the second game of a doubleheader at Pittsburgh after seven innings with the world champion St. Louis Cardinals leading 6-5. Under ordinary baseball rules this would have become a victory for the Redbirds as soon as play ceased. But the National League passed an "anti-stalling" rule last winter which said that contests halted before the end of nine innings because of curfew must later be played to completion.

So instead of a victory for the Cards, who earlier in the day had whipped the Pirates 7-4 for Mort Cooper's 12th triumph, the game simply entered a state of suspended animation until September 1, the date agreed upon for its conclusion.

At Boston the Massachusetts Sunday curfew stopped the second contest between the Braves and Brooklyn Dodgers in the midst of a Boston rally in the sixth inning. The Braves had just scored three runs to tie the count 4-4 and had the bases loaded

with one out when play was halted. That will be the situation when play is resumed at an unspecified later date. The Dodgers bagged the first game 8-5 in 11 innings.

The other two games that must be completed were "suspended" as the result of protests after they presumably had been completed and already had been entered in the standings. League President Ford Frick ruled in these two cases that the games should remain in the standings until they needed to be reversed after they are completed.

Yanks Trim Athletics
The Yanks swept a doubleheader from the Philadelphia Athletics to extend their winning streak to eight games. Bill Johnson's three-run homer helped wrap up the first decision 7-2 for Ernie Bonham and the Yanks struggled to a 4-3 verdict in ten innings in the nightcap for Spud Chandler's 11th win.

Washington, in second place, kept the pace by taking two games from the Boston Red Sox 9-2 and 5-4. The Cleveland Indians subdued the St. Louis Browns twice 4-3 and 10-7.

In the other American League skirmishing Detroit divided a doubleheader with the Chicago White Sox, taking the first game 12-4 with an 18-hit attack and dropping the second 4-1 to Johnny Humphries' pitching.

In the National League the Chicago Cubs crushed the Cincinnati Reds twice 3-1 and 7-0 to vault into fifth place. Bill Nicholson hit his 13th homer and made three other hits in his second game.

The Giants topped the Phillies twice 10-6 and 3-2.
