

Petroleum Shortage

From time to time somebody mentions a petroleum shortage—not just a bottleneck in high-octane aviation gasoline and not merely a shortage on the eastern seaboard attributable to transportational difficulties, but an absolute, overall deficiency in crude petroleum resourc-

To the layman this seems peculiar. He knows that oil wells still are operating far below capacity, under quota restrictions which are rigidly imposed from Washington. If there is a shortage, why don't they take the caps off the wells and let the oil gush forth?

The answer, given by petroleum experts, indicates that the shortage is an artificial matter which probably can be remedied quite quickly, at any time we choose, but which nevertheless is likely to result in irrecoverable waste of one of our great natural resources.

When war broke out there were 20 billion barrels of oil "in sight," ready for exploitation. Because of restrictions, however, development of new discoveries to replenish this supply fell off. In normal times, when this happens the price of crude is shoved up a bit, which encourages wildcatters to go out and find new sources of oil. But the OPA won't permit that traditional apof oil.
