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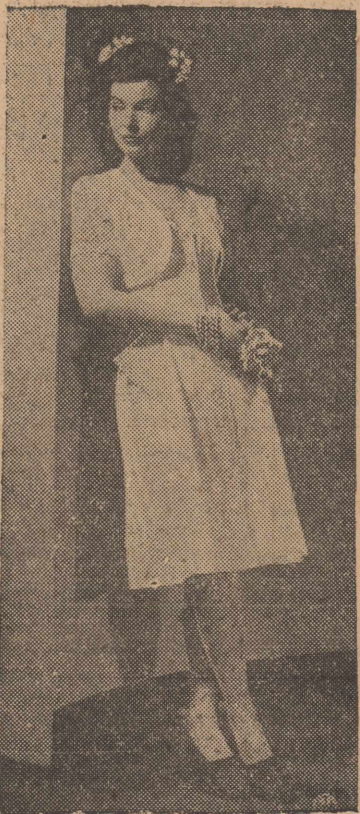

Reno's Divorce Courts Report Wartime Boom

RENO, NEV.—(AP)—Reno's "split-shift" workers, the ones who run the machinery that grinds out hundreds of divorces every month, are going along at a record-breaking pace these days, war and travel conditions notwithstanding.

The reason? War-time prosperity. At least that's the judgment of the hundreds of attorneys and court-house workers who come in daily contact with the stream of divorce-seekers.

People now have enough money so they can afford the "luxury of a divorce" attorneys say. It takes a well-filled pocketbook to finance a Reno divorce, even under the most modest circumstances.

Price Schedule

The Washoe County Bar Association has adapted a price schedule which says that \$25 is the "recommended reasonable average minimum fee" for the run-of-the-mill divorce case. The association adds, however, that the attorney is entitled to take into consideration, in fixing the fee, such relevant matters as the "possibility of compensation," "the amount involved in the controversy" and other items.

In addition, the divorce-seeker will have to spend approximately \$150 in living expenses during the six weeks. That runs the cost to an estimated \$400, plus transportation.

During pre-prosperity times, the cost acted as a deterrent to many persons considering a Reno divorce. Now, the bulk of the actions involve persons with modest incomes, who can now afford a divorce they have wanted for some time.

Court Decision

Another factor advanced by some attorneys concerning the increased divorce activity is the decision of the U. S. Supreme Court that a divorce legally obtained in Nevada cannot be challenged by other states, thus overruling a long-standing decision which left Nevada decrees subject to attack by every other state.

Illustrative of the current booming business is the fact that during the first six months of 1943, a total of 2,371 actions were filed here, by far the greatest six-month total in Reno's history.

Right now, almost 20 actions are being filed every day the court-house doors are open and the "split-shift" crowd expects the pace to be maintained as long as the war prosperity continues.

Many Schools Using Bonuses In Attempt To Fill Vacancies

AUSTIN — (AP) — Some public school systems may have found a method of filling teacher vacancies.

Charles Tennyson, public relations director of the State Teachers' Association reports school boards are offering teacher contract pay for 1943-44 and a bonus.

Tennyson is payable only if the teacher sticks to the job throughout the year. This is an incentive for them to stay with the job even though they may be attracted to higher paid positions in war industries and other fields.

How the plan will work—or how the teacher shortage problem in general will work out—must necessarily await the opening of the school year.

It is Tennyson's opinion that serious shortages are still in prospect.

Bombardiers To Compete Sunday At Big Spring

BIG SPRING—(AP)—"Berchtesgaden" will be blasted again for the fifth time when 24 of the nation's best bombardier cadets meet at the Big Spring Bombardier School for the fifth All-American Bombing Olympics. These aerial war games, conducted by the Flying Training Command will be held at the Big Spring school Sunday.

Eight large bombardier colleges will each enter a team of three of their most accurate cadets. All bombing will be done from an altitude of 8,000 feet at a target which consists of a shack centered within a 100-foot circle. This shack is affectionately referred to as "Berchtesgaden," and the team that scores the most hits on or around "Adolph's rock-bound boudoir" will win the much-prized "pickle barrel" trophy.

The eight schools competing for this honor are Big Spring, Midland, Childress and San Angelo in Texas; Deming, Roswell and Albuquerque in New Mexico; and Victorville in California.
