# Goering Gets Great Powers In Reich

### Army Reportedly Takes Charge Of Nazi War Effort

MADRID - (AP) dispatches reaching Spain from Berlin Sunday said that "powers of great magnitude have been given to Reichsmarshal Hermann Wilhelm Goering following a meeting of Nazi party chiefs and army leaders.

News of the meeting at Adolf Hitler's headquarters, announced by Berlin over the weekend, lent color to various reports current in Spain that the army is taking over conduct of German affairs in preparation for a long defensive war.

Although, these reports say, Adolf Hitler remains as a figurehead leader, the real rulers of Germany are Goering, Field Marshal General Wilhelm Kietel, chief of the high command, and Grand Admiral Karl Doenitz, commander in chief of the navy.

in Reno's history.




