Warships Shell **Italian Ports** In Naples Bay

ALLIED HEADQUAR-TERS IN NORTH AFRICA — (AP) — The British Eighth Army in Sicily advanced to within sight of the Italian mainland while British warships bombarded Italian shipyards in the Bay of Naples, 130 miles south of Rome, and other military targets, Allied headquarters announced Wednesday.

British forces advanced seven miles along the east coast of Sicily under the shadow of Mt. Etna to capture the town of Guardia, 16 miles south of Taormina and 40 miles from Messina, the bulletin announced. British Tommies on the east slopes of Mt. Etna thus gained their first view of the Italian mainland.

The inshore bombardment of the construction and repair yards at Castellammare at the southern edge of the Bay of Naples took place. Monday night, with British destroyers and cruisers moving in close to the target to pour round after round into the yards which were capable of handling ships up to 500 eet in length

Cape Vaticano Shelled

At the same time other units of the fleet attacked Cape Vaticano on the instep of the Italian boot about 25 miles north of San Giovanni where the main Italian railroad lines operate close to the shore of the Tyrrhenian Sea.

The communique said railway bridges were bombarded in the naval attack at Cape Vaticano at the same time that the daring seamen shoved their warships between Naples and the romantic isle of Capri and let loose their salvos almost in the shadow of Mt. Hamburg Is Reported Only 'Partly Alive'

STOCKHOLM, SWEDEN -(AP)-The record bombing of Hamburg by the Allies destroyed 11 of the city's 40 districts and is believed to have killed at least 50,000 persons, reports reaching Sweden said Wednesday

The chief editor of the Hamburg Tageblatt told foreign correspondents in Berlin that the city was "partly alive."

He described the bombardments as "so terrific nothing can compare with them in the world's his-He declared that the "mind of

Fifteen Men Killed In Two Plane Crashes

WALLA WALLA, WASH. -(AP)-Fifteen of 18 men aboard two four-engined bombers from the Walla Walla Army Air Field were killed in separate crashes into desolate sectors of Eastern Washington and Eastern Oregon Tuesday, base officials announced late Tuesday.

Three men of a crew of 10 parachuted to safety when their plane crashed near Paterson in Benton County, Wash., and seven were killed. All eight men in a bomber which crashed and burned fiercely near Heppner, Ore., were killed.

Going It Alone

The Moscow manifesto calling upon Germans to overthrow the Nazi regime apparently came as a complete surprise to the other United Nations. Our ambassador, Admiral William William H. Standley, is reported to have had no slightest inkling of it until the declaration appeared in Pravda.

It looks as though Stalin, going it alone, is hinting to the German people that the Soviet will accept peace without unconditional surrender. If Great Britain and the United States stick to their guns, this could easily mean a split on a very vital matter.

We-the British and Americans-insist ostensibly upon unconditional surrender by the Italians, but we temper our obduracy by enticing promises, express and implied. When Germany's time comes, we propose neither to express nor to imply anything in mitigation of our basic demand.



No sooner are they defeated temporarily than they begin planning, working, plotting for the next. Under a Bismarck, a Kaiser Wilhelm or a Hitler, they destroy world peace.

We have no reason to expect that the Italian people, freed from Fascism and its sponsors, will set to work at once planning another world war. But that is exactly what we must fear from the Germans, whoever might pick up the torch if it were taken from Hitler's hands.






