## Nazis Believed Preparing To Make **Defense Stand In Po River Section**

LONDON — (AP) — The Germans are moving troops into Italy in considerable strength apparently intending to make a real fight for at least the northern end of that country, a competent British military informant said Thursday.

Several divisions have been on the move to Italy from France and Germany in the last week or two, but an exact estimate of Nazi strength in Italy is not possible now, said this commentator who cannot be identified further.

From other sources came indications that the Germans are not only moving into Italy, but that their troops

## Speed-Up In Plans For Invasion Of Europe To Take Advantage Of Red **Offensive May Be Result Of Meeting**

QUEBEC -(AP)- A speed-up in Allied plans for the invasion of Europe to take full advantage of the Russian offensive on Germany's eastern flank appeared Thursday to be a likely result of the current British-American strategy conferences here.

As Prsident Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and their com mand staffs went into the second full day of moetings, the sustained Russian campaign, winning a success equal to the most optimistic hopes of Allied observers, shaped up as the greatest single war de velopment before them.



## **Caught Short**

The War Production Board is reported to have told alcohol producers, informally, that they may have to shift from grain to molasses. Such conversion is delayed by the fact that tankers would be needed to bring in the molasses, and the same tankers are necessary to take gasoline to our invasion troops all over the world.

So it develops that, instead of there being a huge surplus of grain available for the manufacture of buta diene for synthetic rubber, there isn't even enough grain for industrial alcohol for other war uses without taking it from stock-feeders and housewives' tables.

Our current butadiene program calls for 230,000 short tons to be made from grain alcohol. Rubber producers have been worrying lest the synthetic program may be held up by the increasing grain shortage. They have been told that alcohol will be provided for the butadiene plants. But some of them wonder if it willbutadiene plants. But some of them wonder if it will-whether, when the time comes to cut down on grain for Major Coal Strike eating and for feeding livestock and hogs, there won't be a lot of pressure against such diversion.
