Lightnings Pave Way For Bombing Boats Sunk

Twenty-Six Enemy Planes Destroyed

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA — (P) — Roaring swarms of Lightning fighters hedgehopped all the way across Italy and dispatch Thursday. shot up ground defenses at Foggia Wednesday, preparing the way for the all-American wrecking of the three waves of Flying Fortresses and Liberators.

The Lightnings were specially equipped for the long-distance run to Foggia, southeast of Naples and on the Adriatic side of the peninsula. Twenty-six enemy planes were shot down in combat and Allied sweeps over Southern Italy and scores of others were knocked to pieces on the ground. All Planes Safe

Paving the way for the assaults, which were delivered from bases in both Northwest Africa and the Middle East, a force of P-38 Lightning fighters attacked at treetop level, knocking out a large proportion of the enemy's potential fighter strength.

Liberators from the Middle East then roared in to smash at railway areas and Fortresses from the Northwest African Air Command followed up to blast enemy airfields with heavy bombs.

STOCKHOLM - (AP) - Three German destroyers sank two Swedish boats in the North Sea off the northwest tip of Denmark Wed-nesday night, the Swedish news agency reported in a Gothenburg

A foreign office spokesman said that if the attack occurred, the Swedish government would regard airdrome and 10 satellite fields by it as an "extremely serious" affair and the worst in a series of incidents involving Germany since the sinking of the Swedish submarine Ulven April 16.

Accounts from Gothenburg said 12 Swedes might have lost their lives when the boats went down under the attack, wreathed in flames. Returning fishermen said the destroyers struck from a range of about 50 yards, although the boats were flying the Swedish flag and had blue and gold Swedish insignia painted on the sides.

The fishing craft were operating close together in international Sweden ordered cessation of the supplies by railroad across her neutral soil between Germany and Norway and Finland only this month. The traffic had gone on three years.

HONOLULU - (AP) - A federal judge was prohibited by Army restrictions Thursday for enforcing a \$5,000 fine he imposed for contempt of court on Lt. Gen. Robert C. Richardson Jr., commander of the Army's Hawaiian Department Further, he was confronted with the prospect of a fine and prison term for himself if he persists in what the military regards as his efforts to contravene martial law Thus the Army took direct action in Hawaii's explosive test of the military law under the circumstance of the territory's semimartial rule.

Case Ordered Closed Federal Judge Delbert Metzger provoked the question of upholding the validity of a writ of habeas corpus for two naturalized citizens of German ancestory who are held incommunicado by the Army.

General Richardson failed to produce the men, explaining that while martial law in the islands has been relaxed in part, the civil right of habeas corpus still was
