# Denmark's People's Revolt **Reaches New Peak Of Fury**

STOCKHOLM —(AP)— Denmark's "peoples revolt" against German occupation soared to new heights Friday as the Danish government and Nazi authorities reached a stalemate in their discussions on how to halt the riots and sabotage.

One hundred and twenty persons were reported ar rested by Danish police Thursday

as they broke up, with the aid of German soldiers, a riot in the Raadhuspladsen in the center of Reds Join Other Copenhagen.





By NOLAND NORGAARD ALLIED HEADQUAR-TERS IN NORTH AFRICA - (AP) - United States heavy and medium bombers in strong force renewed their assault on the Italian peninsula Thursday with a set of scorching attacks on key airdromes. Flying Fortresses smashed the Capua airfields and Marauders raided the aerial installations at Grazzanise.







# Sweden Probing Attack On Ships

STOCKHOLM -(AP)- The Swedish government announced Friday two Swedish fishing boats that were sunk without warning by two German mine sweepers during an attack on five boats in international waters off the northwest coast

of Denmark on Aug. 25. A communique said an investigation had been launched by the Navy and that the Swedish legation in Berlin has been asked to learn from the Germans whether any of the 12 men reported to have been on the sunken boats were rescued.

While the government awaited the results of the investigation before launching a protest to Germany, it took a critical view of the sinking and the Stockholm newspaper Dagens Nyheter editorially termed it " a brutal attack."

Recalling that the Germans had promised repeatedly to instruct their armed forces to respect Swedish neutrality, the paper said, "it is the general opinion that the government, after a short discussion with the German government, cannot just cross over this incident and pass on."
