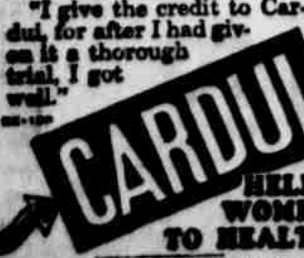

JOHN 20:17, EXPLAINED

"Jesus said unto her, Touch me not; for I am not yet ascended to my Father; but go to my brethren, and say unto them, I ascend unto my Father, and to your God."

This verse is used by some to prove that paradise and heaven are not the same place. They say that Christ went to paradise immediately after His death, and that in this verse Christ declares that he had not gone to heaven, so paradise could not be the same place as heaven.

If you are inclined to accept the above interpretation, you are urged to read Matt. 28:9, where we are told that some women took Him by the feet and worshiped Him. If Christ would not permit the first woman to touch Him because He had not ascended to heaven, why did he allow the other women to take hold of Him and worship? It is not fair to let two passages so closely related conflict, in order to keep the dying thief out of the verse.

When Christ said, "I am not yet ascended to my Father" He did not refer to the place where His soul went after His death, but was speaking of His bodily ascension that was to take place forty days later. He did not want the first person that saw Him after His resurrection to take time to take hold of Him and worship, but to run and carry the good news to His disciples. He lets her know that the ascension would be in the future and that she would have time to return and worship Him. So after the good news was carried to the disciples, He permitted others to linger with Him and touch Him.
