Disorders Slack Off In Denmark Under Nazi Rule

STOCKHOLM -(AP)- Eric Scavenius, Danish prime minister who resigned his post when Germany clamped a military dictatorship on Denmark last weekend, has declined an offer by the Nazis to form a new government, Danish refugees said Thursday.

Scavenius, one of the few Danish political leaders to escape arrest following Sunday's bloody revolt, had been asked to head a new cabinet by Gen. Hermann Con Hannecken, Nazi military dictator. Other members of the cabinet who resigned in a body with Scavenius, ed on Kila Ridge. refused even to meet the Germans ees reported.
