

Whose Ox Is Gored?

A vice-president of the CIO Automobile Workers' Union, Richard T. Frankensteen, wanted to criticize Senator Taft and Congressman Vroys of Ohio in a radio speech over a Columbus station. His talk was censored for one reason or another-he and the station differ as to that

Frankensteen feels aggrieved, we think justifiably. It is one of the things for which we are fighting, one typical of all, that every citizen should have the right freely to criticize any action of any public official.

In such criticism one obviously is bound by the requirements of decency and of good taste and is liable for slander or libel. In war time there is the further indispensible proviso that information which would be harmful to the national security must not be divulged.

But there is no claim that Frankensteen's proposed talk offended in any of these ways. By the station's own explanation, it was censored on the ground that it was controversial—and that, we suggest, is just about as silly a ground as could be offered for censoring or banning a radio speech.

So we sympathize with Frankensteen; we believe he has been made the victim of an un-American repres-Location sion. The radio station's action was as indefensible as is the picketing of the New York World-Telegram by the CIO National Maritime Union, in an attempt to force that newspaper to discontinue publishing Westbrook Pegler's section of the Permian line. criticism of that Communist-dominated union.

It would not be fair to infer, from any information Phillips Stakes Three More in our possession, that Frankensteen so much as approves, specifically, the NMU's attitude. Nor, since two wrongs do not ever make a right, does the CIO desire to throttle its critic justify anybody else in throttling the CIO.

But taking that organization as a whole, and many of its ideological playmates, one can say fairly that it does make a difference whose ox is gored. What is totalitarianism when used against the CIO is legitimate warfare when used by it.

Peace Bid From **Italy Expected** In Short Time
