# Huge Allied Convoy Nears Albania

### Major Fight Is **Expected After** Nazi Occupation

Germans Reported Disarming Italians

LONDON -(A)- A major battle over tiny, Italianheld Albania — across the Adriatic Sea from the heel of the Italian boot — appeared an imminent possibility Friday. German troops were reported to have occupied the former kingdom and a powerfud Allied fleet was reported en route there.

Dispatches from Chiasso, on the Swiss - Italian border, said that a great British-American convoy escorted by a squadron of warships had quit an Ionian Sea port and had begun moving toward Albania under cover of "important" air forces. Reuters also reported a large Allied convoy under way in the Ionian Sea.

Previously, a Reuters dispatch quoting the Hungarian news agency said that German troops had al-ready occupied Albania and the whole of the East Adriatic coast.

German troops were reported Thursday to have moved into the Dalmatian area north of Albania New Push Along and to have begun disarming all Ukraine Front gateway to the Balkans and in the Balkans themselves.



Fifth Army Smashes Five German Attacks

Naples Expected

ALLIED HEADQUAR-TERS IN NORTH AFRICA —(AP)— Naples, Italy's second greatest port and the heart of her southern communications system, appeared almost in the grasp of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower Friday as Allied forces struck resounding blows by land, air and sea with the aim of ridding the peninsula

of the last living German. Allied headquarters announced that the initial groups of the American Fifth Army of Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark had smashed five German W. Clark had smashed five German down counterattacks in beating down German resistance in the Naples area and had established strong bridgeheads from which to push the assault toward their first great objective in the campaign.

Nazis Repulsed Americans and British troops then pushed inland, it was announced, encountering strong German forces in the immediate vicinity of Salerno, 20 miles south of Naples on the Gulf of Salerno. They identified their opponents as the 16th German Armored Division.

The repulse of the sharp blows of the Nazis—aimed with characteristic dash to throw the Allied invaders off balance at a critical stage in operations—indicated that General Clark's warriors had weathered the first crisis of the bold cam—ark of the campaign.

LONDON —(A)— Rome has capitulated to the Germans under an attack waged by Field Marshal Von Kesselring, the Germans announced Friday. The claim was made in a communique issued at

Hitler's headquarters. The announcement said that "the commander of Rome" had capitulated after the German attack

Field Marshal Erwin Rommel, whose forces were routed by the Allies in North Africa, was in command of the German forces in Northern Italy, the broadcast recorded by Reuters said.

A special German communique broadcast by Berlin said slight local resistance preceded surrender of the Italian capital, and that short fighting ensued in Trieste, Bozen and Cremona.

An impression has grown up that the crisis in shipping is finished, that the United Nations have so speed ed production and so whipped the U-boats that we now have more cargo capacity than is needed for war pur-
