LONDON — (AP) — Russian troops captured the fortress city of Bryansk Monday night, breaching the Germans' main defense line before the Dnieper River by seizure of that pivot of central and southern German battlelines and center of a railway spiderweb serv ing both fronts.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA (AP) - Fierce German counter-attacks have regained some ground against the 24-mile Allied bridgehead near Salerno, it was announced Tuesday, but British troops battling up from Southern Italy are only some 100 miles from making a junction to support the Fifth Army.

The bloody Salerno fighting was equal to the desperate battles at Gallipoli in World War One. (German broadcasts declared the Allies are probably withdrawing to sea as many troops as possible "which means that they have abandoned the enterprise altogether." There was no Allied comment

They can't expand their working forces—they do not even have their normal personnel of veteran men, because the armed forces have taken thousands of railroaders.

It is to be hoped that every investigating agency will go deeply into this matter, as these and other wrecks are checked. Not merely to satisfy curiosity, and surely not just to place blame, if any. But to find out whether, in view of the burden they are carrying, the railroads must be given special consideration as to manpower and centers. materials and machinery.

A breakdown in American transportation would be extremely damaging to Allied military operations. It must not be permitted to occur. The time to avert it is in advance. We must not wait in this, as we have in so many other instances, until the horse is stolen before we begin looking for a lock for the stable door.
