Great RAF Fleet Hits Big German City Of Leipzig

Mosquito Bombers Roar Over Berlin And Other Targets

LONDON—(P)— A great fleet of RAF heavy night bombers, out for the eighth time this month, smashed at the Germans' second line of industrial defense Wednesday night, hitting the big city of Leipzig where many of the Ruhr's bombed-out industries have moved.

Mosquito bombers roared swiftly over the German capital for the third time this week while other bombers ranged over widespread reas of the Reich. 17 Bembers Lost

The RAF lost 17 bombers, the same number as in the last big raid on Hannover Monday. Eight bombers were lost in Wednesday's raid by Flying Fortresses on the metal plants at Duere. These losses indicated the Nazi destruction of 60 Fortresses over Schweinfurt a week ago may have been only a break

of luck for the German defenders. The big attack on Leipzig, unbombed since its sixth raid of the war Nov. 23, 1940, came while the Germans, in sharp contrast, sent a tiny force of bombers over England to give London its fifth successive night alert and kill six persons with a handful of scattered bombs.

Leipzig, Germany's sixth industrial city, is siutated in the middle of the country, 100 miles southwest of Berlin and almost on the Czech-

Leipzig has one of the world's largest railroad terminals on lines linking it with other important industrial centers like Berlin, Regensburg and Kassel, also recently blasted by Britain-based Allied bombers. It was the first big attack of the war on the city and represented a round-trip flight of more than 1,000

miles for the raiders. With a population of more than 700,000, the city manufactures airplanes, munitions, chemicals, textiles, rubber products and machinery.



Debacle As Great As At Stalingrad Appears Possible

LONDON —(AP)— The German armies in the Crimea have begun a mass withdrawal from the peninsula via the Perekop land bridge, Moscow advices indicated Thursday, to escape entrapment by a powerful Russian advance threatening their line of retreat.

Battling furiously to stem the steady progress of the Red Army troops pouring through the Kremenchug bridgehead west of the Dnieper River, the German command was said to be throwing all available reserves into the breach But the Soviet drive, hourly increasing in momentum, smashed further to the west through the Ukrainian Steppe country to overlap the Crimea on the north, Russian communique disclosed.

International Air Routes

Some weeks ago, in a light moment, we wrote about the flood of applications for permission to establish new air lines, and suggested that all one needed was a pencil, some paper and a stamp.

There have been no repercussions. Nobody has taken us to task. This is neither retraction nor apology. But it does seem worth while to note that behind a rather ludicrous flood of irresponsible applications is a good backlog of sound propects sponsored by reputable concerns well capable of operating vast networks of airlines.

Nobody knows just what Pan-American pioneer and leader in transoceanic flying, has in mind. Its thinking is said to be along the line of a joint super-combine which, in the words of the authoritative trade magazine American Aviation, "would give the United States a single-company front to face the world in global air traffic after the war.

Meanwhile, however, a number of demonstrably successful domestic operators want to branch out. One of the most embitious is Transcontinental and Western the most ambitious is Transcontinental and Western, a domestic transcontinneatl pioneer, which would like to expand across both Atlantic and Pacific.

Its projects would link New York, Chicago, Boston,
Detroit and Washington with London and Paris, and







The new regulations provide for the prompt clas-sification into class 1-A, class 1-A-O or class IV-E, without reference o sequence of order numbers or dependency groups, of all delinquent registrants 18 through 44; that all delinquent registrants 18 through 37 so classified shall be immediateordered to report for induction or for work of national importance, as the case may be; for the registration of a non-registrant delinquent and his classification and induction; and for the correlation of ac-

ions concerning delinquents. Most of the cases of delinquency are due to carelessness by the registrants, Mrs. Arick said in urging men to report changes in address or changes which may affect their classification.





AUSTIN —(P)— Texas oil fields have been called on by the Railroad Commission to produce 2,021,-471 barrels of all petroleum liquids daily in November, 22,471 barrels more than the 1,999,000 barrels certified by the petroleum administra-

In a statewide proration order Wednesday the commission fixed allowable production of crude for next month at 2,075,676 barrels daily, but estimated under-production would reduce this by 8.20 per cent of 170,205 barrels. Production of 116,000 barrels of distillate and natural gasoline daily will boost November output over the PAW certification.

Producing days for the East Texas field were left unchanged for this month at 23. The Panhandle field was reduced from 24 days to 22. General producing days will num-




