Man Who Killed 21 Japs On Guadalcanal And Received Four Wounds, Returns From Munda With More Injuries

Lt. Charles J. Foster, USMC, who visited his brother here in May of this year while recuperating from four wounds received while killing at least 21 Japs on Guadalcanal, is back again for another brief visit with his brother, Robert Foster, and family.

On this visit he brings back more than he left with in the spring. He has a new wife, two additional wounds, and a flock of new medals to add to the big collection he already had. Lieutenant Foster has been back in the thick of action in the South Pacific since he last saw his brother.

Wounded At Munda After leaving Midland he went to the West Coast and immediately was sent to the South Pacific. There he was a member of the First Marine Raiders unit that landed on New Georgia Island and pushed forward to take the important Jap airbase at Munda. He was struck in the leg by a bullet and in the

side by shrapnel during this operation and was evacuated to San Diego where he remained in a hospital six weeks. Although he still limps he is recuperating rapidly and now is on 30 day leave.

The Marine officer was wounded on Guadalcanal in December, 1942, after serving more than 18 months in the Pacific. The wounds were in his legs, back and arm. He has been awarded two presidential citations, the Purple Heart ribbon and the good conduct medal since he was here in May. He

previously had received the Asiatic ribbon for participation in eight battles, the North American ribbon for service in Hawaii and the Aleutians, the American Defense ribbon and star for operations in Mexico after the outbreak of war, the expeditionary medal for taking part in the U. S. break-up of a Jap task force of 18,000 men in the South Pacific, and expert rifleman and pistol medals. He has participated in at least five major sea battles.

Married Last Saturday Lieutenant Foster thinks he will be ready for service again in six months, but this time he hopes to be sent to a different theater of war. He has seen almost everything in the Pacific.

He had been officially credited with killing 21 Jap soldiers when he first returned to the United States, not counting those killed with hand grenades. Although he admits knocking over several more upon his return to the war zone, he won't say how many he thinks he got.

"It was my job to shoot them, not count 'em," he says. Lieutenant Foster was married last Saturday night in San Diego to Miss Jo Ann Earhart. He and Mrs. Foster plan to leave Monday for a visit in Fort Worth.

Prison Escapee Captured Again

ATOKA — (AP) — Ernest Cleveland Herring who says he has escaped six times from Texas prison farms, is waiting in jail for Texas officers to come and get him again.

He was captured here Tuesday by Harry Bronsfield, a garage mechanic, after an 18-mile chase. State Highway Patrol officers said Herring represented himself at a garage as being with the owner of an automobile left there. While Bronsfield was getting the bill, they said, Herring sped off but wrecked the car in a ditch 18 miles from here. Bronsfield had given chase, caught Herring when he sought to run away from the wreck and turned him over to Sheriff L. O. McBride.

In jail, Herring told officers he escaped from the Retrieve Prison Farm in Texas in June of this year, was arrested in Kansas and returned to Texas, but escaped by kicking the officers' car door open. (The latter escape was at Dallas, Texas, the first of this month.)

Special WAC Recruiting Team Named At MAAF To See Interested Women

Service with the Army Air Forces in the job of their choice has been made available to American women under a new Women's Army Corps recruitment plan set up by the War Department and Col. John P. Kenny, commanding officer of Midland Army Air Field announced that a special WAC recruiting team has been named to MAAF to make this plan immediately available to all women of this area.

Midland Army Air Field's WAC recruiting team, headed by a bombardier combat veteran with eleven months of service in the Middle East theater of operations, has gone into action and the campaign of the Army Air Forces to fill its quota of WAC enlistees has been inaugurated in a nationwide basis.

100 Jobs Available
In charge of Midland Army Air Field's team will be Capt. James Ordille, recently returned from combat duty as a bombardier and a holder of the Air Medal. Assisting him will be Lt. Mary L. Eason, commanding officer of the 816th WAC Post Headquarters Company here, and Staff Sgt. Randolph Gates, non-commissioned officer in charge of classification at MAAF.

During the Army Air Forces recruiting campaign all eligible women will be permitted to choose the type of job for which they wish to be recommended for assignment. A list has been compiled of eighteen occupational fields, representing more than 100 Army Air Force positions, which volunteers will be allowed to use as a guide in selecting the job for which they are fitted, and in which they are most interested.

The War Department announcement indicated that at least half of the specialized jobs for which qualified women are sought are clerical; however, many will also be assigned as link trainer operators, radio operators, weather observers and control tower operators.

May Visit WAC Barracks
The Army Air Force job choice list open to women who enlist in the WACs during the present cam-

paign was said to be the outgrowth of a close study of the effectiveness of women in certain positions in contrast with men in the same work. An increase in the efficiency of the Army Air Forces posts is therefore anticipated as a result of filling many of these jobs with qualified women.

Women interested in joining the WACs for service with the Army Air Forces will be given an opportunity to visit air bases and observe just how jobs in occupational fields for which they would volunteer are being handled, thus, they will know precisely what they will be expected of them. They will be given the opportunity to inspect WAC barracks, mess facilities, and recreational rooms, and to interview air-WACs to gain first-hand information on their suitability to army life.

It was emphasized that the Army Air Forces campaign will not be merely directed toward the recruitment of large numbers of women, but in every case the suitability of the volunteer for the available job will be the fundamental consideration underlying acceptance.

When a starlet like Doris Doree of the Metropolitan Opera sings the praises of a Jersey Ragout and chants lovingly about her Rice a la Newark, it's time to listen. This young singer, who recently won acclaim at Newark, New Jersey's, grand opera festival, knows the scales of her ration book and wartime markets, too.

Rice and Eggplant a la Newark
(Serves 4 to 6)
Three-quarters cup rice, 1/4 cup chopped pimientos, 1/2 cup chopped green peppers, 1/2 cup finely chopped onions, 1 eggplant, 2 apples, cored and sliced, 4 tomatoes, peeled and quartered, 1/2 teaspoon celery salt, sliver of garlic, dash of thyme, 1 bay leaf.
Steam rice. Chop eggplant and saute lightly with a little fat. Combine rice with chopped eggplant, pimientos, pepper, onion and tomatoes, garlic. Add seasoning. Place in well-greased casserole. Garnish with sliced apples. Bake in moderately slow oven (300 degrees F.) for about 45 minutes.

Jersey Ragout
(Serves 4 to 6)
One-half pound shoulder veal, 1/2 lb. chuck steak, 3 cups water, 3 small white onions, 2 tomatoes, peeled and quartered, 6 carrots, cubed (1/4 cup burgundy wine if desired), 1/2 cup sour cream, salt

and pepper.
Cut meat into small pieces. Braise in a little fat with one chopped onion. Remove to large pot. Add water and bring to boil. Cover and simmer gently for one hour. Add carrots, tomatoes, remaining onions, thyme and burgundy, if desired. Simmer gently another hour. Stir in sour cream just before serving. Season to taste.

Soldier Who Raised First Flag Ever To Fly Over Sloan Field (Now MAAF) Stationed Here

Meet the soldier who raised the first flag to fly over Sloan Field, now Midland Army Air Field, on December 29, 1941.
He is Master Sgt. Harry J. Harvey, who enlisted in the Army on May 25, 1935, and was assigned to a mechanized cavalry unit as radio operator. When he received his discharge he re-enlisted in the Army Air Forces in 1938 as a radio operator and was assigned to a B-18 bomber squadron. On February 16, 1942, when the link trainer department was organized at MAAF he was assigned as an instructor and has remained there till the present day. He is now chief link trainer instructor.
When Sergeant Harvey arrived at Sloan Field on December 17, 1941, he was assigned the task of organizing the guard squadron under Lt. Malcolm Downs, who at that time was the security officer,

and at present is a major with duties as Post Intelligence Officer. On December 28, 1941, by orders of Lt. Burton H. Rowden, post adjutant, now Lt. Col. Rowden, executive officer, Sergeant Harvey drew a garrison flag from Quartermaster, and the next morning on the 29th he shook out the moth balls, unfurled and raised the first flag to fly over this post.
"It may not mean much to some people, but to me it means a great deal," said Sergeant Harvey. "It's a great honor to be selected to unfurl and raise the first flag to fly over an Army post."
Sergeant Harvey has attended Army specialist schools at Lowry Field, Colo., Chanute Field, Ill., and Randolph and Ellington Fields, Texas.
