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Mystery Deepens In Twin Slaying Allies Make Gains

LUBBOCK -(AP) - Sheriff Sam Hutson disclosed Wednesday that he had issued a pickup order for one suspect in the gruesome slayings of Dr. and Mrs. Roy Hunt, whose bound and bloody bodies were found on a bed in their Littlefield, Texas, home Tuesday. The Lamb County officer threw no other light on the clue he was

The Lamb County officer threw no other light on the clue he was following in West Texas' latest murder, which in mystery ranked with American Planes the Lorius-Heberer disappearing case seven years ago.

Hutson additionally disclosed that he and Ranger Capt. Maney Gault would confer on the case Wednesday, but without indicating what they might talk about.

Meanwhile citizens of Littlefield had contributed \$7,500 in cash for a reward for capture of the killers. Sheriff Hutson said the amount would be \$10,000 by 6 p. m. Wed-nesday. In addition the Lions Club of Lubbock was leading a drive to raise other funds there. Anaesthetic Used

This theory was reached after hearing the story of six-year-old Jo Ann Hunt, who discovered the intruder during the night and later. after apparently being forced to sleep, awoke to find her parents Loss Of Runner,

The child said she was awakened, went to the kitchen for a drink. Receiving no response to a call to her mother, she went into her parents' room and saw the man. He grasped her by the shoulders, pushed her into a nursery closet, "threw water on me that smelled like gasoline, slammed the door and I went to sleep.

Girl Gives Description Officers cited the fast that it was a cold night and the child was attired only in a nightgown, but she apparently slept for several hours in the closet after being doused with the liquid.

Jo Ann said the intruder was a "man" with "ugly round feet" and "hairy eyebrows." Evidently he wore a mask, as the child said he

German Command **Gloomy As Reds Continue Gains** 

> Russians Forcing Enemy To Withdraw From Dnieper Bend

LONDQN-(AP)-With Soviet troops storming the outskirts of Krivoi Rog, the German command Wednesday took the gloomiest tone toward the Russian front since Stalingrad, in an apparent effort to stiffen the public and army alike for an impending military catastrophe.



#### **Postwar Merchant Marine**

The United States will end this war in position, theoretically, to dominate the ocean shipping of the world. Our merchant marine will be perhaps twice as large as that of Great Britain, and will dwarf those of all other nations. But most of our enormous tonnage will be in Liberty ships.

Far be from us to disparage the Liberty ship, which is enabling us to win the war. But any expert will tell you that Liberty ships can not hold ocean cargo trade in competition with the craft that Great Britain and other maritime nations will start building as soon as they can catch their breath after peace returns.

For a few years our enormous tonnage of usable ship-Globe To Drill -ping will give us control over world trade. In the long run we shall have to work out an intelligent shipping policy or we shall drift once more into the maritime background.

Much of the merchant fleet with which we shall com-pete for postwar business will have to be built after the drilling fluid. war. Jones Attempts **To Clarify Feed Plan** Situation A statement to clear up confusion

on the protein concentrate situa-tion and other livestock feed misunderstandings has been received by the Midland County AAA office from War Food Administrator Marvin Jones.

This confusion is the result of a great deal of misinformation and rumors, Jones sets out. The statement follows:

The War Food Administration is endeavoring to handle these con-centrates through the regular commercial channels. However, it has authorized Commodity Credit Corporation to direct the shipment of 20 per cent of all kinds of concentrates in an effort to take care of emergencies. The physical dis-tribution of this 20 per cent is left in the hands of the trade unless an emergency should arise that would justify the War Food Administration stepping in to handle it. In that case, the 20 per cent would still be handled by the trade under the direction of Commodity Credit Corporation.
