LONDON — (AP) —The second battle of the Crimea began Sunday with Gen. Feodor Tolbukhin's steppe legions hammering at its northern gate and plunging down the last 22-mile lap toward Perekop to slam shut that northwestern escape door on huge German forces in the peninsula.

A midnight communique supplement announced that the Russians continued to pursue the retreating Germans after they took the town of Genichesk by assault, killing over 2,000 Nazis at the northeastern edge of the Crimea.


been advised.
