Nazis In Norway Get Orders For Action In Event Of Capitulation

STOCKHOLM — (AP) — The Swedish-Norwegian Press Bureau reported Monday that Norwegian patriots in the Trondheim district on the western coast of Norway had found German orders reminding Nazi officers of their duty to destroy all military records in the case

The documents advised troops how to act if their units were suddenly dissolved and they were forced to lay down their weapons, the news bureau

At the same time, a dispatch from Copenhagen said it had been announced officially that the Germans had proclaimed a "state of highest alarm" in Jutland, the northernmost portion of the Danish peninsula. No rea-

The dispatch said martial law might follow, presumably as a result of spreading sabotage.

On the sea, American submarines sank seven more Japanese ships and dameged two others. This, the Navy Department said in a week-end announcement, brought their toll in the Pacific to 346 sunk, 36 possibly sunk and 114 others dam-



Margarine is derived (that is, the word, not the product) from the Latin margarita, meaning pearl, which in turn stems from the Greek margaron, also meaning pearl. Both root words are pronounced with a hard g, as in Margaret, not a soft one, as in Marjorie. Yet almost of Dallas, at the home of Mrs. John all of us pronounce it as if it were spelled with a j.




