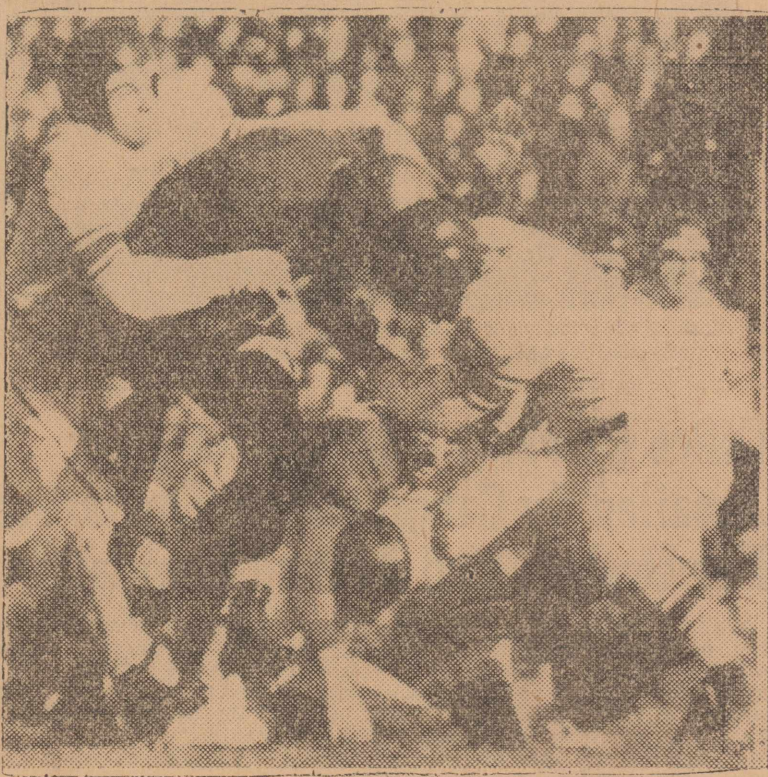

Alfred De Marigny, Asked To Leave Bahamas, To Re-Marry Nancy Oakes

NASSAU, BAHAMAS — (AP) — Shortly after it was learned that he had been invited to leave the Bahamas, Alfred De Marigny announced Monday that he and his wife, the former Nancy Oakes, would be re-married Monday afternoon. The twice-divorced De Marigny said he had obtained permission for the ceremony from the Catholic archbishop in charge of this diocese. Friend Must Leave De Marigny was acquitted last week of the murder of his wife's millionaire father, Sir Harry Oakes. The jury voted a unanimous recommendation that he be deported from the Bahamas. The governor-in-council, at a special meeting Saturday, decided to invite De Marigny and his close friend, Marquis De Visdelou, to leave the colony. Nassau censorship prevented transmission of the information until Monday morning. Duke Did Not Vote The governor-in-council is an executive group composed of the governor of the Bahamas, now the Duke of Windsor, colonial officials, and the governor's advisers. The duke himself is in the United States and did not take part in the session. It was learned that Mexico will be a haven for the two men if arrangements can be made. They plan to leave within the next two weeks. De Visdelou was shocked by his inclusion in the order. Nancy Oakes De Marigny, the acquitted man's wife, was depressed by the development.

Representatives Of Axis Nations Meet

A conference of the "leading representatives of the Axis powers" without a representative from Benito Mussolini's new Fascist government was held Monday at the Imperial Hotel in Tokyo, a German broadcast said. The broadcast of a Tokyo dispatch said ambassadors and ministers from the Nanking, Manchukuo and Thailand puppet governments, Rumania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Finland and even the puppet provincial Indian government were present. Germany was represented by its ambassador. The Italian diplomatic representative in Tokyo has been reported to be loyal to King Vittorio Emanuele. Need For Post-War Rationing In U. S. Grows Less Serious

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. — (AP) — The need for post-war rationing in this country, in favor of relief to Europe and China, appeared less serious here Monday as the committees for the United Nations relief and rehabilitation began their work. This development followed on the heels of a report that the overall cost to the United States for its contribution to the UNRRA would be about a billion and a half dollars. The entire bill will not be presented to Congress in a lump sum, it was said, the initial appropriation bill probably asking for less than half a billion. It was reported after the first finance committee session Sunday night that UNRRA members are striving to fix a flexible formula to produce about two and a half billion dollars, the amount spent by the United States for European reconstruction after World War I. The formula, it was said, must be flexible as it is not possible for all nations to meet, fairly, the proposal, for instance, that they be assessed one per cent of their annual income. This formula, however, seems to have the lead as the American contribution would be about that amount. GRISWOLD IS CANDIDATE LINCOLN, Neb. — (AP) — Gov.
