Moscow Meeting Paved Way For Lasting Peace

Secretary Of State First Cabinet Member To Address Congress

WASHINGTON - (AP) Secretary of State Hull, the first cabinet member ever to address Congress, declared Thursday before a joint session of both houses that "we can and will remain masters of our own fate" through cooperation with other nations likewise intent upon security.



Preview Of Post-War Follies

On the official Washington vaudeville stage today are a number of impromptu acts which begin to look like bit rehearsals for that super-duper attraction which will probably be billed as "The Post-War Follies of 194?" The question mark will of course be filled in when it is known in what year the war ends.

The White House headlines its act with that grand old man of the capital theater, Bernard M. Baruch, who will do his stuff under the direction of Office of War De-Mobilization maestro James F. Byrnes.

This steals top billing from an act which was being quietly rehearsed in War Production Board. Producer Donald M. Nelson's stars apparently had an elaborate scenario already prepared, telling just how they thought they might put on the post-war show. WPB didn't think it would help the actual war effort to promote their play just now, so it was kept secret. Now this plan must be kept on the shelf, unless Mr. Baruch likes it. But the White House appointment of Baruch stole a march on the WPB planners.

War and Navy departments-the former much more than the latter—have their ideas about reconversion to peace. In the Army's limelight is Undersecretary of War Robert P. Patterson's trial balloon speech on putting Selective Service into reverse, to release men from the service only when and as jobs were available in civilian life.

Department of Justice is full of plays about curbing post-war cartels, Treasury has its ideas for post-war stabilization of currency, Commerce its private industrysponsored Committee for Economic Development. Agriculture has a farm plan.

Congress gave the hook last summer to the National Resources Planning Board, which had been doing research on post-war problems ever since the war began, obviously thinking this act would stop the executive end of the government from doing a lot of plotting for postwar boondoggling. The Baruch appointment also stole a march on Congress.


