

Heroes Without Medals

The headlines tell a gratifying story of how our Army Air Forces are ripping the Axis apart. There is another part of the story, also gratifying, but not told in the headlines. Its setting is on the other end of the airline routes to Berlin and Tokyo.

The heroes of this story wear no medals and get precious little public recognition. But without them our aerial offensive would have been delayed many months -meaning the loss of thousands of American and Allied lives before we were in position to give more punishment than we were receiving.

These heroes are the hundreds of civilian instructors in the primary flying schools of the AAF Training Command. The primary schools, in which aviation cadets first learn to get airplanes off the ground, are run by civilians on contract with the government. The civilian operators retain and pay the instructors, who are also civilians. Not until they get into the more "military" type of flying in the basic, or secondary, stage of training do the cadets receive instruction from Army pilots.

Civilian instructors have suffered a number of major and minor annoyances because they were not technically "in the Army." Many a local draft board has apparently been puzzled by this phrase. 
