Guided by fires still blazing in the German capital, the RAF gouged great new wounds and set conflagrations visible for 200 miles. their bombs spiraling to 14,000 long tons the total weight of explosive heaped on Berlin in 1943, and boosting the total for little more

than a week to some 6,000. It was the fifth straight night of raids-counting two lighter Mosquito stabs—on sleepless, doomed Berlin, and wholesale evacuation of the city seemed ever more like-

Stockholm newspapers said the new attack was concentrated in the west and central sectors, with huge fires in the Charlottenburg area, and that 500,000 Berliners were homeless. Unconfirmed Stockholm reports said that war workers had been forbidden to leave Berlin, but that about 100.000 "escaped" without registering their movements with the police.

Nazis Stiffen Defenses

The Germans' failure to break up the attack was a "signal vic-tory" for the U. S. Air Force, which knocked down 56 Nazi fighters Friday over Bremen and did "much to take the edge off the enemy's ounterattack" at Berlin, the Air Ministry declared.



Cash Incomes Of Farmers Decline

to

AUSTIN —(P)— Farm cash in-come in October in Texas showed its first decline of 1943 as com-pared with 1942, with the slump attributed to two chief factors. These, said Dr. F. A. Buechel, of the Bureau of Business Research, were earlier ginnings of cotton in 1943 (mostly in August and September as compared with 1942's bulk of ginnings in October), and a decline in the marketing of cattle, calves and sheep.

Cash income from agriculture in Texas during October amounted to \$162,000,000 as compared with \$177,-000,000 during the same month of last year—a decline of seven per cent. Aggregate income for the first ten months of the year total-ed \$890,000,000 compared with \$732,-000,000 during the similar period of last year, a gain of nearly 22 per cent.



More Than Half **Of County Seal** Quota Is Raised

More than half the goal set for Midland County in the annual Christmas seal sale was obtained in the first four days of the campaign here, Mrs. J. H. Elder, chairman of the seal campaign for the Midland County Tuberculosis Association, announced Saturday. About \$882 of the \$1,500 goal has been raised and the association is hoping that the drive will go over the top.

The \$1,500 was carefully set by officials of the association as the exact sum needed to carry on the work for next year, it was pointed out. If more than the required amount is obtained in the drive, the only means employed to raise funds for the health work, the activities can be expanded.

Dr. W. G. Whitehouse, county health officer, calling tuberculosis one of the most important health problems in Midland County, Saturday urged all citizens to Christmas seals to make possible the expanded wartime work of the Midland County Tuberculosis Association. "The association is performing a vital job in this country and its only means of support is the annual seal sale," he said. Everyone should buy seals as generously as possible for the need of tuberculosis control was never

Ten Active Cases Mrs. Ruth Rhodes, county health nurse, has on record in her office 10 active cases of tuberculosis and 26 inactive or arrested cases, one spinal and 15 childhood types. A survey was made last summer of pre-school children who are in contact with the disease in their homes and 20 children were found with positive reactions to tuberculin tests. X-ray pictures of the children have been made and have been sent to the tuberculosis consultant of the State Department of Health in Austin. The Midland as-sociation paid for the X-rays and tuberculin testing material.

Nurses are starting their education program in tuberculin testing at the schools this week. Materials have been distributed at the South MONDAY Elementary, Latin-American and Carver schools and negro kinder-garten. All children in the schools at the First Christian Church. will be tested sometime in Decem-Tuberculosis Association.





Navy Recruiting Cruiser To Drop Anchor In City

A land-going Navy recruitin "cruiser" will drop anchor in Mid recruiting land at noon Thursday at Wall and Main Streets, and remain until 3 p. m. when it will get underway for Big Spring, Chief Petty Officer Ray Lokey, in charge of advance arrangements for the cruiser, announced Saturday.

Manning the cruiser, which has toured every state in the Union, is a crew of Navy recruiters who will accept applications for enlistment in the Navy's new Ship Repair Unit, or for general service. Women between ages of 20 and 49 years may obtain information regarding enlistment in the WAVES. Accept ed male applicants in all branches will be furnished transportation to nearest Navy recruiting station for final examination and completion of enlistment. WAVE applicants will be sent to Dallas for completion of enlistment.


Cruiser Well Equipped

Men enlisted for Ship Repair Unit will fix damaged fighting ships at advanced naval bases, or follow in wake of attacking task forces in fully equipped repair ships, repair all but major damage the spot and get ship and crew back into the fight at earliest possible moment. Qualifications for enlistment, or voluntary induction of draft age men, are, with few ex ceptions similar to Seabee require-ments. Carpenters, electricians, rig-gers, welders — mechanics of all kinds—are needed. Most of those accepted qualify for petty officer ratings with base pay ranging from \$78 to \$126 per month, plus 20 pe cent when serving overseas. Family allowances are same as for other branches of military service. Age limits are from 18 to 50 1/2 years.

Men between the ages of 17 and 18, and those between 38 and 50 1/2 years may enlist for general service with petty officer ratings for those qualified. Draft age men may enlist only for Ship Repair Units. The recruiting "cruiser" unit consists of a large truck towing a fourwheel trailer. The trailer is equipped with office for handling applications for enlistment and has modern living quarters for the crew. The truck is equipped with public address system and will fur nish patriotic music while here. The general public is invited to inspec this cruiser. Literature and inform ation will be given freely and with out obligation, Chief Lokey said.

had asked for jury trials.






