# Broken German Forces Fleeing Toward Dnieper

German Casualties Mount As Russians Continue Advances

MOSCOW - (AF) - The Red Army was advancing rapidly toward the important rail junction of Zhlobin Monday in a drive along the escape gap northwest of Gomel through which broken German forces were attempting to flee to the west bank of the Dnieper.

Sweeping up 150 villages seizing many prisoners, Russian troops Sunday pushed to within 20 miles of Zhlobin, a Soviet communique said. Meanwhile other Russian forces surged forward to the west and southwest in White Aussia and killed 3.800 Nazis in heavy fighting extending from the Gomel area to below Dnepropetrovsk. # Tells Men To Hit Hard At Germans

British Make Good Progress In Face Of Nazi Resistance

ALLIED HEADQUAR-TERS, ALGIERS — (AP)— The Eighth Army, called upon by Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery to hit the Germans a "colossal crack' and to drive them north of Rome, struck out in a new offensive in the darkness of Sunday morning from its Sangro bridgeheads and is making good progress in the face of enemy flamethrowers, Allied headquarters an-

nounced Monday. The attack, delivered at night in typical Montgomery style, was preceded by a terrific air onslaught. It was carried out by veteran British, Indian and New Zealand divisions rushing forward in the flashing light of an "exceptionally heavy" artillery barrage. Attack Going Well

A headquarters spokesman said the attack was going well. Before the Eighth Army's wheels were set churning westward from the bridgehead into the enemy's hill positions toward Rome, British destroyers laid down a bom-bardment of the enemy port of Civitanova, 20 miles south of Ancona on the Adriatic coast.

A second bridgehead at Archi 13 miles inland from the Adriatic, was hammered out as the attack progressed, broadening the Eighth Army's foothold on the north side of the most serious obstacle en-countered by Montgomery since he set foot on the Calabrian toe last September. The previous bridge-head had been limited to about five miles along the Sangro from the Adriatic.

# Negro Sought In Youth's Stabbing

DENTON — (P) — North Texas peace officers Monday combed a wide area for a negro who, they said, Sunday stabbed and robbed 7-year-old John Dunaway of Longviel, and a young woman com-panion five miles northeast of

Dunaway was wounded seriously and was in a Denton hospital suf-fering mostly from loss of blood. The companion, a student at a Denton college, was struck on the head with a pistol in the scuffle. She did not suffer serious injuries.

Officers were told that the couple was parked on a side road when the negro approached and demanded that they get out of the automobile and proceed to nearby woods. When the negro reached for the girl's purse, Dunaway attempted to wrest a pistol from the negro's hand. In the scuffle, the East Texan managed to get the pistol and shoot at the negro, but the bullet went wild and the negro overpowered him and then stabbed him, puncturing a lung.
