American Planes Attack Germany

LONDON - (AP) - Eighth Air Force heavy bombers attacked targets in Western Germany in daylight Tuesday, setting a record of 11 major raids for one month's heavy operations from bases in Britain.

Following on the heels of Monday night's RAF Mosquito bomber raid on the same general area, the American heavies were supported by U.S., RAF, Dominion and Allied fighters during their mission.

The four-engined American *bombers exceeded by one the previous record of 10 operations set in July and equalled in September. The announcement of the wide-spread fighter support was a rare combination for the big bombers

which are usually accompanied only by American fighters.
Second Straight Raid It was the second successive day penetration of Germany for the American bombers which bombed Bremen Monday for the second

time in four days and followed two accessive RAF Mosquito night forys into the same area. A communique also disclosed

NEW YORK -(AP) - Reuters, the British news agency, Tuesday received a dispatch datelined Lisbon which said "it is known here definitely" that President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill and President Chiang Kai-Shek have completed a long conference in Cairo and are now en route to Iran (Persia) to meet Premier Stalin.

Canol Creates Controversy

By a stroke of the wildest kind of prospector's luck, one of the War Department's worst scandals—the \$134 million Canoil oil development project in Northwest Territory, Canada—may be converted into a post-war bonanza. The outcome of this strange turn of events, which would make heroes out of public figures who might otherwise be courtmartialed, may be known soon, following disclosures on (1) the real extent of the Norman Welis oil fields, just under the Arctic Circle, east of the Alaska-Canada boundary in the vicinity of Great Bear Lake; and (2) the conclusion of new agreements between the U. S. and Canadian governments, covering post-war disposal of the oil and the War Department's investment in developing the field, pipe lines, refinery and access roads, nearly all of which are on Canadian territory and blanket or compete with Alaskan resources.
