



Canol Oil Project

Testimony before the Truman committee, about the Canol oil project in northern Canada, leaves the layman somewhat confused about the general merits of the venture.

Petroleum Administrator Ickes disapproves it, considers it inexcusable, and recommends that, although already we have spent some \$100,000,000 on it, we should now decline to allocate the \$33,000,000 required to complete it.

Under-Secretary of War Robert Patterson defends it as a bold undertaking which has uncovered more than fifty million barrels of oil that may prove a key factor in the size of the coming aerial assault on Japan.

It is recalled that a group of congressmen returned Hudspeth -recently from the war zone much disturbed because this country is providing more than its share of oil products, thus repleting our exhausible petroleum reserves and is reported to be drilling past 1,850 threatening to place us at a disadvantage in the hereafter. feet in lime and anhydrite.

Gloves Foiling **Rust Saboteur**

PHILADELPHIA —(AP)—An order for all workers to wear gloves when packing war instruments made of polished metal, whether stee bronze or others, has been issued by the office of the Chief of Ordnance for Free-Control Instruments The touch of bare fingers causes corrosion. The rust due to fingers develops even underneath coatings of grease or oil which is smeared over these parts for shipment to the fronts. Finished steel, packed in glass jars, and completely immersed in corrosion preventing compounds, has been found rusted from the touch of human fingers. Acid in human moisture is the reason. The fire control parts go into the mechanical brains which determine ranges and for some guns do a large share of auto-

matic aiming and firing. Before these parts are packed it is further required that any finger prints that may have been left on them in manufacture and assemb-ling operations, be removed by chemical cleansing.

Even after a chemically cleaned part has been covered with grease, it is not to be touched by bard fingers.
