

Massive RAF Fleet Bombs Americans Bomb City Near German Capital In Heavy Attack

Bombers Feint Toward Berlin In Colossal Bluff

Many Fires Burning In Leipzig After Assault By Heavies

LONDON - (AP) - A massive fleet of RAF heavy bombers flew within a few fighters over the capital while the bombers turned sharply for a devastating 1,500-ton bomb attack on Leipzig, catching the Reich's third industrial city flat-footed.

The big Lancasters and Halifaxes made straight for Berlin, battling German fighters almost all the way in, the Air Ministry

Many Fires Started Then, when literally within sight of the capital, only Mosquito bombers went on to hit selected tar-gets while the heavy force veered away to blast Leipzig 100 miles southwest and leave the center of that city in a flaming mass of

At the Berlin turning point, the Air Ministry said, most of the Nazi fighters seemed to lose the main force of bombers, and hastened to defend the capital.

Awakened by sirens just before 4 a. m., Leipzig had to defend its sprawling railway yards and diversified industries mainly with archlights and anti-aircraft guns.

To Establish A Principle

The Department of Justice is seeking to enable the Supreme Court to hear its appeal in the Aluminum Company case. The government is frank about its purpose. It wants to have the Supreme Court establish a point of law.

The United States has appealed 349 out of District Judge Francis J. Caffey's 407 findings of fact. But there's one broad ideological allegation which is of major import to the future of the American economic system. The government is determined to have the Supreme Court rule on this question:

Is it a violation of the anti-trust laws for a company to be the only domestic producer of a commodity, provided that position has been attained and maintained without excluding or attempting to exclude others from a pair opportunity to compete?

Judge Caffey says it is not. He rules that if a company has attained monopoly without violating the law in its methods, the mere fact of the monopoly is not illegal This the Department of Justice disputes.

The Supreme Court has declined to pass upon the case because Justices Stone, Reed, Murphy and Jackson all have disqualified themselves. Each, before going on the bench, had connections with the case or with inquiries directly pertinent to it.

Now the Department of Justice is seeking a law permitting five justices to constitute a quorum. This means excitement that some cuss-words that three of the nine jusices could rule that a company is violating the law if it is supremely successful by the most scrupulously ethical and legal methods.

Germany Able To Fight War Even If Oil Is Cut Off

NEW YORK-(A)-Germany could even if cut off from the Rumanian oil fields—with an estimated 5,-000,000,000 gallons of gasoline and oil the Nazis recover from coal annually, an international fuel engineer said Saturday

Germany's rich coal holdings in the regions of the Saar, Ruhr, Rhine and Alsace-Lorraine, plus the mines of her satellite states, are still the backbone of the Nazi war machine, said J. G. Coutant vice president of the Colloidal Oil Corporation, who served as an advisor in France's war office from

To prevent another war Germany never again should be allowed to retain and operate her vast coal

U. S. To Have Good Supply Coutant, an American, predicted that this country, in searching for fuel to replace the loss of U.S. oil which the Bureau of Mines says will be exhausted in 15 years, will turn to processing oil from coal in the immediate postwar period:

Despite wartime shortages of motor fuel and the bleak petroleum outlook, every American may look forward to tremendous supplies of good high test gasoline—produced from coal—for his car, his plane or for any other use. The Bureau of Mines estimates there is a 3,000year supply of coal underground in

Based on observations made while he was still advising the French on fuel, Coutant believes that the Germans will keep fighting as long as they can maintain production from coal fields to feed gasoline to fighting planes, tanks, submarines and ground transportation.



It was tacked onto a \$308,000,000 deficiency appropriation bill, and provides that unused balances in appropriations go back to the Treasury. Under that arrangement the money couldn't be spent until reappropriated by Congress.

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



Aerial Medicine Work Explained To Instructors

Graduating "professors of destruction" at exercises held by the Bombardier Instructors School at Midland Army Air Field Saturday heard the story of the latest developments in aviation medicine in a talk given by Lt. Col. Paul A. Campbell, director of research at the AAF School of Aviation Medicine at Randolph Field.

Colonel Campbell told the gradvating instructors, many of them bombardiers recently returned from combat duty, that "doctors now sit with designers when new planes are planned, and on their recommendations ships now are being built that will enable the men who fly in those planes to do their jobs with the maximum effectiveness.

Coloney Campbell received his doctor of medicine degree at the Rush Medical School of the University of Chicago and completed specialized graduate work at the University of Vienna.

Outlines Work In his talk to the intensively trained bombardier instructors, Colonel Campbell outlined the work of the medical research committee which he headed for the Army Air Forces, declaring that it "is our job to devise means of more completely protecting the aircrew memters in all types of flying and under all conditions that they may

encounter.' Many new developments, ranging from earphones to specialized medicines to oxygen masks, were dis-

cussed by the speaker.

The job of aviation medicine, the speaker declared, is to devise ways of conditioning man to enable him to keep up with the speed, power and efficiency of his inventions.

Lt. Colonel Joseph Russell, director of training for the instructors school, complimented the graduates on completing training "that is a major accomplishment in your
