# Owls Advance To State Playoffs <br> McLean won the outright <br> down when Minyard intercepted 

championship by defeating the Owls 12-8 here last Friday night, and will play Bovina at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Valley High School
The Owls knew what was at stake in their game last week. "Everyone here wanted to win this one real bad," Coach Jack Shely said. "The kids were really excited about it.'
Coach Shely added that his team's enthusiasm ultimately may have done more harm than good as McLean, the odd-team out in a three-way tie for first place last season, claimed possession of the league title.
While McLean polished off a perfect $10-0$ regular season with the victory, the Owls dropped to 6-3-1 on the year and 4-1 in district to finish as the league runner-up.

This will be the fourth time in Coach Shely's five years in Silverton that the 0 wls have advanced into the playoffs. Sil verton lost a coin flip to decide its bi-district game site with Laz buddie ( $8-1-1$ ). The 0 wls appear to be a better team than they were when they played Lazbuddie earlier in the season, but chances are that the Longhorn also are better now.
"We may have been too emotional in that we weren't concentrating on what we were supposed to be doing out there," Coach Shely said of Friday's loss, which halted a five-game win streak for the Owls. "I think the biggest thing, though, was our inconsistency. We weren't ever able to really get anything established and it cost us.'
Much of the credit for that falls on the shoulders of the Tigers and an incredible defensive effort which held the Owls to their lowest-point total of the season. Two weeks ago Higgins limited Silverton to 18 points, though the Owls were able to win the game 18-6.
"We made too many mistakes," said Quarterback Kendal Minyard, one of six Owl seniors. "Turnovers, missed blocks-you name it.
We felt we could beat them, but we have to forget about it now and hope we meet them again somewhere down the line (in the playoffs)."
Silverton could conceivably meet McLean again in the state semi-finals.

The game's 18 points were tallied in a $3^{1 / 2}$-minute span in the first quarter.
The Tigers, who had averaged 54 points per game coming in, took the opening kickoff on their own 20 after a touchback, and marched through two first downs, arriving on the Silverton 25 . They picked up six yards on first down, but defense by Frank Lowrey and Bryan Breedlove caused the ball to go over to the Owls on the 11 .
The Owls concluded their first series on third down by losing the ball on a fumble on about the
10. McLean threw an incomplete pass and scored on second down with $4: 32$ remaining in the first period. There was an incomplete pass for PAT, and the Tigers pass for PAT
held a $6-0$ lead.
The Owls lost no time in answering this, charging through a first down on runs by Brian Martin and arriving on the McLean eight. Wayne Hender son carried the touchdown from four yards out with 3:01 remaining in the first quarter, and Brian West kicked the PAT to give the Owls an 8-6 lead.
After taking Silverton's kick off, the Tigers roared back, making a first down on the Silverton 14 and scoring with 1:06 still showing on the first quarter clock. The PAT kick failed, and the score stood at 12-8 in favor of the Tigers.

Silverton was unable to move the ball on the next series and punted to the McLean 8. As the second quarter opened, the Tig ers saw one of their aerials picked off at the McLean 15 by Bryan Ramsey.
Once again the $O$ wls were unable to move the ball against the Tigers, and a fourth-down field goal attempt by West was short

Thiis 24 -hour period annually is observed on the Thursday before Thanksgiving.
Smokers are asked to put away their cigarettes, pipes, cigars, snuff and chewing tobacco cigars, snuff and chewing tobacco
for one day, and not to smoke all for one day, and not to smoke all
day November 16. ACS members hope that this will show smokers that if they can put it away for a day, maybe they can quit using tobacco products.
The first Great American Smokeout took place on November 20, 1976. At that time, $37 \%$ of the United States adult population were smokers. A

decade later, only $30 \%$ of the population still smokes. A total of 37 million Americans are exsmokers. The decline in the number of smokers represents part of the progress made against the nation's number one health problem; however, there is still much work to be done to achieve the goal of a smoke-free society by the year 2000 .
Smoking is becoming increasingly unpopular, as indicated ${ }^{\circ}$ by public opinion polls. Corpora-
tions, cities, states, communities and institutions are placing greater restrictions on smoking, and the U. S. Congress has acted to increase excise taxes and require
new warning statements on cigarettes and cigarette advertis ing that reflect new medical knowledge about the dangers of cigarette smoking.

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
